

ALLEGED SPIES HELD IN SAN FRANCISCO ON EXECUTIVE WARRANTS

German Naval Lieutenant and
Alleged Confederate Ar-
rested on Secret Orders.

ONE RECENTLY MARRIED

Erwin Frederick Schneider in Posses-
sion of Iron Cross of Fourth Order,
Received in War in 1914.

San Francisco, Aug. 17.—(I. N. S.)—Presidential warrants were issued Thursday for Lieutenant Erwin Frederick Schneider of the German naval reserve, and his confederate, Theodore Kasinger, who have been under arrest on secret orders of the department of justice and held at the city jail incommunicado since last Saturday.

Schneider, who possesses an Iron Cross of the fourth order, which he received in 1914, is declared by the federal authorities to be a "master spy," and he was apprehended on the eve of his departure for his native land. Under an assumed name he planned to sail on a Swedish ship, having a birth certificate in his possession which bore the name of Oskar Walter Bergstrom, and a letter of recommendation from a prominent shipping man of this city. The latter is exonerated by the federal authorities and is declared a "victim" of the spy by them.

Sought Place Among Flyers
According to data secured by the investigating bureau, Schneider attempted to join the aviation corps and as an applicant remained at least one night at Fort McDowell. He refused later to join because he was not promised a commission. Schneider's friendship for four officers of the Austrian army, who have been under surveillance by agents of the department of justice, first directed suspicion toward him. These men are James Froehlich, Erhard Kietzel, Raimond Heinisch and Herman Ehrlich.

They had given their pledge to the federal authorities to report at regular intervals during their stay here. They departed recently for Los Angeles en route to Mexico, and are now believed to be in Laredo, Texas. It is said that on orders from Washington they will not be permitted to leave this country.

Prisoner a Naval Man
Schneider, according to the government's evidence, left Germany before the war as an officer of a torpedo boat which was being delivered to the Chinese government. Upon arrival at Shanghai he saw service with a German vessel there, which was interned at the time of the war. He then came to the United States, acting as quartermaster on a vessel of the Pacific

Mail Steamship company. Later he left that service and was quartermaster on the steamer Harvard. He finally abandoned sea duty and had numerous positions on shore, eventually becoming a clerk for the Southern Pacific at its freight sheds, which work he was doing at the time of his arrest.

During all this time it is claimed, he was busy acquiring information for his government.

Internment Recommended
At Redwood City, in April, he married a Miss Marie Helm, whose parents reside in Oakland.

The birth certificate which was found in the lining of Schneider's trunk, he claims he took from a sailor on board one of the ships on which he was employed. He claims to have done this because it was impossible for him to obtain employment under a German name.

Kasinger, who resided in a local hotel where Schneider lived, is implicated through his friendship for the "master spy" and his association with the Austrian officers.

It is known that the local authorities recommended the internment of the Austrian officers, but for diplomatic reasons Washington refused to make the order.

Schneider's Wife Is Released
Mrs. Schneider made repeated attempts today to see her husband but failed, and after declaring her belief in Schneider's innocence, went to her mother's home.

Mrs. Elia Helm, had recently won a legal battle for a share in the Wilson-Kimball mines in Alaska, worth \$5,000,000. On August 27, a hearing will be held in superior court here, involving an accounting of this estate.

May Send Troops Soon
Washington, Aug. 17.—Department of justice officials this afternoon admitted they are contemplating calling on the war department for troops to put down I. W. W. troubles in Far Western states. Prosecutions, even if wholesale, can hardly maintain order, they believe.

I. W. W. activities, they say, are becoming increasingly a menace not only to peace of the communities, but to the prosecution of the war. War department orders for material are being held up, they pointed out, and the civil authorities are being defied and the work of the new food administration seriously hampered. They indicated a call for troops might be forthcoming soon.

Speakers Cause of Disturbance
Seattle, Aug. 17.—(U. P.)—A crowd of 4000 men and women, many of whom were I. W. W. took Kate Sadler, I. W. W. speaker away from two policemen, who sought last night to arrest her for publicly denouncing President Wilson as a traitor. Mrs. Sadler, whose husband is now under federal indictment for alleged resistance to the draft law, was spirited

away from the street meeting in an automobile after her release.

The riot came as the climax of a street meeting, which closed an all day conference of the "People's Council for Democracy and Peace Terms." C. E. S. Wood of Portland was one of the speakers.

