

TEN MILLIONS PUT THEIR SAVINGS IN NATION'S KEEPING

All Classes and Ages Are on Subscription Honor List; Total Still in Doubt; Thursday to Tell Story.

Passing of Maximum Is Assured; Those Not Securing Bonds Will Be Asked to Accept Certificates.

Washington, Oct. 29.—(U. P.)—Ten million people "went over the top" to reach the \$5,000,000,000 goal of America's second Liberty loan. All classes and ages are on the subscription honor list today.

Early returns to the treasury department still leave the grand total of America's second response for dollars in doubt, but that the \$5,000,000,000 maximum has been reached by a comfortable margin is assured.

When the last coin rolls in, it is confidently believed more than twice as many people will be found to have subscribed nearly as much money as in the first loan. Thursday will tell the complete story of the loan results.

Want Loan in February.
The work of education in the first two Liberty loans is regarded by officials today as assuring certain success of future campaigns. The next loan will be floated in February, it is predicted.

Meantime, Liberty bond buyers who do not obtain their full purchases because of a scaling down due to over-subscription, will be asked to accept war savings certificates.

Frank A. Vanderlip is prepared to launch his savings campaign today. The country has been aroused by the Liberty loan drives, he believes, and will quickly snap up the certificates.

"From now on," declared a high treasury official, "work of floating bond issues will be easier. The work of education has been done. Every man and woman has come to realize how good an investment a 4 per cent United States bond is."

Interest Rate to Stand.
A higher interest rate will not be necessary for future loans, officials believe.

The New York district leads the country, with indications that its \$1,000,000,000 was oversubscribed by nearly a quarter of a billion dollars.

Chicago, Cleveland and San Francisco districts showed increasing strength in latest returns. Every one of the 12 federal reserve districts passed their minimum allotments. The over-subscriptions in the few districts which passed their high quotas bore out Secretary McAdoo's view of the loan as an "overwhelming success."

Twelfth District Did Well.
San Francisco, Oct. 29.—(U. P.)—Three hundred and ten million dollars for the Liberty loan will be the total of the Twelfth federal reserve district, James K. Lynch, governor of the federal reserve bank, predicted today. Returns continue to come in and it may be Thursday before these figures are definitely known.

California's subscription will be near the \$200,000,000 mark, it was believed today. With San Francisco contributing \$75,000,000 to the total, which was within \$500,000 of its \$29,500,000 maximum.

Newberg Is Raising Funds for Y. M. C. A.

Newberg, Or., Oct. 29.—A big drive for army Y. M. C. A. funds has begun here under the direction of R. J. Moore, manager. The minimum to be raised by Yamhill county is \$4500. The county is divided into two units, Newberg and McMinnville districts, and the work will be directed from these points.

Wilson Is Invited to Review Pathfinders

Washington, Oct. 29.—(I. N. S.)—President Wilson was today invited by Senator Baughman of Alabama to review the 30 automobiles owned by the Alabama who will spend the afternoon tomorrow on a pathfinding tour to locate the Washington-to-Atlanta section of the national highway project by the Bankhead Highway association. The route will be through Frederick, Md., Richmond, Petersburg and Greensboro to Atlanta.

Three Suspects Are Arrested at Peoria

Peoria, Oct. 29.—(I. N. S.)—Three men, believed by the police to be the trio of bandits who robbed the Calhoun State bank at Minneapolis and escaped with \$8000 October 15, are under arrest here today. They give the names of Martin J. Doud, Charles W. Ness and J. A. Mayer.

Farmer Puts \$10,000 Into Liberty Bonds

The Dalles, Oct. 29.—John Chessner, a farmer residing in the Kent district, bought \$10,000 worth of Liberty bonds last week. When purchasing the bonds he remarked that he had two brothers in the German army, a mother living in Germany and two sons who have been drafted into the national army.

Delaware Governor's Wife Dies in Wreck

Wilmington, Del., Oct. 29.—(I. N. S.)—Governor John G. Townsend Jr. was slightly injured and his wife died shortly after when their automobile upset Saturday night while running along the Dupont boulevard. Mrs. Townsend's death is believed to have been due to shock.

Dr. Earl Smith Is Appointed Coroner

County Commissioner Also Confirms Decision to Buy Uniforms for Multnomah Guards.

The board of county commissioners appointed Dr. Earl Smith county coroner this morning.

Dr. Smith is 34 years of age and a graduate of the medical department of the University of Oregon. He was a house physician at the Good Samaritan hospital for a time and for two years was assistant surgeon for the O-W. R. & N. company.

The salary of Assistant County Physician H. R. Cliff, upon written application by him, was raised from \$150 per month to \$200.

**WOMAN LEADER IN
LOAN CAMPAIGN IS
A PORTLAND VISITOR**

Mrs. George Bass Discusses Militant Suffrage; Will Speak Here Tonight.

