

SPLIT SPRUCE AND TAKE USABLE PART IS PROPOSED PLAN

Scheme Suggested by Mrs. Eunice Evans Will Win War, Says Hugh Henry of Forest Fire Association.

Governor Withycombe Authorized to Offer Services of Timber Operators to Country in Emergency.

That the government has formulated a plan by which it is confident spruce production for military airplanes can be satisfactorily speeded up, was the most significant announcement made by the conference of prominent Oregon and Washington spruce operators in Portland at the Imperial hotel Tuesday afternoon.

The announcement was made by John P. Keating, manager of the Aircraft Production bureau established in Portland. The plan will be operating within 90 days, he said.

The conference was called by Adjutant General Williams who presented a plan for splitting spruce and bringing from the forest only the portions suitable for airplanes. This plan was prepared by Mrs. Eunice Evans of the intelligence division of the adjutant general's office.

The upshot of the conference was a unanimous vote empowering Governor Withycombe to represent the operators and officials present in offering their services to the government in any emergency measures, even of an emergency character, to get out the spruce needed by the government in airplane construction.

"This plan will win the war," commented Hugh Henry, manager of the Oregon Forest Fire association, who made the motion placing further procedure in the hands of the government. Mr. Henry presented figures to show that the work of 6000 men engaged in the ordinary lumbering and milling operations would not exceed in results the work of 300 experienced men sent into the forest to split spruce logs and bring out only the portions suitable for airplanes.

Finns Could Be Put to Work
John Pearson, veteran timber operator, declared that there are 6000 to 7000 Finlanders engaged in fishing near Astoria who possess the experience necessary properly to split spruce logs and he predicted all would respond to the call of the governor or the government.

O. K. Jeffery, head of the Jeffery Airplane company, Portland, said that so rigid is government inspection that to get the 167 feet of spruce, board measure, needed in the construction of an airplane, at least 1000 feet must be cut. After the conference, L. J. Ben Hayton, manager, and J. A. Gravley, superintendent of the Jeffery company, showed the visiting operators the airplane factory, which has just been completed at East Thirty-third and Broadway.

Speaks Before Ad Club
"It is up to every American to sacrifice and serve to any extent necessary that the Stars and Stripes may wave triumphant—over the city of Berlin," declared Vice President Marshall, concluding his address under Ad club auspices at the Chamber of Commerce this afternoon. A tumult of cheers broke out from the 550 business men present.

"I want to express in behalf of my chief, whom I serve, the heartfelt appreciation of the administration for the unflinching loyalty and steadfast patriotism of Oregon," was another of his expressions.

In jocular vein he commented on the Oregon system of government. "I expect Oregon," he said, "to do everything exactly opposite to what it would be done anywhere else on earth."

Concert Is First

Deprecating the warmth of introduction by A. F. Fiegl, Marshall said: "Indiana has produced more first class second grade men than any other state in the Union."

Vice President Marshall is to speak tonight at the Armory on "War's Tendencies." He speaks under the auspices of the Girls' Honor Guard, and the proceeds are to be applied for the benefit of unfortunate children in Portland. Miss Ailsa MacMaster and Miss Patsy Stewart were at the Union station this morning on behalf of the Honor Guard to welcome Mr. and Mrs. Marshall when they arrived.

Reception Very Informal
The vice president was the guest of the Ad club at a noon luncheon in the Chamber of Commerce, and S. C. Bratton, president of the club, was chairman of the reception committee. Other members of the committee were M. A. Miller, collector of internal revenue; United States Marshal G. F. Alexander, Postmaster F. S. Myers; Collector of Customs Moore; John T. Dougal, R. H. Atkinson, Dr. C. J. Smith, and others.

W. J. Kinney and his family of Vancouver, old friends of the Marshalls, are to be hosts to the vice president and his wife, at dinner this evening and Mr. Kinney and P. A. Swan of Vancouver, were at the train. The reception was most informal. Senator Chamberlain, Governor Withycombe and Mayor Baker did not appear. The entire party was taken at once to the Multnomah hotel, where the public reception is being held.

Judge C. C. Gall, 85, Dies at Gold Hill
Gold Hill, Or., Nov. 7.—Judge C. C. Gall died at Gold Hill Monday at the age of 85 and was buried Tuesday in Sams valley. Judge Gall was one of the best known and early pioneers of Jackson county and settled near Gold Hill in 1852.

He was a native of Missouri of Virginia stock. Gall's creek, a tributary of the Rogue river, is named after him.

BENJAMIN F. ALLEN, PIONEER CAPITALIST AND STOCKMAN, DIES

Former Head of Prineville National Came to Oregon in 1868; Children Survive.

Benjamin F. Allen died at his home, 256 Thirteenth street, this morning at the age of 84. He was one of the best known stockmen and pioneers of central Oregon and for many years was interested in the Prineville First National bank as a stockholder, director and president.

Mr. Allen came to Oregon with his family around the Horn in 1868 in a sailing vessel and settled first near Halsey, Or. Afterwards he went to Crook county and became one of the most successful stockmen in the state. His investments were large and property holdings extensive. He held out his interests in the Prineville bank last June.

Mr. Allen was married in Coburg, Knox county, Ill., December 7, 1854. His wife, Mrs. Matilda Allen, died in this city six years ago. Surviving him is one son, Alfred Allen, of this city, and four daughters. There are 15 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren. Mr. Allen was a member of Prineville Lodge, A. F. and A. M. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Daniel P. Clark
The funeral of Daniel P. Clark, electric lineman, killed Monday by falling from a tree, will be under the auspices of the Electrical Union No. 125, of which he was a member. Mr. Clark was 40 years of age and had been employed by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company for 18 years. The funeral will be held at the chapel of P. S. Dunning, 414 East Alder street, Thursday at 1:30 p. m. and the body will be cremated. Mr. Clark is survived by his widow and

two children; his mother, three brothers and four sisters.

Sam Schuppach
Sam Schuppach, aged 37, a native of Ohio, died at the Good Samaritan hospital following an operation, Monday. The funeral will be held from the Skewes chapel, Third and Clay streets, Thursday, at 2 p. m., under auspices of the Portland Gravel Verein, of which he is a member. Interment will be in Rose City cemetery. Mr. Schuppach came to Portland in 1904 and engaged in the butcher business. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Sarah Schuppach, and two daughters.