Fighting Miner Arrested
Wallace, Idaho, Aug. 17.—(I. N. S.)—"Mucker" McDonald, leader of the anti-Western Federation of Labor forces in the Butte riots three years ago, is under arrest here today, charged with an assault on a fellow miner. McDonald was taken after a fight with deputy sheriff, whom he warned, "he was the toughest man in America."

WAR MOVES OF U. S. ADVANCING AT TOP SPEED

Those which may be told the public include:

Approval by the president of certain plans which will make the navy a more efficient factor in the war, and especially in curbing the German submarine menace.

Espionage Laws to Be Enforced
Assignment by the president and secretary of war of the best brains in the army—including all ranking major generals and those just promoted—to active duty with the field forces. This means that the national guard will be ready for France long before snow flies, and that the new national army, first increment, can take its place in the reserve camps in France before the spring drive comes if the war goes on.

Sharp curbing of the I. W. W. and all pro-German agitators who have planned to interfere with the manufacture of munitions and war supplies, including the lumber for the great war aerial fleet, and announcement by the department of justice that espionage laws are to be enforced as drafted.

There are many additional moves which are of the utmost importance. They, however, will be revealed from time to time in the cable dispatches from the battle front.

Pershing's Suggestions Followed
The complete organization of the national army and the national guard contingents is a most vital move. The commanding officers and their staffs will get on the job immediately. The result must soon be felt.

The announcement that organizations will be along the lines suggested by General Pershing, following his observations in France, with the company unit 250 men commanded by two captains, a first lieutenant and three second lieutenants shows that right from the start the men are to be trained in all of the wrinkles of trench warfare. It also means that the original plan of calling up the various increments of 500,000 conscripts in regular order as fast as places can be made for them in the camps is to be rigidly adhered to.

The second call will come as soon as the national guard is ready to start across the ocean and as national guard units depart their places will be filled by men of the "second 500,000."

Movement to Camps Begun
Washington, Aug. 17.—(U. P.)—Small detachments of the national guard are now moving to southern camps, but the general movement

INTERNATIONAL SPY IS ARRESTED FOR BEING IN FORBIDDEN ZONE

Dr. Karl Armgaard Graves
Asserts He Is Now State
Department Employee.

Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 17.—(U. P.)—Dr. Armgaard Karl Graves, international spy and author of "Revelations of the Kaiser's Personal Spy," was under arrest here today, charged with being within the forbidden zone without a permit.

Graves says he is in the employ of the state department and is searching for a Mrs. Cavenish, descendant of the British "Earl of Cavenish," who, he alleges, is in possession of papers proving the illegitimacy of the Hohenzollerns.

Graves declares he has followed "Mrs. Cavenish" from New Orleans to St. Louis and was one day behind her on his way to Denver, when arrested here.

Graves has lost much of his previous dapper appearance. His clothing is frayed and his shoes are "run over." He is "traveling light," carrying only suitcases. In one was a monocle and some clothing. The other contained "papers."

Sir Graves was arrested in 1914 for alleged blackmail of Countess von Bernstorff and Count von Bernstorff then German ambassador to the United States, he has not been much in the limelight. At that time he claimed to have in his possession letters directed to the countess and he used them in an effort to secure funds which he claimed were due him from properties in Germany. He was acquitted.

Graves probably will be interned for the remainder of the war.

CHANGE IN DATES FOR ENTRAINING NATIONAL ARMY IS ANNOUNCED

Washington, Aug. 17.—(U. P.)—Provost Marshal General Crowder today again changed the dates for entraining the first 687,000 troops in the national army. Thirty per cent will go September 5, 30 per cent September 15 and 30 per cent October 3. The last 10 per cent will leave later in October. Orders to this effect were sent today.

Inquiry Into Steel Cost Is Completed

Washington, Aug. 17.—(U. P.)—The federal trade commission has completed its investigation into the cost of steel production in the United States. It will submit its report to President Wilson within a very few days.

President Wilson is expected to fix a price on all steel products immediately, based on the findings of the commission.

While no information was ascertainable from the commission on cost figures, there is reason to believe it will range between \$35 and \$45 a ton.

Purdue Opening Put Off to Aid Harvest

Lafayette, Ind., Aug. 17.—(I. N. S.)—The opening of Purdue university has been postponed. Students may help in harvesting Indiana's big crops. The opening of classes was postponed from September 12 to October 6. Students engaged in agricultural work need not apply for two weeks after September 26.
