

MONEY PAID BUT NO TITLE GIVEN TO LAND BUYERS

Defendants in "Canadian Conspiracy" Case Hear Testimony From Witnesses From All Parts of United States—Methods Similar.

Investments Made on Belief They Are Dealing With Government Agents and Are Thus Party to Suits Against Road to Recover.

W. F. Halliwell, Gottlieb Miller, George F. Young and W. F. Lick, real estate operators, defendants in the "Canadian conspiracy" case, on trial in the federal court here for more than a week, continued as interested onlookers at the hearing this morning while the government heaped on more evidence against them.

Peter Stole of Everett, Wash., testified that he had paid \$125 to Halliwell for a "location" on one of the big timber claims the government was releasing. He said that Halliwell told him he was personally interested in buying the timber from the lands.

Duplicate filings made by George N. Munshaw, also of Everett, said that he had given Halliwell and Lick \$130 and had been told that he was named a party in the suit by the government, then pending between the government and the railroad company for the lands. The defendants wrote to him some time after that, he testified, and told him that the government had won the suit.

Contrary to this method of inducement, Arthur N. Clarke of Walla Walla testified that after he gave \$130 to Lick, Lick, he said, informed him that the railroad company had accepted his filing. Other evidence introduced by the government showed that other "filings" had been made on the same land.

Witness Comes From Iowa. A middle westerner was the third witness for the United States this morning. Francis Beahm of Carlisle, Iowa, told how he was induced to pay the defendants \$200 a claim for two claims, one for his brother and one for himself.

J. W. McGraw, of Walla Walla, after telling the court that he had paid \$200 for a filing and had neither received land nor his money back, swore to give many of the details of the transaction. He declared, however, that the land had been represented to him as being well timbered and that he would not have to live on it to prove up his claim.

Women Employees of Road Make Flag

Service Emblem Is by 17 Feet Will Hang Across Walk at Wells Fargo Building on Sixth Street.

The O. W. R. & N. company is to have a service flag. Women employees in the Portland offices are cutting out the stars which will adorn it. The flag will be of bunting, 12 by 17 feet in dimensions and will hang across the sidewalk from the sixth street front of the Wells Fargo building.

The flag will consist of a white field 11 by 15 feet in size, surrounded by a red border two feet in depth. In the white field will be space for 400 blue stars, though at the present time only 210 will be used. Each star represents a former employee of the O. W. R. & N. company now in the military or naval service of the United States.

In the red border across the top will appear in large blue letters "O. W. R. & N." and across the bottom this legend, "A star for each employee in his country's service."

BOND FIGURES STILL COMING IN; 26 BANKS YET TO MAKE REPORT

Latest Total for Oregon Is \$25,437,250; Reports Due in San Francisco Thursday

Liberty loan subscription totals are still filtering into state headquarters, reports of one or two banks coming together, and it was still impossible for C. C. Chapman, director of publicity, at noon today to give a final estimate for the state.

The last total was compiled Monday night. The total state subscriptions were said to be \$25,437,250. Of this Portland's total was \$13,559,350, and the state outside had apparently subscribed \$11,877,900. Today's additional reports slowly added to this, and it is now thought that the exact final will be just above \$25,500,000. Seven Portland banks and 19 outside banks are still to be heard from in regard to final totals. All of these are due to be in San Francisco by Thursday morning.

Final figures late Monday from Walla Walla county show that the county made its maximum quota. The county subscribed \$328,700. This is 102 per cent of its maximum quota.

This afternoon the committees figuring in the big drive that ended last Saturday night are meeting at the Portland hotel for luncheon. Over 200 assembled in the grill room of the hotel for an experience and jubilation meeting, and plans for subsequent campaigns were informally discussed.

Portland led all other northwestern cities of the first class in bond subscription percentages. Portland, Seattle, Spokane and Tacoma all over-subscribed their minimum quotas, but Portland almost doubled the amount asked of it by the government. Portland's minimum quota was \$7,745,357, and \$13,559,350 was subscribed, or \$5,813,993 over the minimum. Seattle subscribed \$17,000,000, its minimum was \$11,333,000, and its over-subscription was \$5,667,000. Tacoma and Spokane over-subscriptions were much lower.

FISH DEALERS MAKE WAR ON CITY MARKET; INJUNCTION SOUGHT

Plaintiffs Allege Market Is Conducted in Excess of Police Power of City.

VOLUNTEERS FOR DEFENSE

Copy of Petition Served on City Attorney; Hearing Will Be Held Friday or Saturday.

The Portland fish dealers' war on the municipal fish market has been carried into the circuit court.

City Attorney W. P. LaRoche was served Monday evening with a copy of a petition filed in the circuit court asking that the city be permanently enjoined from operating a fish market. That it is in excess of the police powers of the city is the reason assigned.

The first hearing of the petition will be held either Friday or Saturday of this week, it was expected. The plaintiffs are: E. E. Russell, W. E. Karambales, Alder Market Company, Columbia Fish company, Jennie Foster, G. Covale & Co., Ben Ebbani, Ray Fairchild, J. J. Cotter, Mark Melos, Mike Budenich, Mike Ekterovich, George Planich, Sam Macklin, Ezra Meneshe and Elias Papanikos. Malarkey, Seabrook & Dibble are the attorneys for those who seek to enjoin the city.

