

BEAVERS SPLIT EVEN WITH SEALS, HOUCK'S PITCHING TAKING ONE

Then Chief Johnson Comes Back With a 3 to 1 Sunday Victory for the Visitors

When Byron Houck spiltballled the Seals into a 3 to 1 defeat in the first game of yesterday's double-header, the Beavers made it five out of seven games from the Seals on the series. Then Chief Johnson came back with a 3 to 1 victory and the visitors broke even on the day.

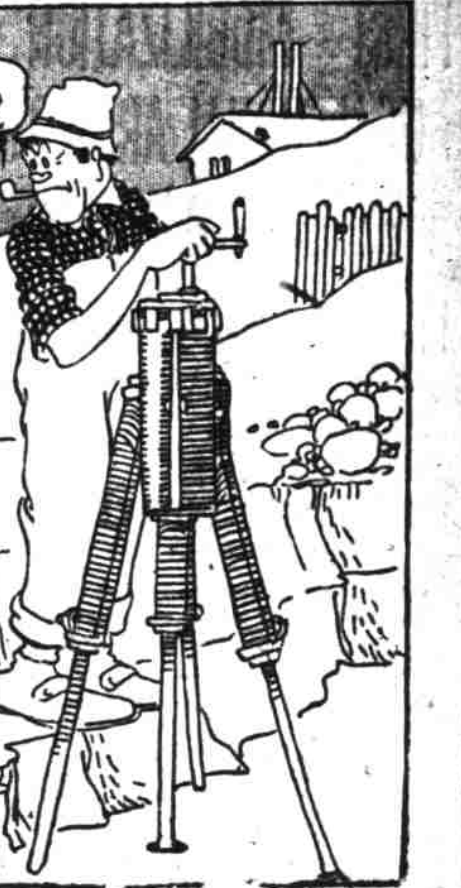
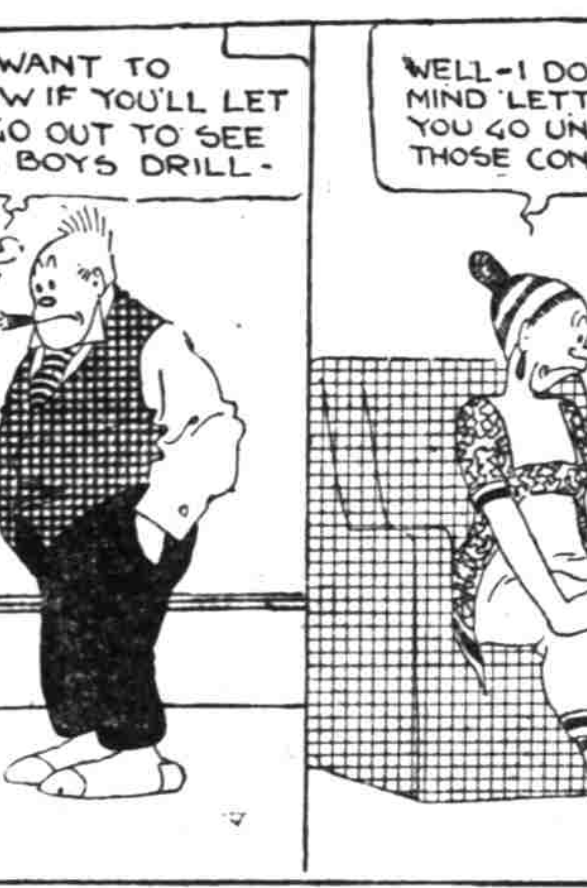
