Seebian Knitted Squares to Be Sent
Mrs. A. A. Morrison has requested the women who are knitting the 12 inch squares to turn in their work at the rectory before Thursday of next week, as the first shipment to London of the squares will be made about the first of October. Some 600 are expected to be sent from Portland. The squares are either knitted or crocheted and are sent to London, where a society of women fashion them into bed covers for the wounded soldiers' cots. All odds and ends of wool are in this way worked in regardless of color and some most fascinating designs worked out in crazy quilt fashion or set designs. Next Thursday the work that is accumulated will be on exhibition at the guild room at the Parish house. This is but the first consignment and the work will continue through the duration of the war. Much of the knitting has been done by the school children.
