

GUSTAV SIMON, LONG A RESIDENT OF CITY, DIES IN CALIFORNIA

Julius Louissou, Brother-in-Law, Goes to San Francisco on Receipt of News.

San Francisco, Aug. 30.—(L. N. S.)—Gustav Simon, vice president of M. A. Gunst & Co., in charge of the company's business in the northwest, died here last night of acute anemia after a six months' illness. He was taken to a hospital two weeks ago. Simon was born in Hanover, Germany, and is survived by a widow, Mrs. Belle Simon, and a daughter, Helen. Funeral services will be held tomorrow.

Mr. Simon came to Portland 35 years ago from San Francisco to represent Esberg, Bachman & Co. When this firm retired from business here Mr. Simon became associated with the Gunst firm, remaining as resident manager until he retired a year ago.

Julius Louissou, a brother-in-law of Simon's, and at present resident manager for the Gunst concern, left immediately for San Mateo on receipt of news of Mr. Simon's death.

Alleged Persistent. Wooser Is Arrested

John Loris' alleged infatuation for Elsie Roberts, landlady of the Saranac hotel, Sixth and Davis streets, led to his arrest Wednesday night, the second time on a disorderly conduct charge. When searched Loris was carrying a revolver.

According to Miss Roberts, "Loris has been hanging around the hotel, knocking on her door at all hours of the night, and labored under the impression that she would become his wife." Friends who intervened in Loris' behalf have requested that he be held in jail until they could communicate with friends in the East who would be willing to take care of him. Loris was arrested for the same offense several months ago and deported from Portland and advised not to return. He came back three days ago.

Latest in Jewelry Is War Bracelet

Use of Kerosene to Start Fire Is Fatal

Woman Well Known in Forest Grove Dies in Dutton, Mont., as Result of Burns—Home Is Destroyed.

Forest Grove, Or., Aug. 30.—Word has reached Forest Grove from Dutton, Mont., of the death of Mrs. Harry McKay August 17, as the result of burns sustained from a kerosene explosion.

Unaware that there were live coals in the stove, Mrs. McKay poured kerosene in the firebox, and as gas was generated, explosion followed. In the fire which ensued the children were driven through the flames in their night-clothes. Mr. McKay was seriously sick in bed at the time of the fire and was carried out Anna, the 13-year-old daughter, fought her way through the flames and assisted in carrying her mother out of the burning building, but the burns were so serious that Mrs. McKay died two hours later. The house and all the contents were destroyed.

Mrs. McKay was well known to many people in Forest Grove. Her daughter Anna attended school here the past year.

Mrs. Archie McKay, whose husband died here about a month ago, had gone to Dutton to visit her son Harry, and the tragedy occurred while she was enroute. She arrived at Dutton the day of the funeral. She had intended to visit for a year through the middle west and Canada, but has changed her plans, and will remain with her four grand children to Forest Grove in a few days. Her son is in a hospital in Dutton.

46 Recruits Gained In Army Thursday

Portland Station Receives Applicants; Eight Supply Companies, Totaling 3000 Men, Needed for Army.

Forty-six applicants were enlisted in the different branches of the army Thursday by the Portland recruiting officer. Thirty-two went into the regular army, 29 from Oregon entering this service, and three from Washington. Eight enlisted in the national guard and six enlisted in the quartermaster's corps of the national army.

Eight supply companies, totaling 2600 men, are needed for the national army and will be obtained from enlistments. Recruits in the supply companies entering as privates in the quartermaster's corps are in direct line for promotions to corporals, sergeants, mechanics, cooks and buglers. Enlistments in the aviation section from this district have been ordered closed.

Bridge Collapses; Two Hurt

Airline, Or., Aug. 30.—The Pedee bridge collapsed Monday with Johnny Price and his little boy as they were crossing with a load of wheat. The boy was rendered unconscious. Mr. Price was badly bruised.

UNION COUNTY FOREST FIRE MAY BE WORST OF YEAR IN DISTRICT

Timber Stand Is Menaced by New Blaze at Head of Catherine Creek.

