

### ADDED WAR REVENUES MAY BE SECURED; TAX SCHEMES DISCUSSED

Nation May Levy on Fortunes of Expatriates and Upon Land Held in Idleness.

### COAL BARONS TARGETS

Congressmen See Way to Increase Production of Fuel and Also to Swell War Fund.

Washington, Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—At least two new plans of taxation are being considered by members of the house ways and means committee. When they return for the regular session of the Sixty-fifth congress and resume the enormous task of raising some funds for two years of war, they may be ready to incorporate these two ideas:

Heavy taxation on the fortunes of expatriates.

Taxation on speculative holdings of productive property.

The first plan was briefly considered at the last session, and is to be thoroughly investigated at the coming session.

### Expatriates Are Hit

Some of the biggest American fortunes are held by heiresses who have married foreign noblemen and live in Europe. In many cases these heiresses married into German or Austrian families, and the central powers are now, indirectly, benefitting by American wealth.

The second plan has been discussed by individual members of the committee, but no action has been taken on it. In December definite figures are to be placed before the committee to show how much revenue can be produced from productive property now held as investment.

Coal Land Is Target

Only a little more than half of the country's 112,000,000 acres of coal land is being mined, the committee will be told. The rest is being held for speculative purposes. It is taxed only as ordinary land is taxed. Meanwhile, the country is clamoring for coal. By taxing this unworked coal land at or near its potential coal mine value, instead of at its mere land value, congress not only could provide a great source of revenue, but might induce the working of the land.

Opposition is expected on both sides. Expatriates have already protested against being hard hit because no government considers the imposts laid by any other. In the case of Mr. Astor, who pays two sets of taxes on one great holding of property, nothing was done to relieve him.

### U. S. to Take Part In New War Council

London, Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—The inter-allied war council, which is to sit regularly at Versailles, will have representation from the United States, Foreign Minister Balfour announced today. The meetings will be held monthly or oftener, if necessary, and the closest unity of action will result.

### Alaska Delegate Alleges Monopoly

Washington, Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—James Wickersham, Alaska delegate in congress, moved for a hearing of the famous Alaska investigation before the interstate commerce commission Monday afternoon, insisting that monopolistic control of Alaska resources was leading to discrimination against the railroads in favor of steamship lines.

### NORTH AMERICA ABLE TO WIN THIS WAR BY FURNISHING THE FOOD

Canadian Food Controller Says Big Problem Is Up to People of This Country.

Washington, Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—It is up to the people of North America to win the war. They can do it by providing food in greater quantities for the people of all the allied countries, according to W. J. Hanna, food controller of Canada, in a message received by the United States food administration Monday.

"Reports of the crops of France and Italy show that we shall be called upon to strain every effort and to conserve every ounce of food to make up the shortage of our allies," Mr. Hanna declared.

"Temporarily disaster has overtaken the Italian army and it will be necessary to support them to the utmost by rushing food shipments. The requirements of Great Britain will be much larger than they were last year."

"We must also insure the women and children of France against terrible suffering and make certain that the allied cause will not be weakened by shortage of essential food supplies."

### Piez Takes Control Of U.S. Shipbuilding

Washington, Nov. 12.—Rear Admiral W. L. Capps Monday ceased to be the head of the emergency fleet corporation. He retains the title of general manager, but the actual control was taken over by Charles Piez of Chicago, recently elected vice president of the corporation. The full authority and responsibility of the construction of America's great merchant fleet was placed in the hands of Piez. It was explained that the change was made for the sake of efficiency at the request of Admiral Capps.

### CHINESE GOVERNMENT FORMALLY OBJECTS TO LANSING-ISHII PACT

Japanese-American Agreement Opposed Because Peking Was Not Consulted

Washington, Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—China Monday lodged formal protest with the state department against the action of this government in concluding the Lansing-Ishii agreement.

