GAME BIRD SHOOTING WILL OPEN TOMORROW FOR OREGON HUNTERS

China Pheasants Reported Plentiful in Counties Adjoining Multnomah.

SHOOT EARLIER ON OCT. 16

Duck Lakes of Lower Willamette and Columbia Said to Be Full of Quack Quack Fowl.

Tomorrow marks the opening of the upland bird and water fowl hunting season. Reports arriving from various sections state that both are plentiful this year and indications are that great numbers of shooters will take to the fields and the blinds shortly after sunrise.

Shingoes Are Plentiful

China pheasants are very plentiful in counties adjoining Multnomah. In eastern Multnomah county, there are great numbers of these birds and with the passing of the late prohibitions and the opening of the game pheasants there should always be an abundance of the famous game bird, which was introduced in this country by the late Judge O. N. Dwyer.

Bag Limits for Fowl

The bag limit on China pheasants and grouse in district No. 1 is five birds in one day, and 10 in any seven consecutive days.

Before Season After October 16

Several regulations shooting will start at sunrise and close at sunset each day until October 16, when duck hunters will be allowed to start shooting at sunrise.

The Newly Made Rules

Following is the copy of the proposed regulations which are being considered by the board.

Regulation No. 3

Definition of Manner of Taking Birds—Migratory birds may be taken with a gun, net or trap, but no traps, snares or other devices.

Some Left to State Control

It was recommended to leave the use of batteries or sink boxes to state regulation. No. 5 was amended to change the shore bird season of the interior states to conform with the wildfowl seasons of these states.

Shipment and Transportation

Shipment and transportation of migratory birds, when accompanied by the hunter, is permitted only in the case of wild birds bred in captivity, or birds taken for breeding purposes.

PACE SEVEN MILES TO DECIDE SALEM WINNER IT IS COLLEGE GEN

Barnes' Stepper Shows Wonderful Stamina and Wins Last Three Heats at Fall

EVENT FULL OF SURPRISE

Lady Hal Takes Two Heats but Cannot Beat Off Winners at End—King Zolock First in 2:15 Pace.

Salem, Or., Sept. 29.—Seven were necessary to determine winner in the exciting free-for-all pace today for a purse of \$1000, and it proved grand finish for a week of good racing at the state fair. This was only one of the week which required more than three heats to pick the winner.

The race was full of surprises and was finally won by College Gent, who was closely followed by Lady Hal, the last heat American judges and draw a bulls-eye crowd to see which was in the lead. This gave College Gent first money, Lady Hal second, Hal Paxton third, and White fourth.

Winner Likes Long Route

Hal Paxton took the first heat from the hearts of the fans until the fourth heat when he displayed burst of speed that set the crowd edge and chalked up one heat for himself. College Gent, who had been out of the first heat, took the second heat, spruced up and tucked the second three heats in his stall in one-two-three order. However, he had to fight for every one of them.

Protest Made on Race

The free-for-all pace, which went split heats, is the cause of a vigorous protest on the part of the owner of the first heat, who has had to pay money if the race had ended on the fifth heat, while by going to seventh heat first money was given to College Gent.

The owner of Lady Hal bases his protest on the fact that the stake he issued by the fair board and on which Lady Hal was entered contained the rule of the American Trotting association that no race should go more than five heats and the money would be awarded on the standing at the end of the fifth heat. The fair board, Secretary Lee of the fair board said that after the stake book was issued the American Trotting association changed this rule to require a horse to win three heats to take first money and the number of heats had to be pulled. He said the new rule was followed today.

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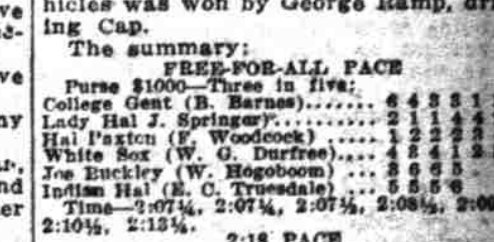
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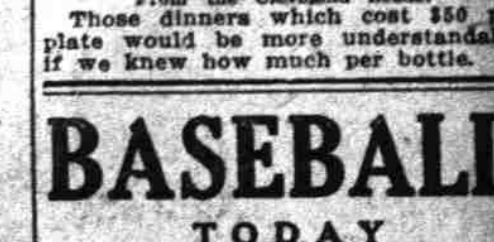
