

MARSHFIELD CITIZEN CONFESSES HE KILLED HIS BROTHER-IN-LAW

August Carlson Admits Shooting Edward Heinze, but Claims It Was Accidental.

MEN WERE HUNTING DEER

At Time of Tragedy Carlson Insisted He Was Not Responsible, but Finally He Recants.

Marshfield, Or., Sept. 21.—August Carlson of this city has confessed to the accidental killing of Edward Heinze, on August 12, near Allegany, when the two were hunting. He made a signed statement to Coroner Wilson and Acting District Attorney Brand and was bound over to await the action of the grand jury without bail. He is charged with accidental and involuntary manslaughter.

At the time of the shooting Carlson claimed that he had not fired his gun and that someone else must have killed his hunting companion. Coroner Wilson held a searching inquiry and it was found the bullet which killed Heinze was of an oddsize which corresponded with Carlson's gun. Still the latter protested his innocence. It appears now that Carlson refrained from confessing the truth at the time, on account of the criticism of persons in the neighborhood of the accident.

According to the confession Carlson did not mistake Heinze for a deer, but the unfortunate young man happened to get in line of Carlson's aim at a deer. Carlson gave all the

details of how, after firing, he heard Heinze scream 100 yards away and, going to him, found him shot. On securing aid Heinze was dead. He was a brother-in-law of Carlson.

The confession was made voluntarily. Carlson said he knew the consequences, but thought that he should come out with the truth. Carlson is the owner of a restaurant, has lived here for years and has a first class reputation.

Coroner Wilson asked that Carlson be turned over to his custody so he could follow his business as usual. This was granted by Justice Pennington and the coroner will be responsible for Carlson's appearance when the grand jury convenes.

Government to Help O. A. C. Military Men

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Sept. 21.—To help Oregon boys to get the special technical and military training that will make them effective workers in the art of war while the conflict lasts and in the great reconstruction era that will witness the rehabilitation of war-torn Europe, Uncle Sam has made the following offer to all who enter O. 3. Cash allowance for rations at the rate of \$9 a month to all who have had two years of military training under government supervision.

4. A chance to win one of the 10 nominations for West Point as long as the excellence of the military work gives the distinguished rating.

Accomplishment of the ex-convict's designs upon the girl was prevented by a passerby who saw him leading the girl into the rooming house, and notified the police by telephone.

The case is being investigated by Mrs. Lois G. Baldwin, head of the Women's Protective Bureau. It is expected that Perry will be returned to the penitentiary to complete his unexpired term.

Liquor Confiscated; \$250 Fine Is Levied

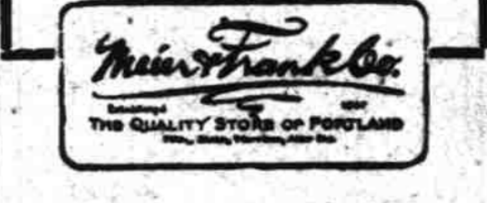
