

FORMER PORTLANDER AMONG WOUNDED IN BOMBING OF HOSPITAL

War Department Adds to List
of Casualties Caused by
the Air Raid Over France.

Washington, Sept. 12.—(U. P.)—Additional names of American hospital corps men wounded in the German raid on American hospitals in France reached the war department Wednesday.

The list includes First Lieutenant R. Whidden, medical officers' reserve, wounded moderate, 279 Park avenue, New York.

First Lieutenant Clarence A. McGuire, M. O. R. S., moderate, 128 Lathrop building, Kansas City, Mo.

Nurse Eva Parmelee, army nurse corps, very slight, address not known.

Private, first class, Elmer C. Sloan, medical department, moderate, 315 South A street, Elwood, Ind.

Private, first class, Alton Mason, M. E. R. S., severe, Boston, Mass.

Private Hiram P. Brewer, M. E. R. S., slight, 7 Center street, Cambridge, Mass.

Private Aubrey S. McLeod, M. E. R. S., severe, Marlboro, Mass.

Private John P. Stanton, M. E. R. S., moderate, Hyde Park, Mass.

The war department announcement simply said:

"Reports of casualties. Time, 11 p. m., September 4, base hospital No. 5; place (deleted); cause, air raid."

Lieutenant R. Whidden of the United States medical corps is the son of W. M. Whidden of the architecture firm of Whidden & Lewis. Mrs. Whidden said she had received notice that her son had been injured, but added that she was unable to give any details or further information. Lieutenant Whidden was graduated from Portland academy and finished his medical course in the east.

**Oregon State Guard
Seeks to Fill Ranks**

The Oregon state guard, under Major Richard Deich, at a meeting to be held in the Armory Friday night, will make an effort to fill its ranks to the maximum strength of 100 men to each company.

Now that the national guard has been called to the front, a special effort is being made to have the battalion fully organized and equipped by October 1, according to Major Deich. The men have already received their uniforms and are expecting rifles in a few days.

The state guard has no connection with the Oregon reserves or the home defense league, but is the organization officially recognized by the state.

MOBILIZATION NOTES

Room for Volunteers — Third Oregon is short 65 Men.

Guard House Shifted.—At the mobilization camp near Clackamas the guardhouse inhabited by those members of the Third Oregon undergoing punishment for refractory conduct and violations of the military orders has been moved from near the entrance to a distant point.

Room for Volunteers.—There is still room for volunteers in the Third Oregon. It lacks 65 men of being full. Recruits are coming along, but releases and discharges for various causes keep the deficit in men about the same.

Bayonet Practice Daily.—Officers at Clackamas mobilization camp practice bayonet exercises every afternoon. It gets up a fine appetite for the mess table.

Rain Brings Mud.—The mud was inconvenient at Clackamas during the rain. The gravelled walks of Vancouver's cantonments are missing. At the camp is not considered well drained enough for a mobilization center during the winter months, nothing is being done to improve conditions permanently. It will revert to its normal status of a rifle range.

Delays Are Expected.—Colonel May hopes to keep his regiment intact, but the indications are that while the regimental headquarters will be changed to Camp Greene, N. C., within a few days all of the companies now on duty in various parts of the Northwest will not get there at once.

**Grants Pass Man
Talked Too Much**

Grants Pass, Or., Sept. 12.—Whitney R. Lykin is in the county jail on a charge of sedition against the United States government and its officers. He is held pending further word from United States District Attorney Rasmus, who has asked Sheriff Lewis to wire the nature of the evidence against him.

Lykin has been warned repeatedly that the statements he was making were unlawful, the first time as long ago as February, but he has repeatedly refused to heed the warnings. He was working for a time on a diamond drill in the Preston Peak district.

**TWO FROM 'SLACKER'
SHIP BELIEVED TO BE
IMPLICATED IN RIOTS**

San Diego, Cal., Sept. 12.—(U. P.)—Nine men taken from the "slacker" ship Anyil were held here today on charges of attempting to evade the draft act.

Two of them are thought by federal officials to have been implicated in the Oklahoma draft riots. They are Charles Millery and Carl Curtis. The other seven are not Americans, but were subject to the draft act. They are:

**Automobile Bandits
-Rob Missouri Bank**

**Slayer of Sheriff
Is Lynched by Mob**

Hillsdale, Mich., Sept. 12.—(U. P.)—A mob today lynched Frank Van Tassel, insane, who last night shot and killed Sheriff George Ralston of Branch county just across the line from Hillsdale county.

Van Tassel shot Ralston in an argument at Algonac.

Immediately a mob of 500 citizens formed and started in pursuit of the slayer. At midnight Van Tassel was found hiding in a barn on his farm. The place was surrounded. Members of the posse called to him to surrender. Van Tassel answered with a shot which scattered the mob.

After a two-hour siege, during which many shots were exchanged, members of the mob crept toward the barn and put torches to the structure. To escape being burned to death, Van Tassel dashed for the open. As the flames outlined his body in the doorway he was met with a fusillade of bullets, dying instantly.

**Plan Branch Export

**All but Two Unions
Out in Springfield**

Springfield, Ill., Sept. 12.—(U. P.)—Practically all business ceased in Springfield at 9 o'clock this morning when the general strike, called in sympathy with the striking carmen, became effective.

Following meetings last night, the barbers, grocery clerks, brewery employees and meatcutters stopped work promptly at 9 a. m. today. Every union except the carpenters and printers is now out.

The first disorder growing out of the general strike will result in a declaration of martial law, Governor Lowden indicates.
