are being lined up three versts distant from the Cossack front. (Three versts is slightly under two miles.) Ukrainan leaders not only demanded full recognition of a republic of Ukrain by the Bolsheviki, with full rights and non interference from Petrograd, but also Ukrainan right to management of the Ukrainan, southwestern and Roumanian fronts, participation in all peace

Among the last named measures, the Ukrainans insisted that the federal government not allow the transport of food before payment of two thirds in paper money and a third in gold. Much casual fighting was reported from the south between Bolsheviki and Ukrainan irregular forces.