The protest, as cabled from Peking, was presented by Dr. Y. K. Wellington Koo, the Chinese minister. It is understood to be based principally upon the action of the United States and Japan in concluding an agreement which vitally affects China without consulting the Chinese government.

The understanding here is that the protest takes the form of a joint note to the United States and Japan, although this was not confirmed officially.

The text of the protest was withheld from publication by the Chinese legation. It was explained that this, properly, would have to be given out by the state department.

At the state department no comment was made. Earlier in the day it had been said that this government was without knowledge of any displeasure that China might feel because of the agreement.

China's action was practically forced, it is said, by the character of the press criticism against the government. This stirred the popular disapproval of the action of the United States and Japan.

The popular view in China, according to dispatches received here, is that even in ordinary circumstances, China was entitled to notification of what was going on in the foreign offices in Washington and Tokio, since China was so vitally affected.

### Advisor for China Named

Washington, Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—William C. Dennis, a prominent Washington attorney, who was assistant solicitor of the state department during the Taft administration, has been appointed a legal advisor to China.

### Traitors to Russia Tried to Aid Enemy

Naval Lieutenant on Way to Washington Tells Fate of Fort Zereh at Hands of Maximalists.

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—Maximalists in Russia attempted to deliver Fort Zereh to the Germans and annihilated the loyal garrison there when the Russians entered the Gulf of Riga after the fall of the City of Riga, according to Lieutenant G. Lordkipanidze of the Russian navy, who arrived here Monday with a brother officer, en route to Washington, Zereh, practically impregnable, was found deserted by the Maximalists and ready for German occupation when the Russian ordkipanidze arrived with a force of seamen. Knowing they could not hold the fortress, they destroyed it and escaped. Their fragments of Maximalists had wiped out the garrison.

The Russian fleet escaped the Germans, the lieutenant said, when the Russians sank the battleship Slava in the entrance to Moon Sound, preventing the Germans entering the Gulf of Riga and allowing the Russian fleet to make its way into the Baltic practically un molested.

### Portland Woman Has 3 Months in Prison

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—Mrs. Lucille Dahlen, found guilty last Friday by a jury in United States Judge Van Fleet's court of selling liquor to soldiers, was Monday sentenced to three months in the county jail and a fine of \$250.

The jury had recommended extreme leniency. In sentencing the woman, Judge Van Fleet said he could see no reason for the jury's recommendation.

Mrs. Dahlen was arrested at a local hotel the day after she arrived here from Portland. She is 24 years old.

### Cars Are Ordered To Texas 'Dry Zone'

San Angelo Texas, Nov. 12.—(U. P.)—The car service committee Monday commandeered 3500 cattle cars in eastern and middle western sections of the United States for immediate movement to the drought stricken area of west Texas, according to advices received here. According to cattlemen's estimates, it will take 6000 cars to move the cattle of the "dry zone" to other ranges.

### Cottonseed Cake Seized.

Houston, Texas, Nov. 12.—(U. P.)—Twenty thousand tons of cottonseed cake stored at Galveston and Port Arthur, owned by neutral nations, were seized Monday by the government. It became known here today, when it was announced that the cake will be shipped here for crushing and then shipped to the drought stricken regions of west Texas to feed cattle.

### I. C. C. Rate Hearing Opens in Chicago

Chicago, No. 12.—(U. P.)—Representatives of transcontinental railroads gathered in Chicago Monday to bring evidence before a representative of the interstate commerce commission in an attempt to justify their application for authority to file tariffs containing increased rates to the Pacific coast and certain intermediate points.

The hearing, begun in New York last week and concluded in Portland, Or., beginning November 21, is being conducted by Henry Thurlitt, attorney examiner of Washington, D. C.

Miners Meet in Kansas City  
Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—The conference of miners from Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas, called for the purpose of taking action against the proposed "consent clause" which Dr. Harry A. Garfield, national fuel administrator, insists must be written into the contract recently drafted by miners and operators, convened here this morning with Alexander Howat, president of the Kansas miners, presiding.
