

## OREGON'S BIT IS PUT AT \$16,500,000 IN LIBERTY LOAN DRIVE

Only Under Certain Con-  
ditions Will Larger Contri-  
bution Be Looked For.

### TERMS ARE DESCRIBED

Whole Question Hinges on Intention of  
Government Not to Turn Back  
Money Over-subscribed.

Just why there is a minimum and maximum allotment in the Liberty loan subscriptions to be raised in Oregon was explained by C. A. Miller, campaign manager for the state, in a statement compiled Saturday afternoon.

The fact that Oregon's apportionment was mentioned as being \$24,500,000, after having previously been placed at \$16,500,000, was a source of considerable comment and some discouragement to the workers.

However, if the state makes the lower figure it will be doing its share in the big drive, and only under certain conditions will the larger total be looked for.

The whole matter hinges on the intention of the government to not turn back money that is over-subscribed on the regularly authorized loan. The government is asking \$3,000,000,000 in this loan.

To Take Over-subscriptions in the full amount to \$5,000,000,000. Should the loan be so successful as to make its extension to \$5,000,000,000 feasible, then Oregon's quota will be the \$24,500,000. Mr. Miller's statement follows:

"In order that the government will not be obliged to turn back over-subscriptions to this second loan, as it did in the first loan, it is asking the people of the nation to subscribe to at least \$2,000,000,000, but it is offering to accept subscriptions up to \$5,000,000,000. In other words, the nation must have \$2,000,000,000, but will accept \$2,000,000,000 additional.

Based on Bank Deposits  
"Flourishing on the ratio of bank deposits, the state of Oregon would have to raise \$16,500,000 divided into approximately \$10,000,000 for the city of Portland and \$6,500,000 for the outside territory, in order to come up to its proportion of what the government is demanding of the whole country. I would consider this the figure which we should work for, although the amount of \$24,500,000 would put Oregon among the leaders.

"The government will accept from Oregon up to this amount, according

to our present understanding, and this is based on the ratio of bank deposits in Oregon in proportion to the bank deposits of the nation.

"The government has asked for \$210,000,000 from the twelfth district of the federal reserve bank, comprising the seven Pacific coast states, but will accept a maximum of \$250,000,000, and it is on this basis that we have worked out Oregon's minimum of \$16,500,000 and maximum of \$24,500,000."

## Youths Find Hand Under Bridge Walk

Member Seized at Wrist Picked Up  
Beneath Approach to Burnside Struc-  
ture; Empty Baby Buggy Discovered.

A woman's hand, nearly severed at the wrist, was found under the east approach of the Burnside bridge Sunday by Glen Myers and Archie Manning of 11 1/2 Union avenue. The boys reported their find to Police Sergeant Robson, who took the hand to the station, and notified the coroner.

Patrolman Simpson, at about the time of the discovery of the hand, found a baby buggy that had been standing since Friday night on the east approach of the bridge. It was thought for a time that there might be some connection between the cases, but the statement of Deputy Coroner Loyne that the hand had been preserved in formalin, gave rise to the belief that it had been dissected from a cadaver by some medical or dental student, and had nothing to do with the baby buggy.

On order from the coroner, the hand was cremated in the furnace of the engine room at police headquarters.

## School Book Supply Is Nearly Exhausted

Amsterdam, Oct. 8.—Schools without books! That is the latest thing with which Germany is threatened. According to the Vossische Zeitung, publishers of school books have been informed that they may use what stocks of paper they have for printing such volumes, but that when those supplies are exhausted no more paper may be used for this purpose.

## UNCLE SAM CURIOUS ABOUT PAISLEY PLAN OF IRRIGATION WORK

fore Extension of Time Is  
Granted on Scheme.

Salem, Or., Oct. 8.—The department of the interior has asked the state desert land board for additional information as to the water supply and feasibility of the Portland Irrigation company's Paisley irrigation project before the department grants the state's request for an extension of time for the reclamation of the lands.

This is the project consisting of 12,000 acres in Lake county, which the Chewaucah Cattle & Land company is endeavoring to throttle by taking all the water in the Chewaucah river, by carrying the matter into the courts after the state water board had adjudicated the water rights on the stream and found that, after the cattle company took ample water to serve its lands, enough would be left for the irrigation project.

The water right question is now before the state supreme court.

