How to Send Parcels to France

There are two ways to get Christmas presents to the American troops in France. The postoffice department will take Christmas presents up to seven pounds in weight when they have been inspected by the postmaster and certified to contain no dangerous or other prohibited articles.

In addition to the postal service the war department will take Christmas boxes weighing up to 20 pounds if they are packed in strong wooden boxes not to exceed two cubic feet in volume, well strapped and with a hinge or screw top, so that they can be easily examined by the military authorities.