Baker, Or., Aug. 30.—Following the report late yesterday afternoon of a new forest fire on Wolf and Ladd creeks near North Powder, late last evening the local office of the Minam forest received a telephone message from the ranger that a bad fire had broken out at the head of Catherine creek, Union county, menacing the timber stand. A request was made for additional fire fighters and Supervisor Barnes is getting all available men ready to leave as soon as possible for the scene. No details have been learned, but it is indicated that the latest fire may be the worst of the season in this district.

Smoke Obscures Midday Sun

Grants Pass, Or., Aug. 30.—The worst smoke condition which the Rogue River valley has experienced within the memory of the oldest settler prevails at the present time. Several fires of considerable extent are burning in the southern part of Douglas county and local fires in poor stands of timber, which are doing little damage, are burning near this city and in the Jacksonville-Applegate district. With an atmospheric condition which brings clouds of smoke close to the earth, the haze completely obscures the sun even at midday, and hides the hills closest to the city.

Corvallis Water Supply Menaced

Corvallis, Or., Aug. 30.—Forest fires are seriously threatening the water-sheds at the head of the Corvallis water supply, and a report from that district Wednesday was to the effect that if they could not be controlled help would have to come from the city. Former Mayor Porter got busy and had all arrangements made to close up the business places and take every available citizen to the scene of the fire, but a later report indicated that the forest rangers believe they can handle the situation if the wind does not rise. However, the citizens of the town are holding themselves in readiness to move at a moment's notice.

New Fire Breaks Out

Bend, Or., Aug. 30.—While the fire which has been raging in the Pine mountain section for the last three days was being put under control Tuesday night, another conflagration started in the Lava Lake district, more than 60 miles southwest of Bend, and by the time it was reported 600 acres had been burned over. The tract includes good timber.

ber, and because of a heavy wind and brush the task confronting the firefighters is a difficult one. Twenty men were sent from Bend and Lapina. The Pine mountain fire covered practically 3000 acres before it was fully subdued.

Mills in the Sisters country have been forced to shut down temporarily while their workmen are preventing the spread of a number of small fires.

Fires Are Under Control

Eugene, Or., Aug. 30.—Reports received from lumber companies at Elmira today state that the fire east of Noti is practically under control. It burned a small quantity of logs, but danger to either green timber or logs is thought to be past. The Fisher Lumber company at Marcola reported Thursday forenoon that the fire which threatened to do great damage Wednesday had been gotten under control and all danger of damage to the mill or plant was thought to be past.

Linn Has New Fire

Salem, Or., Aug. 30.—A new forest fire southeast of Berlin in Linn county was reported to the state forester today. He was informed that a crew of 20 men is being sent from Portland to fight the fire. Reports to the state forester from other parts of the state indicate the fire situation is improving.

Ten Women Caught In North End Raid

Another raid was conducted last night into the north end, netting ten women and one man. The raid was conducted by the morals squad, headed by Captain Harris. Some of those taken last night were arrested in the raid of two weeks ago. With the exception of two cases tried today, the others have been set over until September 11. Two have asked for trial by jury.

Those arrested were Charlotte Bee, Sadie Witt, Lillie Rose, May Contrall, Darwin Shaw, Ida Miller, Lena Ferera, Della Fox, Sarah Weigel, Ida Beals and John Starfas. All have been released on \$100 bail.

Attorney Farrin's Trial Date Is Set

The trial of George N. Farrin, former attorney in Portland, charged with forging four government checks,

was set for October 31 by Federal Judge Wolverton this morning. Other scheduled trials are of Frank Pelister, charged with postoffice robbery at Hermiston for November 2, and of William Harris, facing a perjury charge, for November 23.

NEWS OF COUNTY COURT

The public service commission has recommended that several improvements be made in the approach over the P. R. L. & P. tracks at Hogan station. It is recommended that the county move the bridge across Johnson creek 75 feet and raise its level; that the company put up an additional danger sign and whistling posts, and

that brush be cut away that now obstructs the view of the tracks from the roadway. Two persons have been killed at this crossing.

Henry Raz of Hillsdale has been granted \$75 for three cows destroyed by order of the dairy inspector.

C. Debl of Hillsdale claims that the improvement of the Bertha-Beaverton road will, as proposed, damage the crops on his place to the extent of \$150. Roadmaster Yeon reports that none of the work has been done yet.

