RUSSIAN FLIERS SEE These telegrams will be sent from several stations ahead as soon as the conscript is able to judge whether the train will be on time at the camp.

In this way the camp commanders will be able to check up and see that the full quota has arrived, that no man tried to escape by getting off at some station along the line.

Full lists of the men forwarded will be wired ahead by the local boards, and these will be checked off as the men arrive.
