





Seattle, Aug. 27 .- (I. N. S.)-A Chinese believed to be Yee Bing, reputed head gunman of the Hop Sing tong. was shot and killed in Weeler street Sunday night by two other Chinese gunmen, Mose names are unknown to the police and both of whom escaped. 