Many Volunteers for Defense City Attorney LaRoche began this morning preparation for a vigorous defense. A number of prominent Portland attorneys will volunteer their services to help fight the case for the city, it was said, because of the element of public welfare involved.

Mayor Baker and Commissioner Dan Kellaher, under whom the market is being conducted, will be active in the rebuttal fight against the fish dealers. Included in the list of defendants are not only the mayor and commissioners, but Ivan Humason, manager of the market, Lawrence Hayes and Cal Hayes, employees there.

The city will take the position that to deny the city the right to operate the fish market is to deny the people needed food, inasmuch as before the market opened prices for fish were out of reach of many, despite the abundance of the supply. That the war has created an emergency fully justifying the city in this particular service to its people will be asserted, it is said. It is also asserted that the federal food administrator for Oregon will cooperate with the city in defending the injunction suit, as he has taken a strong position in favor of the market, not only because it has permitted people to get abundant sea food at low prices, but has released more expensive meats as food for the soldiers.

City to Enlarge Market. The action on the part of the fish dealers comes at a time when the city is preparing to move the market into modern quarters at Third and Yamhill streets, where a store and adjoining rooms have been leased and equipped with everything necessary to serve fish promptly and at low prices. The city also plans to build a market or in the act of preparing fish so that Portland may really learn how to eat food from the sea and the rivers. At the same time the buying radius is being extended, so that fishermen may supply the city direct. T. A. McNally, for instance, who complained that the fishmongers refused to buy salmon caught at the mouth of the Siletz, because he had previously sold part of a catch to an independent buyer, has been notified that the city will buy 1000 pounds of salmon a day from him.

Authorities Await Federal Disposition of William Dolfen

Cook Formerly With Third Oregon Held, in Jail, Under Charge of Being Enemy.

Federal authorities here expect instructions shortly for disposition of William Dolfen, cook of Covant, C. Third Oregon, who was arrested on the troop train en route to an eastern training camp, on charges of being an alien enemy.

Although there is some likelihood that Dolfen may be turned over to military authorities for court martial, federal officers say, it is expected that he will be interned at Fort Douglas, Utah. Wherever he is sent, however, he will be taken directly from the Multnomah county jail where he has been confined since his arrest and arrival in Portland.

It has been stated that he will not be taken to Vancouver barracks to be held there awaiting internment as have other war prisoners.

Gong Woo on Trial

Gong Woo, accused of murdering Chin Hong, June 2, is on trial before Circuit Judge Ga. He is the first of 22 Suez Sing tongmen to be tried under the blanket indictment found by the grand jury.

Gymnasium Classes Adopt Military Plan

Men at Reed College Are Put Through Squad Movements Before Indulging in Games; Appointments Are Made.

The men's gymnasium classes at Reed college are being carried on in a military style by way of experiment. The men are required to "fall in" in their proper squads while the corporals give their reports. The company then goes through the squad movements, after which games are played.

Appointments were made today for different positions. Mr. Prindler, chief staff, Arthur House, senior staff captain; Read Ellsworth, junior staff captain; Lloyd Haberly and Dale Hinkle, staff lieutenants; Colman and Rowan, Wheeland, staff sergeants. In Company A, George Henny and Verner Ruedy are sergeants, Bill Godskesen, Roger Chute and Leon Goldsmith, corporals; Herbert Huff and Frank Forrester, lance corporals. In Company B, Walter Nicol and Carl Wilson are sergeants, Homer Eberich, Leth Johnson and Harvey Eagleston, corporals; Harry Seltzer, lance corporal. Those unattached to any company are Bruce Buehler, Mark Wilson, Ray Wilson, corporals, and Maurice Fowler, musician. Of the rest of the 100 men, 30 are first class privates.

DEPENDENT WIVES OF SOLDIERS TO RECEIVE EXTRA ALLOWANCES

Women to Get \$30 Monthly; Additional Sum Due Where Children Are Concerned.

An additional allowance besides the allotment of \$15 a month from her husband's pay will be received by the dependent wife of a soldier during his absence in service.

This was explained Monday by Acting Adjutant General John M. Williams.

In addition to the wife's \$15 a month allotment, which is compulsory if she claims dependency, she will receive another \$15 from the government, if there is a wife and one child they will be paid \$15 a month, wife and two children \$22.50 and \$30 a month for each additional child.

If a soldier's children are dependent on him and there be no wife the children will receive compensation at the following rates: One child, \$5; two children, \$12.50; three children, \$20; four children, \$30; with \$5 a month additional for each additional child.

Parents, grandchild, brothers and sisters dependent of soldiers will also be provided for. Ten dollars a month will be paid to one parent, if dependent, and \$20 for two.

Each grandchild, brother and sister will be given \$5 a month if they prove claim of dependency. Compensation in case of death or disability has been provided for also, but details have not been received by the acting adjutant general, who announces that further information sought along this line should be directed to the bureau of war risk insurance, division of naval and military insurance, treasury department, in Washington.

