

ROAD MONEY HINGES ON CLASSIFICATION OF HIGHWAYS OF STATE

Unless Uncle Sam Calls Them
"Post Roads," Coin From
Shackelford Fund Is Off.

Salem, Or., Aug. 22.—When may a road be classified as a post road under the provisions of the Shackelford act which provides for cooperation between the government and the states in the construction and improvement of post roads?

The cooperative work planned by the state highway department for this year depends on the answer to this question. The proposed work depends on the construction of the highway, officials and engineers may put upon the meaning of the Shackelford act if the act is broadly interpreted, the cooperative work will proceed without a hitch, and if not there is bound to be delay, according to the state highway engineers' department.

Two Units Are Planned
Two projects have been mapped out for cooperative work with the government this year in improving post roads on a basis of the state putting up a dollar for each dollar to be spent by the government. Both are a part of the Pacific highway. One is the Wolf creek grade in Josephine county, and the other is in Douglas county. The proposed work in Douglas is in two sections, one providing for the elimination of Roberts mountain grade, and the other in what is known as Pass creek canyon. The distance for the proposed improvement in Douglas county is 10 miles and the estimated cost \$200,000.

So far the Douglas county proposition has not been presented to the government engineers, but the Josephine county project has, and it has not yet been approved by the government officials because they are not sure that it is to be used in the future as a post road. The government officials are asking for more proof on this point.

Witch Over Classification
State Highway Engineer Nunn has pointed out to the government district engineer at Portland that it is impossible for the highway department to furnish more proof on that point, as the government itself decides when a road is to be a post road, and this is

Commissioned Men Go to Second Camp

Nine Officers in Reserve Service, Several From Oregon, Are Under Orders to Report at Presidio Monday.

usually governed according to population. Mr. Nunn takes the position that all of the Pacific highway may be classed as a post road, so far as interpretation of the Shackelford act is concerned, as rural mail routes will include this road.

At the present time, however, a rural mail route does not pass over the Wolf creek section of the Pacific highway, and that is the point over which the government officials are pondering. Mr. Nunn says the Douglas county case is identical with the Josephine county case, and that if one is turned down by the government the other may meet a like fate. However, he says he feels confident the government engineers and officials will approve the projects.

New Roadway Planned
In Douglas county the proposed road will be new, as the present section is to be abandoned, so of course the new road will not be a post road until after it is built and the government provides for sending a mail route over it. Douglas county has voted \$200,000, which is being used to improve the Pacific highway on the opposite side of the county, and is depending on the state and government to improve Pass creek canyon.

The work contemplated is grading and macadam, and the state has no other funds except the match money, according to Mr. Nunn, available for it. The \$200,000 fund is only for paving, except in certain specified cases.

BLACKLEG EPIDEMIC ON CRANE PRAIRIE IS UNDER CONTROL

Vaccination of Stock Will Be
Continued, However, as a
Precautionary Measure.

Bend, Or., Aug. 22.—That the blackleg epidemic on the Crane Prairie range is now under control, was reported by stockmen who arrived in Bend Tuesday afternoon from the range, where the vaccination of nearly 1000 head of young stock has just been completed.

Only one animal has died from the disease within the last week. Continued vaccination of young calves will be necessary each year, until the blackleg germs, thought to have found lodgment in the ground, have been entirely eliminated, it is said.

Von Schack Indicted In Angel Island Plot

San Francisco, Aug. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Former German Vice Consul E. H. von Schack is named as a conspirator in the indictment returned by the federal grand jury charging Laurence de Lacey, editor of a San Francisco weekly, D. J. Harndy and a well known San Francisco merchant, whose name is being withheld by the authorities until after his arrest, with planning the escape of Franz Bopp, former German consul general, and Von Schack from the custody of Colonel George K. McGinnis at Angel Island. Though Bopp would have benefited if the scheme had been successfully carried out, United States Attorney Preston does not charge him with knowledge of the plans, but names Von Schack as the one with whom the indicted persons dealt.

Executive of Texas Gives Lie in House

Governor Ferguson, Facing Impeachment Proceedings, Uses Strong Words in His Replies.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Governor Ferguson on cross examination in the impeachment proceedings against him in the Texas house of representatives Tuesday admitted that at the time he wrote a letter to the supreme court while a judge solving his expenditures at the executive mansion was before it, a bill increasing the supreme justices' salaries lay on his desk. The governor afterwards vetoed the bill, he stated.

"That's an infamous lie," the governor shouted, when asked if he had not told H. P. Mansfield of Houston that the members of the Beaumont court of appeals were a bunch of ingrates.

The governor declined to reveal the source of \$125,500 which he borrowed last April to pay off his personal indebtedness at a Texas state bank, and said he would resign his office before giving names.

He heatedly denied that he had accepted the money, which was paid to him in currency. He said it was not secured by mortgage, but that everything he has is morally back of the loan.

Land Grant Counties To Collect Taxes Due

Willingness of Federal Government to Make This Concession Is Gratifying to State and Attorneys.

Salem, Or., Aug. 22.—The willingness of the government officials to stipulate with the Oregon counties through which the O. & C. land grant runs, that the counties may collect the taxes due on the grant lands due to June 9, 1915, which is the date the Chamberlain-Ferris bill was passed by congress, without prejudicing their claims to interest and penalties, is highly pleasing to Attorney General Brown and the district attorneys who recently met here to consider the matter.

