Organizations Prepared to Cooperate With Hoover in Price Control Work.

DAIRY PROBLEMS NEXT

Pota Yield Per Acre Will Be Light, But Owing to Great Area Planted, Big Crop.

"Every official and organization having to do with the raising of the food of the country is definitely ready to cooperate with Food Administrator Hoover in making food conservation and price control a success."

Commissioner Mickle has just returned from attendance at the American Association of Dairy, and Livestock Officials in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

"At the time of our meeting the food bills had not passed and no formal program of cooperation with the food administrator could be adopted," continued Mr. Mickle.

The dairy and food commissioner listened with great interest to the announcement that dairymen who supply Portland with milk are organizing with the thought of setting the price which they want for their product.

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Equipment Needed For Drying Fruits And Vegetables

To aid those intending to dry vegetables at home, the department of agriculture has furnished brief directions for the construction of trays and driers.

Trays
Make a framework from strips of lumber 1/2 inch thick and 2 inches wide.

4-Tray Drier
Stiffen 4 trays with wire screening bottoms by nailing 2 laths across center.

Trays With Electric Fan
Make a framework, 4 by 1 1/2 feet, from strips of lumber 1/2 inch thick and 3 inches wide.
