

NO RELIEF IS IN SIGHT FOR BEND'S MILLMEN AS TO CAR SHORTAGE

Lumber Plants Curtail Output;
Commercial Club Condemns
Federal Traffic Order.

Bend, Or., Nov. 29.—No hope exists for remedying the car shortage in central Oregon, according to J. P. Keyes, general manager of the Brooks-Scanlan Lumber company, who returned Wednesday from Portland, where he conferred with railroad officials in regard to the situation.

Because of the impossibility of shipping more than one-fifth of the local mill product, Bend lumber plants are letting off men, particularly in the departments handling finished lumber. Cutting will continue as usual.

The Bend Commercial club has passed resolutions condemning the orders diverting cars from the S. P. & S. to the Southern Pacific.

Booze Owner Fined
Bend, Or., Nov. 29.—Pleading guilty to the charge of violating the prohibition law, Cecil Heath of this city, was fined \$100 in justice court Wednesday. He admitted the ownership of five quarts of whiskey found two weeks ago in the basement of his father's second hand store on Sheriff S. C. Roberts and District Attorney H. H. Deardorff. He refused to tell where he had procured the liquor.