Attorney General Brown Tuesday received a copy of the letter written by Clay Tailman, commissioner of the general land office, and a decision from the office of the attorney general of the United States, and immediately prepared copies to forward to the district attorneys in each of the 18 land grant counties. The communication makes it clear that while the government is willing to go ahead and pay the taxes without prejudicing the claims of the counties, for interest and penalties, it in no way recognizes by such agreement that the counties have any further rights in the premises.

Federal Grand Jury Is After Booze Sales

Liquor Sold Soldiers in Uniform at San Francisco Brings on Grist of Indictments—Severe Penalties Promised.

San Francisco, Aug. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Six federal grand jury indictments and three court sentences were recorded Tuesday in the criminal division, preventing the sale of liquor to soldiers and sailors in uniform by saloonmen, cafe proprietors and bootleggers in San Francisco.

Mrs. Ida Peterson, proprietor of a hotel, was among the six defendants against whom the grand jury returned true bills. She is the first woman in this city to be charged with the offense.

Saloonkeepers are becoming more afraid of breaking the law since the announcement of the federal judges that severe penalties would be imposed, and the greater amount of sales to soldiers are now being carried on surreptitiously by bootleggers.

Highway Engineers Send Resignations

No Appointments to Be Made, as Vacant Places Will Be Consolidated With Others.

Salem, Or., Aug. 22.—State Highway Engineer Herbert Nunn has received and accepted the resignations of Manche O. Bennett, division engineer of the Eastern Oregon district, and headquarters at Pendleton, and Francis E. Kurtz, district highway engineer in Jackson county.

Mr. Nunn said no appointments to fill the vacancies would be made, as the work that was being done by those two will be taken over by enlarging other divisions. This action will reduce the overhead expense in connection with the highway work.

Magazine Is Incorporated
Salem, Or., Aug. 22.—Articles of incorporation for the Western Magazine corporation of Portland were filed Tuesday. The incorporators are John E. Cronan, J. M. Coughlan and F. I. Gollchur. The capital stock is \$5000.

Coast Key Men Join Big Wireless Class

San Francisco, Aug. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Thirty San Francisco telegraphers, enlisted in the naval reserve, will leave on a special car Tuesday afternoon, bound for Boston, where they will take a three months' course in wireless telegraphy at Harvard university.

After three months of training the telegraphers will be stationed on ships in the merchant marine. Telegraphers from all parts of the country will arrive in Boston this week for the brief study course.

The local telegraphers have been taken from newspaper, commercial and railroad work.

Seattle Hears Bank Plan Is Under Way

Seattle, Aug. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Governor James K. Lynch of the federal reserve bank of San Francisco, wired the clearing house association Tuesday that he and John Ferrin, chairman of the San Francisco board, will shortly visit Seattle to perfect means for the establishment of a branch bank in Seattle.

CURRY COUNTY PLANS TO MAKE BOND ISSUE FOR COAST HIGHWAY

Delegation From Coos Region
Confers With Citizens Regarding Funds for Road.

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 22.—As a result of the meeting at Crescent City, Cal., to determine the route through Oregon of the Coast highway, Curry county has launched a movement to bring about a bonding of the county to the limit for the construction of the highway along the coast through Curry county and to connect with Coos county highways.

A delegation of 30 men from Coos and Curry counties attended the meeting.

Governor Withycombe, John Yeon, Amos Benson, S. Benson and Highway Commissioner E. J. Adams were guests of the smoker at the Millicoma club Tuesday night.

Two Men Leave for War
Marshfield, Or., Aug. 22.—Two more Coos bay men left Tuesday for the war. H. V. St. Johns, who has had charge of the construction of the Standard Oil supply station and who has been a temporary resident, left for San Francisco to enter the officers' reserve training camp. Leo McLain, eldest son of Postmaster McLain of Marshfield, went to Portland to enlist in the navy. His younger brother is a member of the Eleventh company, Coast Artillery corps.

Logging Man Dies Suddenly
Marshfield, Or., Aug. 22.—W. J. Hill, general storekeeper and superintendent of the Smith-Powers Logging company, widely known in this part of the state, died suddenly Tuesday at Powers after an illness of a few hours. Heart trouble caused death. Hill had been with A. H. Powers, head of the company, for many years, coming with Powers from Minnesota, when the company started operations on the coast.

Contractor Is Ship Inspector
Marshfield, Or., Aug. 22.—John G. Horn, contractor of North Bend, has been appointed assistant inspector of government vessel construction. The appointment was made by Captain William Magee, formerly of this city, who is inspector for the district of Oregon and Washington. Horn built all the depots for the Southern Pacific, between Coos bay and Eugene.

Cranberry Grower Is Dead
Marshfield, Or., Aug. 22.—J. H. Pinkerton, owner of a cranberry ranch at Hauser, dropped dead at his home shortly after returning from this city, where he came to consult a physician. He was a native of Ohio, 63 years old, and was one of the pioneer cranberry growers of the Coos bay district, having resided on his ranch for 11 years. One of the three surviving sons is at Fort Stevens with the coast artillery.

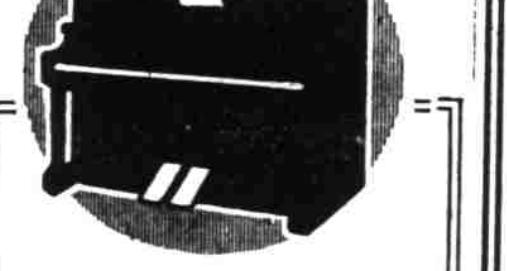
"Boys of '61" March And Are Cheered
