Today's Forecast

Weather Conditions

The atmospheric pressure has risen over the Pacific coast states, attended by clearing weather at most stations along the coast. The western storm area now lies central over southern Idaho, and during the past 24 hours has extended by general rises over Washington, Oregon and Idaho. Another low pressure area lies central over the upper Mississippi valley, where rains were reported. The pressure in the east has risen, and the weather is clearing. The temperatures are above normal practically everywhere west of the Mississippi river.

How to Can Fruits, Vegetables

Published daily in The Journal by authority of the Department of Agriculture.

PUT YOUR IDLE BOTTLES TO WORK

Fill Them With Fruit Juices for Next Winter.

Wash your bottles in pan of water to heat and keep hot.

Fill washbottle with enough water to reach to necks of bottles.

Dip corks to bottles in melted paraffin and bake in oven for several hours.

Press juice from fruits, in cider, fruit, or improvised press.

Heat in acid-resistant kettle (such as porcelain, granite, crockery, or aluminum).

Pour juice into hot bottles.

Set bottles in boiling water in washbottle or false bottom.

Submerge up to necks.

Put cover on washbottle.

Boil for 22 minutes.

Immediately press corks in position.

Replace bottles in washbottle. Boil again for 12 minutes.

Remove and lay on sides to cool.

Dip corks in melted paraffin.

Store in cool, dry, dark place.

The Sutherlin valley, Douglas county, was filled in the federal court Wednesday. The complaint alleges that the Sutherlin Land & Water company furnishes water only to its land purchasers and therefore is not a public service company and not under the jurisdiction of the public service commission. The plaintiffs are De Pauw university, the Luse Land & Development company of Canada, the Northwest Trust company of Minnesota and Ira Ochler as trustee for the Oregon Celler.

Expected to Be Transferred.—Through published orders, though he has received no word personally, Captain J. J. Hittinger, quartermaster corps, U. S. A., has an inkling that he is going to be assigned to duty as assistant to the depot quartermaster at Washington, D. C. Captain Hittinger was recently commissioned as captain in the quartermaster's corps and has been on duty here. Previous to that he was in charge of the local office of the Alaska Engineering company, which he opened some time ago. Captain Hittinger in the earlier days saw a good deal of active service in the army.

Leave of Absence Granted.—By direction of President Wilson, all members of the United States Legion who desire to attend the thirty-second national encampment at Columbus, Ohio, September 12 to 16, shall be granted leave of absence with pay, according to a notice received this morning by Collector of Customs Burke from Byron R. Newton, assistant secretary of the treasury department at Washington. Mr. Burke says no members of the legion are employed at the customs house and that he knows of none in Portland.

Will Stage Athletic Contests.—In line with its plan of interesting every member individually in Y. M. C. A. work and privileges, the first of a series of "acquaintance events" will be held at the Y. M. C. A. this evening beginning at 7:45 o'clock. The three membership and friendship teams of 100 men each are in charge of the program and will present some competitive stunts. There will be exhibition boxing, wrestling and other athletic contests, together with a watermelon feed.

Man Well Known Here Promoted.—After seven years of service on the Grand Trunk lines between Seattle and Prince Rupert, service as passenger agent at Victoria and assistant general passenger agent at Winnipeg, W. B. Deperow, well known in Portland, has been promoted to the position of general passenger agent over all Grand Trunk lines, according to advices received by Dorsey B. Smith, Portland city passenger agent.

Illinois Society Meets.—After a summer vacation the Illinois society met Wednesday evening at the Hotel Portland, when resolutions were passed thanking members for their activities in making the stay of the visitors to the National Education association such a pleasant one. A program was presented and dancing enjoyed.

Message Knocked Down.—Abraham Mitchell, 49 years of age, a messenger for the Western Union Telegraph company, was knocked down at

First and Washington streets Wednesday evening by an auto truck driven by L. H. Malloy and owned by Morris & Co., Fifteenth and Marshall streets. Malloy assisted Mitchell to the Emergency hospital, where his wounds were dressed. He was not seriously injured.

Trusty Leaves \$29.50 Behind.—John Loris, 25, serving a 20 day sentence for disorderly conduct, escaped from the city jail Wednesday and has not been found. Loris was a "trusty" and was working in the basement of the building cleaning cuspidors. At 7 o'clock Wednesday night the jailers missed Loris and a search was started through the North end. Loris was arrested on charges of molesting the proprietress of a North and rooming house August 30. Loris was dressed in overalls and was without hat or coat, leaving his clothes and \$29.50 at the jail.

Finley Going to Klamath.—Will L. Finley, state biologist, will leave Friday for Crater Lake and Klamath Falls, where he expects to secure some entirely new moving pictures of bird and animal life to use in connection with his lectures on the outdoors of Oregon. Many requests for Mr. Finley's moving picture lectures have been received from Eastern communities as well as from organizations in Oregon and Washington. If arrangements can be made with the fish and game commission he will devote the winter months to an Eastern lecture tour.

Bulletins Being Distributed.—A. H. Thiesen, meteorologist at the weather bureau, has issued a number of bulletins issued by the department of agriculture of particular interest in these times of war economy and for conditions are on hand and at the weather bureau. The bulletins are being distributed to all requesting them. TOTAL OF 490,297 PERSONS CAME INTO COUNTRY IN A YEAR

For 12 Months Ending June 30 Aliens Numbered 362,877, Americans 127,420.

16,028 OTHERS DEBARRED

Admissions Reached Maximum in 1907 When Number Was 1,285,349; Aliens Departing Were 66,277.

Immigrant aliens admitted to the United States during the year ending June 30, 1917, numbered 295,402. Of this number 174,477 were men and 120,925 were women. Non-immigrant aliens admitted numbered 67,474. United States citizens returning during the year were 127,420. Of the total number of immigrants seeking admission 16,028 were debarred. The grand total was 506,325.

These figures were given in the bulletin of the bureau of immigration just issued by the department of labor.

In 1917 the immigrant aliens admitted numbered 295,402, just a little more than during 1916. These figures show quite a falling off since 1907, when 1,285,349 were admitted. The decrease from then on is more or less gradual, 1916 being credited with 325,700.

The records show that 11,095 were admitted during June of this year. Non-immigrant aliens admitted during the month were 504, while 11,793 United States citizens returned. Aliens debarred numbered 699. The grand total for the month is 28,636.

Offsetting the admissions during the year, the records show that 66,277 emigrant aliens departed, while the number of departures of such aliens during June was 7463. This showing is much less than in 1916 when 129,765 emigrant aliens departed. Of the 66,277 emigrant aliens 35,367 were Europeans, 2161 were Asiatics and the remainder were natives of Africa, Australia, New Zealand, Pacific Islands, British North America, Central America, Mexico, South America, West Indies and other countries.
