

PETITIONS TO RECALL OFFICIALS OF COOS ARE IN CIRCULATION

Judge Watson and Commissioners Armstrong and Philip Attacked by Enemies

DECLARED TO BE UNFIT

Alleged to Be Incompetent, Extravagant and Unfaithful to Their Constituents in Discharge of Duties.

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 30.—Petitions are being circulated in an effort to bring about a recall election to remove from office County Judge James Watson and County Commissioners G. J. Armstrong and Archie Philip. It will require 900 signatures on the petition to bring about the recall election.

The petitions make various general charges that the officials are incompetent, extravagant and unfaithful to their constituents; that they have wasted funds of the county in building roads, bridges and other improvements which were not needed; and that they are unfit to administer the business of the public. Formerly County Judge Watson was elected county clerk and later was elected county judge. Armstrong has served several terms as commissioner and Philip was elected on the board at the last meeting.

Visitors See Coos Bay

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 30.—Vice President E. O. McCormick of the Southern Pacific, Assistant Secretary of the Interior E. P. Mather and Mrs. Mather and Captain Grabner of the U. S. Army, make up a party visiting Coos Bay and being shown about by General Freight Agent A. A. Hinshaw and General Passenger Agent John M. Scott. National Eight Hour Law

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 30.—Charles Hall, local member of the Oregon council of defense, has written all the lumbermen and employers of labor asking their opinion as to the passage of a national eight hour law, in order to be better informed in making recommendations as a member of the council. So far as the lumber companies have reported they favor the national eight hour law and say it will not do any harm provided it is a national plan. They all oppose the eight hour day being forced on any locality if not applied generally.

Japan Wants Entire Control Over China

Mission From Oriental Empire Will Ask Washington to Recognize Paramount Influence of Mikado in Japan.

Washington, Aug. 30.—(I. N. S.)—Japan will ask the United States to recognize her paramount influence in China by joining in the four-power group and making a loan to China for her industrial needs. Japan also will offer to swap the use of her shipping for American steel.

This program for discussion between Viscount Ishihara of the Japanese special mission and the state department was made known informally Wednesday.

A clear-cut distinction will be made by the Japanese, however, between a loan to China for political ends and for industrial purposes. According to the formal agreement now existing between Japan and France and England of the original four-power government, which also included Germany, China may not accept loans for political purposes.

Postoffice Broken Into During Night

Burglars Enter Building By Front Door, Secure Stamps and Small Change, and Make Getaway.

Corvallis, Or., Aug. 30.—The postoffice at Philomath was broken into Monday night and a quantity of stamps and some small change were taken. The burglars entered the front door and escaped through a back window. It is the opinion of Sheriff Gelatly and the Philomath police that the work was that of amateurs, but no clue as to their identity has been discovered.

Corvallis, Or., Aug. 30.—Captain Gilbert of the Third Oregon infantry has asked the Corvallis W. C. T. U. for 100 kitchen utensil lifters. They will be procured and forwarded to Clackamas. The lifters will be made by hand.

Child Returned to Custody of Mother

Mrs. Edna Ryckman Jenks the published version of the story relative to Mr. Ryckman's taking their child, asserting that the child was taken from her home Sunday afternoon and not Sunday night, and that it was returned to her custody Monday morning. Her statements are borne out by the police and juvenile court records show that by common agreement the child was taken to the Fragler home after it had been found by Patrolman L. F. Russell and Mrs. Ryckman at the father's home, 784 Gisan street, at 2 o'clock in the morning. The following morning the case was settled between Mr. and Mrs. Ryckman before Mrs. Whiting, a probation officer, and the matter kept out of court. The mother was given the custody of the child, and the father the privilege of taking it out for a walk at certain intervals. Mrs. Ryckman Tuesday filed suit in the circuit court for divorce on the grounds of cruelty and inhuman treatment a few moments before. Ryckman filed divorce proceedings on the grounds of desertion.

After a series of directly conflicting announcements, carpenters resumed work today on the infirmity buildings of the Palo Alto camp, originally intended to house the Forty-first National Guard division. 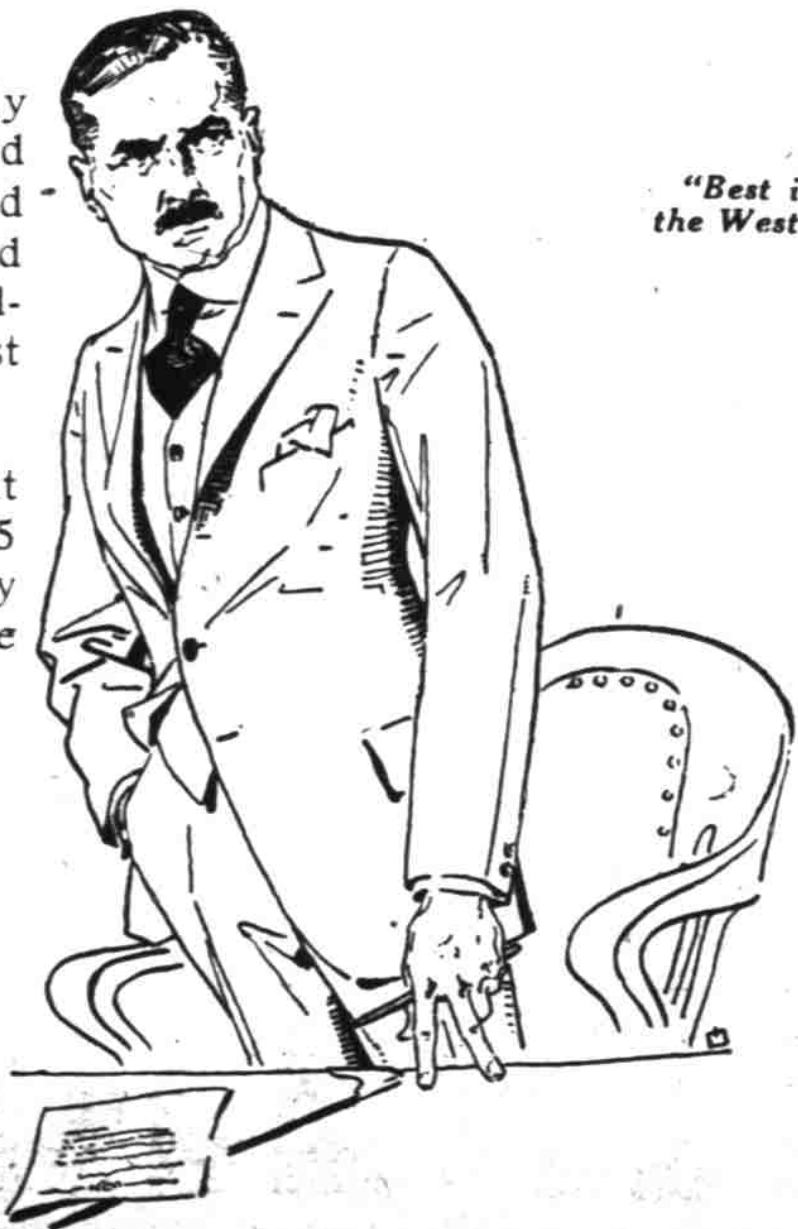
