The shipment coming for Balfour, Guthrie & Co. The Forest Home sailed from Australia on September 18.

During the season of 1914-1915 and 1915-1916 Portland shipped wheat to Australia. Records at the Merchants' Exchange showing that \$5,000,606 bushwere shipped the first season and 1.081.374 bushels in 1915-1916. But this was when Australia was unusually short, bad crops previously having re-The year just before the war broke

out there was a good crop, but there was no tonnage with which to ship It is said that now the crop of two seasons have accumulated at Australian terminals. In view of the scarcity of tonnage and also the great distance to Europe, Australian importers figured that it would be practical to ship their grain to the Pacific coast for milling and trans-shipment. 
