Suffragette Leader Loses Damage Suit

New York, Dec. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, well known suffragist and head of the national woman suffrage party, Friday lost her appeal in a \$25,000 suit instituted against the Lehigh Valley railroad for injuries sustained in 1914, while stepping from a train in Jersey City. The appellate division of the supreme court handed down a decision affirming the finding of the lower court. Dr. Shaw was with Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt when the accident occurred. She was prevented from filing a lecture tour, she claimed.

Federal Education Agents Are Coming

They Will Address Members of Oregon State Teachers' Association Next Friday at Convention on Training.

Salem, Or., Dec. 21.—Ben W. Johnson, federal agent for industrial education, and W. G. Hummel, federal agent for agricultural education, will be in Portland next week and at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon will address the State Teachers' association in the auditorium of Lincoln high school. Word that the men would visit Portland was received by J. A. Churchill, superintendent of public instruction, Friday, and he took the matter up with the secretary of the teachers' association and arranged for them to have a place on the program. The speakers will explain fully to the teachers of Oregon the subject of vocational education as it pertains to the administration of the Smith-Hughes law, not only in Oregon but in other states," said Mr. Churchill. "The whole trend of secondary education may be changed through the plan worked out in the various states for the administration of the Smith-Hughes law, and every teacher should be informed as to the progress of the work thus far." The Smith-Hughes law provides federal funds for use in cooperation with the various states in training teachers for vocational instruction and in maintaining vocational instruction in high schools.