John Denison, foreman of the Multnomah county farm, has been authorized to sell six head of cattle.

S. P. Cars Hurlled Into River

train were hurled into the river and two others badly damaged left standing across the track Wednesday when a broken flange on one of the cars caused a derailment near Delta station.

Washington, Aug. 30.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Thomas J. Walsh, wife of the junior senator from Montana, died today in a Baltimore hospital, following an illness of many weeks.

Postoffice Changes
Washington, Aug. 30.—The postoffice department had declined to change the name of the postoffice at Hoff, Clackamas county, Or., to Beaver Creek, as desired by the pa-

trons, because there are several Beaver Creeks in the United States, and a Beaver and Beaverton in Oregon.

Postoffices at Pringle Falls and Recreation will be discontinued in two weeks, Senator Chamberlain is informed, unless reasons are presented in the meantime for keeping them up. Most of the patrons have moved away from the former office. It is stated, and campers have so thinned out at Recreation that few people are left.

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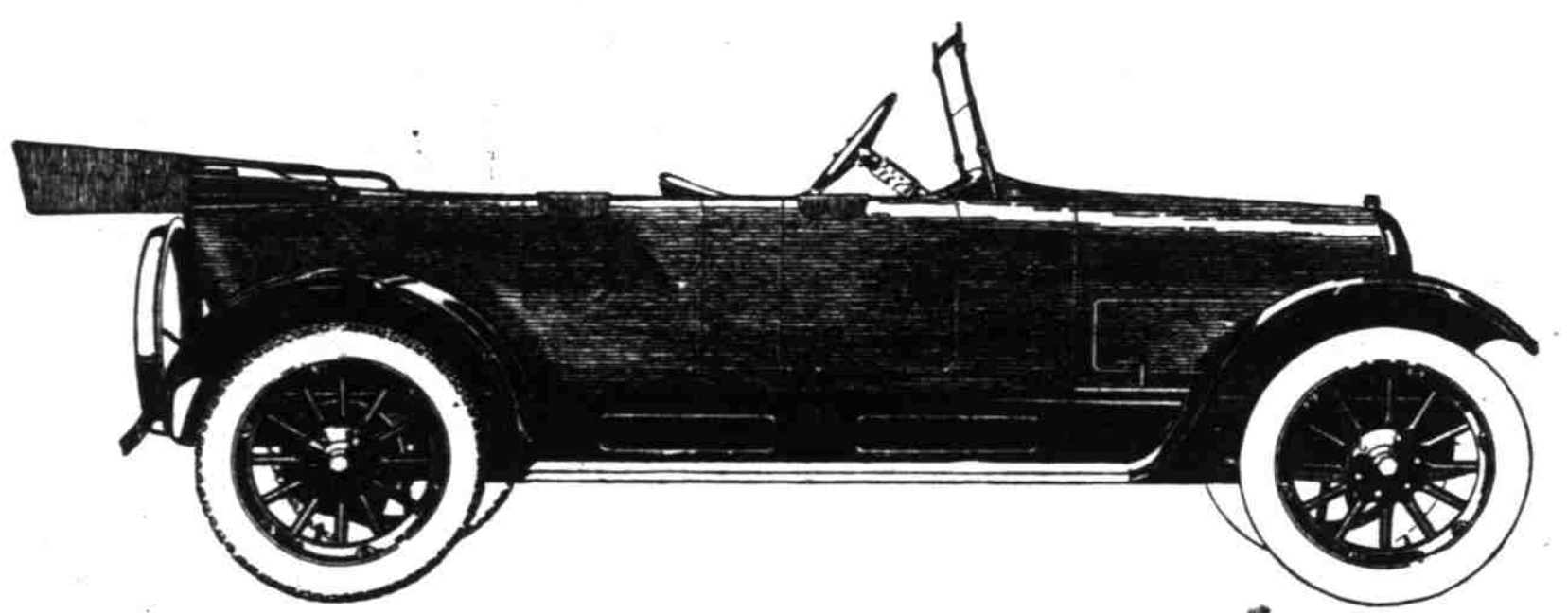
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