Suffrage Picketer Will Give Address

Miss Anne Martin of Nevada, vice chairman of the National Woman's party and chairman of the legislative committee at Washington, is here on a speaking trip to the suffrage states to urge the immediate passage of the national woman suffrage amendment.

The plan is to urge all women to telegraph or write to President Wilson, urging him to recommend the passage of the suffrage amendment as a war measure, in his coming message to congress.

According to Miss Martin, the last congress passed a number of war measures which vitally affect the lives of women as well as men. She says that "women everywhere must feel that if the government can conscript their sons by national act, women should be enfranchised by national act."

Miss Martin will speak at the Central library tonight. Her subject will be "The Power of the President."

Miss Martin was arrested last July for picketing on the White House grounds at Washington. She served three days in jail.

Multnomah Bar to Meet This Evening

Kavanaugh have been appointed to draft suitable resolutions of respect and arrange for a special car for the trip to the capital.

With the thousands of veterans expected will come many friends and relatives.

MANUFACTURERS ARE SPECIAL GUESTS AT SUCCESSFUL DINNER

Home Industry League Plays Part of Host to Local and Outside Business Men.

CONDITIONS DISCUSSED

Governor Withycombe, Mayor Baker and Other Leaders Among Those Who Delivered Addresses.

In the neighborhood of 250 manufacturers and about 20 "outsiders" dined at the Chamber of Commerce, Monday evening. The dinner was given by the Home Industry league, of which A. G. Clark is manager, and was pronounced the most successful of any effort of the kind yet made by that organization.

A. J. Bale, manager of the Pacific Coast Biscuit company, was chairman of the evening, and among the speakers were Governor Withycombe, H. L. Corbett, president of the Chamber of Commerce, Mayor George L. Baker, Colonel D. M. Dunne, E. B. MacNaughton, architect; Frank D. Sherwood, a Ralhier merchant; W. D. Roberts and Frank L. McGulrie.

Governor Withycombe reviewed the manufacturing opportunities of Portland and the state; the plethora of native material in Oregon forests and mines and the undeveloped energy of her streams, as well as the riches of her ranges and farms.

Mayor Baker referred to the time, 21 years ago, when the manufacturers had a strong organization, and from it sprung the commodious exposition building at Nineteenth and Washington streets, where was held each fall a 30-day exhibition of Oregon's industries and manufactures. "For some reason, however, the organization went to pieces," he said, "and now the Home Industry league appears to have arisen from the ashes of its almost forgotten past."

The mayor paid a compliment to the energy and alertness of A. G. Clark, manager of the league, declaring him one of the most industrious men he ever knew. How the former organization came to die the mayor did not know.

When called on to tell those present about the coming land products digested long enough to be strenuously declared: "I can tell you how it happened that the old manufacturers' organization went to pieces. It died because the people would not buy the things the local industries produced. They were practically starved to death."

Fund May Be Created Henry L. Corbett stated, for the encouragement of those who might be interested, that the establishment of a fund from which financial aid may be extended to worthy manufacturing enterprises is being discussed by the chamber, and may ultimately develop into a substantial benefit of those requiring some assistance.

E. B. MacNaughton explained the difficulties experienced by some industries in securing money to assist them in becoming firmly established. It is because they have not kept in close touch with the details of their business, and when pinned down to facts and figures could not specifically state whether they were making or losing money. Deterioration of their plant would not be considered, and their books would be in such shape as to require the attention of an expert accountant.

W. B. Roblin, president of the Greater Portland association, told how he came to Portland to take charge of a losing business, and how, by the judicious use of printers' ink, he turned the tide and the concern now pays handsome profits.

More Publicity Needed Frank H. Sherwood of Sherwood & Clark, merchants of Rainier, stated that when his firm was established it endeavored to feature Oregon-made goods, and 75 per cent of its purchases was from Oregon manufacturers. Today about 30 per cent of its

merchandise is of that character. He stated that his firm found Oregon manufacturers absolutely honest and their products superior to imported articles, but they were not known.

Buyers would demand eastern made goods because they had read of them in the newspapers or magazines, whereas the Oregon article never before had been called to their attention. The store had stocked up on Portland made stoves, for example, but patrons knew nothing about them and would insist on other makes of which they had read. The Portland make stove, he declared, was superior to those imported from the east, but because their merit was unknown they would not sell.

Mrs. G. J. Frankel, president of the Women's Cooperative league, spoke interestingly of the work of that organization and the desire of its members to further the interests of Oregon manufacturers.

League Helps Industries Chairman Bale explained that the Home Industry league is not organized to originate new manufacturing enterprises, but to benefit those now in existence.

Manager Clark urged all manufacturers to unite with the league and then use it to help extend their business. He deplored, however, the fact that there are those at the head of local industry who appear to imagine they should get on the industrial wagon and ride, with the other fellow in the harness and doing all the pulling.

A colloquy between two young men, one a manufacturer and the other a newspaper man, relative to advertising methods afforded considerable amusement to those who heard them. The manufacturer had spent \$1700 in a year in advertising with indifferent results, but the money had gone into "big space for little money," irrespective of its circulation or character.
