bank said today: "In June of this year congress amended the federal reserve act so that state banks may now be admitted to membership and retain all the rights and privileges granted them under their respective state charters. "In October the president appealed to the state banks of the United States, eligible to membership, to join the federal reserve system, thereby adding to the gold reserve of the country the strength of more than \$000 state banks. 