More Cash for Schools  
Salem, Or., Oct. 8.—J. A. Churchill, superintendent of public instruction, has received from Congress-

man Hawley a telegram announcing that congress has passed the bill authorizing the government committee on vocational education to match \$15,000 with Oregon for special vocational training in the public schools. A fund has been created by the government for assisting vocational education in all the states, but owing to a technicality Oregon and two or three other states would have been shut out this year had not a special bill been put through congress.

Free Books to Be Asked  
Salem, Or., Oct. 8.—The blank form of an initiation petition for a proposed constitutional amendment providing for free text books for all children attending day and evening elementary schools in the state has been submitted to Secretary of State Olcott for presentation to the attorney general, who is required by law to write a suitable ballot title for the proposed amendment. The proposed amendment also provides for the printing of school text books by the state printer.

Three Fatal Accidents  
Salem, Or., Oct. 8.—Three fatal accidents and 382 non-fatal were reported to the state industrial accident

commission during the past week. The victims of the fatal accidents were: Arthur Knapp, Silverton, logging; E. Couper, Scappoose, logging; C. V. Strong, Elk City, sawmill.

Of the total number reported, 299 were subject to the provisions of the compensation act, 43 were from public utility corporations, and 23 were from firms and corporations which have rejected the provisions of the act.

## TWO DEAD; SIX HURT; WOMAN WOULD CROSS IN FRONT OF TRAIN

Miss Schneider at Wheel  
Miss Schneider was driving the automobile on a road parallel to the Southern Pacific tracks, C. I. A. Busard, a friend of the family, who was in an automobile behind the Schneider car, said today he believed she did not see the train. He said she was driving a trifle ahead of the train and did not see the turn in the road that would carry them over the tracks directly in front of the train. When too late, it is believed, Miss Schneider saw the curve and turned over the tracks, hoping to pass ahead of the train.

The auto and its occupants were strewn along the tracks for a distance of 400 feet while the train was grinding into a stop. Passengers in the coaches felt the jolt of the collision and heard the cries of the injured and rushed to the assistance of the autoists.

The body of Mr. Schneider was lifted from the wreckage of the automobile and the pilot of the engine.

Mrs. Hornschuch and her two daughters were taken to Smith hos-

pital at Hillsboro, and Mr. Hornschuch was sent to Orenco. Mr. Schneider, Mrs. Schneider and Miss Schneider were taken on the train to the Good Samaritan hospital and were met at the station by ambulances of the Ambulance Service company.

Mr. Schneider is an intimate friend of the Schneider family and arrived two days ago from his home in Everett, Wash., for a visit.

Mr. Schneider was 51 years of age and a longtime resident of Portland, acquiring title to the Portland Cheese company in 1906, since which time he had met with great success.

Mr. Hornschuch was a son-in-law of Mr. Schneider and manager of the Portland branch of the company.

Mr. Schneider is survived by his wife, two daughters, Miss Louise Schneider and Mrs. Hornschuch, all three injured in the accident; a sister, Mrs. Ida Koehler of Warrenton, Or., and four brothers, Alfred Schneider of Pendleton, Arnold S. Schneider of Sauvie Island, Gottfried Schneider of Oregon City and Carl and Rudolph Schneider, living at Thirty-third street and Columbia boulevard in Portland.

Definite funeral arrangements have not been made.

## Pope Would Stop German Air Raids

Geneva, Oct. 8.—(I. N. S.)—Pausing in his peace efforts, Pope Benedict XV is now endeavoring to end air attacks against unfortified cities in which only noncombatants suffer, said a dispatch from Rome today. It is understood that representations have already been made to Berlin and Vienna with a view to stopping German raids over English and French soil and Austro-Hungarian attacks against open Italian cities. The pontiff be-

lieves if the central powers discontinue their raids the allies will not engage in reprisals.

## Mexican Vice Consul Is Taken as Slacker

New York, Oct. 8.—(I. N. S.)—Jesus Martinez, Mexican vice consul at New York city, was arrested here today on

the charge of refusing to comply with the requirements of the selective draft law.

Martinez claims exemption by being a member of the Mexican diplomatic corps. His contention is upheld by Juan P. Burns, Mexican consul general in this city.

Burns hastened to make the \$5000 bail under which United States Commissioner Hitchcock held Martinez when arraigned today. The hearing is set for next Thursday.

Under present interpretation of the

law Martinez stands in the light of a deserter and may be turned over to military authorities for court martial.
