RAILROAD EMPLOYEES' SALARIES INCREASED TO MEET HIGH COSTS

Chicago & Northwestern and Rock Island Advance Men Getting Under \$3000 Year

Franklin Lane's Son Now Army Aviator

Washington, Aug. 16.—(I. N. S.)—Franklin K. Lane Jr., son of the secretary of the interior, is now a full fledged army aviator. Young Lane, who has been in the aviation section of the signal office since 1914, was ordered into active service by the war department Wednesday. He will proceed to the army aviation camp at Kanton, Ill.

San Francisco, Aug. 16.—(I. N. S.)—High cost of living is having the effect of increasing salaries of men in many of the railroad offices of the country who receive less than \$3000 a year, for the July payroll received in the offices of the Chicago & Northwestern railroad and the Rock Island system, contained the welcome information that their men have had their pay increased 10 per cent.

J. E. Gurney, president of the Rock Island system, has distinguished his administration by giving two 10 per cent increases since the first of the year. The first was made early this year.

Insurance Is Provided
The Union Pacific railroad, in addition to giving notice of 10 per cent to all of its agents and clerks receiving \$2000 a year and less, has put into effect for these men a life, accident and sick insurance not to exceed the sum of two years' salary. In the latter there is no age limit nor was there any physical examination required.

The Northern Pacific has increased salaries 10 per cent. The Great Northern has also increased salaries 10 per cent.

The Southern Pacific company, in its July payroll, gave its agents and clerks a bonus of five per cent. It did the same thing in July last year. In other words, the company has paid a 10 per cent bonus in two semi-annual payments, which has called for a total of about \$1,600,000.

Road Pays a Bonus
The Santa Fe railroad paid a 10 per cent bonus on December 2 last, another 10 per cent last month, and has announced it will pay a similar bonus in December of this year just before the Christmas holidays.

All of these increased payments do not in any way affect the members of the four big railroad brotherhoods, because they came under the regulation of the new Adamson law which congress passed over a year ago. The increases in members' pay are paid to amount to a total of more than \$6,000,000 a year.

Cossacks Demand Iron Discipline Idea
Petrograd, Aug. 14.—(I. N. S.)—At the close of the Cossacks' congress Wednesday, a resolution was adopted demanding a national government with unlimited powers and responsible only to a constituent assembly. The Cossacks insist in another resolution on the establishment of iron discipline at the front.

Prince in Scandal; Kaiser Scolds Him

Amsterdam (By Agency Radio to the I. N. S.)—Aug. 16.—The Berlin correspondent of the Amsterdam Express reports that Prince Leopold of Prussia, 24 years old, figured in a disgraceful scandal, the particulars of which are withheld from the public. The Kaiser himself administered a vehement upbraiding to the young prince, the dispatch says.

Eight Indictments Set Forth Treason

Washington, Aug. 16.—(I. N. S.)—Specific charges of eight indictments of constitutional rights which it declares have taken place since the United States entered the war, were laid before President Wilson by the American Union Against Militarism.

The memorandum was described as a record of eight indictments for crimes ranging from treason to conspiracy to simple misdemeanor for the sole offense of criticizing the government's war policy or agitating for peace.

The cases have occurred in Philadelphia, Cleveland, Indianapolis, Chicago, Grand Rapids, New York, Pittsburg and Seattle, it is alleged.
