Portland Study Club Holds Guest Day

Mrs. Eva Emery Dye of Oregon City Is Guest of Honor at Large Gathering

MONDAY was guest day at the Portland Study club and a large and delightful meeting was held at the home of Mrs. Richard Elmer Gehl in Rose City Park with about 50 in attendance. Mrs. F. O. Seaton, the president, presided. The business of the afternoon was suspended and the entire time was given to the guest and speaker, Mrs. Eva Emery Dye of Oregon City, well known pioneer woman and author of several books on pioneer days of the northwest.

Mrs. Dye had been asked to speak on Oregon history, but instead of dwelling on the past, she directed her words to Oregon history in the making and declared that important Oregon history is being made every day, with our young men leaving their homes to do their share in the great world. She urged the women to do all that lies within their power in aiding the soldiers, in knitting and doing Red Cross work, giving as examples the lives of labor and self sacrifice which the French women are now leading. She suggested the making of scrap books concerning the world war and Oregon's share in it, these to be passed down to the next generations or given to the Historical society. At the close of her address Mrs. Dye graciously answered a number of questions. She was presented with a beautiful bouquet of gold chrysanthemums. The afternoon closed with the serving of tea. The rooms were tastefully adorned with chrysanthemums and autumn foliage.

The Wednesday Study club of Medford met November 7 at the library with 19 officers and members present. During the business session, with Mrs. Hollis, president, in the chair, it was decided to extend an invitation to Dr. Rebec to lecture under the auspices of the club on "Russian Literature," the date to be decided later. Household Hints

Kitchen Windows.—"When we build," said Jean, "there is one thing that I am especially anxious to have; that is broad windows above the kitchen sink, and a good view from those windows."