Mrs. George Bass of Chicago, official speaker for the Women's National Liberty loan committee, with headquarters in the treasury building in Washington, D. C., arrived in Portland this morning and is at Hotel Portland.

"The four has taken me to Colorado, Wyoming, Utah and California and I was given so many opportunities to speak in California that I did not get to Oregon until today."

"The woman's committee is the only committee appointed by the department of the treasury, the men's committee being simply made up of the federal reserve banks. I do not think the women of the west quite appreciate this splendid recognition of their ability. Our function has been to use all of the women's organizations already existing in selling Liberty bonds."

The banking committee of the federal reserve has had charge of the campaign as far as banks are concerned, but the woman's committee is the link that has brought together the financial interests and the people.

"I am a member of the National American Woman's Suffrage association, which offered its services and funds to the government at the beginning of the war, and I am doing what I can on this trip in the interests of suffrage."

"The Woman's party, so called, is not made up of suffragists, but of militants, and I believe if they were not militant about suffrage they would be militant about something else. It is the only organized group in the United States actively doing something to hinder suffrage. When a committee of New York's women of all races, religions and political affiliations headed by Mrs. Frank Vanderlip, went to Washington to beg them to cease their plotting and other efforts to hamper the war policies because they were definitely and seriously injuring the New York woman suffrage campaign, the militants, of which Anna Martin, who is now in your city, was one, just laughed at us and said they were not interested in the New York campaign."

Mrs. Bass will speak this evening at 8 o'clock at Central library. The meeting is open to the public.

Helena Has Epidemic

DOLFEN BELIEVED TO HAVE ESCAPED FROM AN INTERNED VESSEL

Two Other Unnaturalized Germans Are Members of Co. C of the Third Oregon.

There are two other unnaturalized Germans in company C, Third Oregon

regiment, now on its way east. Authorities who are responsible for the arrest of William Dolfen, the company's cook, as an alleged German spy, this morning admitted this. Captain James J. Crossley, the commanding officer of the company, also admitted it just before the regiment left Portland.

One of the men holds the rank of sergeant, the highest non-commissioned post in a company. The other man is a private. So far, the authorities say, these men have given no reason for suspicion, outside of the fact that they are unnaturalized citizens serving in the United States army.

Orders Evidently Disregarded.
It is said that they enlisted in the company on unsupported claims that they were citizens, as in the case of Dolfen.

"This is more evidence that a man's past record should be looked up before he is enlisted in our army," said R. P.

Bonham, head of the immigration service. "We have no reason to doubt the loyalty of these men, but the mere fact that they are unnaturalized Germans is enough to arouse suspicion."

The enlistment of unnaturalized aliens was forbidden some time ago in orders issued by high officials of the army, it is said, but it is evident that the orders have been disregarded. Mr. Bonham says his office will take no action in regard to the two Germans now in Company C, stating that it is now up to the military authorities.

Here From Interned Ship
Dolfen, who was brought to Portland Saturday night, is being held in the county jail incommunicado. The authorities this morning admitted that they had a good deal more information concerning his actions and his associates, but refuse to make it public. This has given rise to speculation that there will be further developments.

Dolfen, before his internment, in all probability will be given a chance to explain some of his actions.

Another development today is the admission of the authorities that they have convincing evidence that he is off one of the interned German ships. Dolfen, according to witnesses, has admitted that he was a member of the crew of the giant liner Vaterland.

Statements as to his entry into the United States have been absolutely disproven by the New York office of the immigration service, declared Mr. Bonham.

Warrant Held for Months
"Accepting every bit of the evidence in his favor as true, this man had no right to be in the United States army by virtue of being an alien," Mr. Bonham said. "As a matter of fact, we have held an immigration warrant for his arrest since last March, but postponed action because of the attitude

of the officers of Company C, who said they had absolute faith in him. They insisted that he was a good soldier and a good cook and had done nothing to arouse their suspicions. Lieutenant Alexander told me the day the regiment left that he was satisfied that the man was all right."

Dolfen upon his arrival wore a heavy civilian overcoat over his uniform and a pair of work overalls. He carried a little black grip. Dolfen is short and stocky and has an unusually dark complexion. Sunday his uniform was taken from him and he was compelled to don civilian clothes.

Salem Seeks Hospital
Salem, Or., Oct. 29.—The Salem hospital association is preparing to launch a drive this week to raise \$100,000 for a new hospital building. The state has purchased a large portion of the grounds and the old building which

now answers the purpose of a hospital. The state paid \$25,000, which will be a nucleus for the campaign.

Liebes & Co. Buy \$81,050 of Bonds

The firm of H. Liebes & Co. subscribed a total of \$81,050 for Liberty loan bonds. Early last week a subscription of \$3500 was made and on Saturday afternoon John Plagemann, manager of the Portland store, received instructions to make an additional subscription of \$75,000. Employees of the store purchased bonds to the amount of \$2350.

Aside from the contributions of the Liebes company Mr. and Mrs. Plagemann each purchased \$1000 in bonds.
