Miss Hall is the gracious and talented daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. M. Hall and has passed the greater part of her life in Portland.

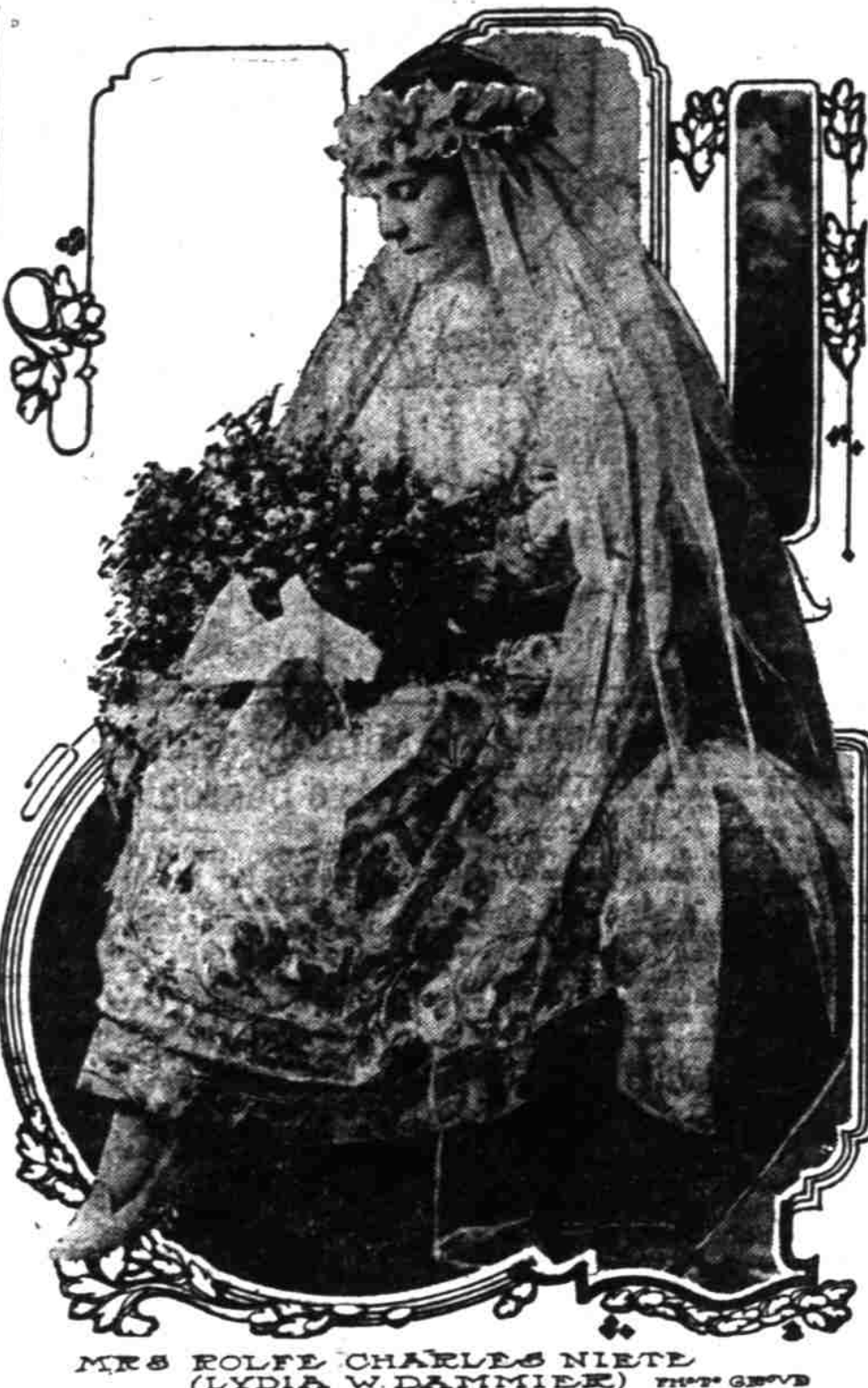

R. T. White, 15 years old, adopted son of W. T. Caples, an employee of Cornfoot's Shipbuilding plant, was drowned Monday afternoon when he slipped off of the pipe line that connects the Port of Portland's dredge Co-

lumbia, at the mouth of the Willamette river, with the shore.

White was employed as fuel passer on the dredge, and had started over the pipe line to meet his brother, E. Caples, on the shore. When within a few lengths of pipe from shore his foot slipped as he attempted to cross over a breach at a pipe connection. He fell into the water and sank. A board was brought to the scene and thrown to him, but too late. City Grappler Brady recovered the body in

the evening and turned it over to the public morgue.

Prominent Newspaper Man Dies New York, Aug. 7.—(I. N. S.)—Dante Barton, former managing editor of the Kansas City Post and vice chairman of the federal industrial commission, died at his home here Sunday night of typhoid fever. Funeral services will be held here Wednesday. Interment will be at Chicago.
