GAME BIRD SHOOTING **WILL OPEN TOMORROW** FOR OREGON HUNTERS

China Pheasants Reported Plentiful in Counties Ad-Joining Multnomah.

SHOOT EARLIER ON OCT. 16

Buck Lakes of Lower Willamette ar Columbia Said to Be Pull of Quack Quack Fowl,

Tomorrow marks the opening of the pland bird and water fowl hunting season. Reports arriving from various sections state that both are plentiful this year and indications are that great numbers of shooters will take to the fields and the blinds shortly after sunrise.

Keepers at various duck lakes in the Columbia river valley say that ducks are coming in by the thousands, while reports from the Willamette state that ducks are numerous in the valley as far south as Eugene. Ringnecks Are Plentiful

China pheasants are very plentiful in counties adjoining Multnomah. In eastern Multnomah county, there are great numbers of these birds and with the passing of the law prohibiting the killing of the female pheasants there should always be an abundance of the famous game bird, which was introduced in this country by the late Judge O. N. Denny.

The season on upland birds will close October 31, except in Jackson ounty, where the season lasts but 10 days. There is no open season in the following counties: Coos, Curry and Jesephine of district No. 1, comprising all counties west of the Cascades. "Regulation No. 3 was by amended to read as follows: "Definition of Manner of Taking Birds-Migratory birds may be taker with a gun, not larger than 10 gauge fired from the shoulder, unless other specifically permitted by these regulations. They may be taken in open season with the aid of a dog the land and water, from a row boat, blind or floating device (other than an airplane, power boat or sai

regulation. "Regulation No. interior states to conform with the wildfowl seasons of these states. ead as follows:

"Shipment and Transportation Shipment and transportation of migra-tory birds, unless accompanied by the hunter, is permitted only in the case of wild birds bred in captivity, or birds taken for breeding purposes under provision made therefore, in these regulations, and may not exceed the bag limit for one day, except in the case of non-residents who may transport the bag limit for two days
