

SCHULENBERG AND MME. "H" VISITED MOUNTAIN CAMP

Miner Held in Connection With Murder of Friend of Alleged Spies Talks.

BOTH FREQUENTLY SEEN Plan by Prisoner, Resident of Sierra Madre Camp, to Extort Money Is Suspected.

Los Angeles, Dec. 28.—(I. N. S.)—That Franz Schulerberg, alleged German master spy now under arrest in San Francisco, and "H," his mysterious woman mentor, were both frequent visitors to the murder cabin high up in the Sierra Madre mountains where the body of Hermann Jakschick, alias Herman Miller, was found riddled with bullets, was the statement in the county jail here today of John K. Knox, miner and mining camp proprietor, arrested in connection with Miller's death.

Knox, under questioning, declared he used to "pack" for Schulerberg over the mountain trails to the cabin of Miller at Camp Bosta.

He said a woman answering the description of the mysterious Mme. "H" was a frequent visitor to the mining camp and that in September he saw her there with Schulerberg.

Packed for Schulerberg Knox was arrested by Deputy Sheriffs Fox and Nolan after a dangerous 24-hour trip over narrow mountain trails. In jail here he was at first sullen and refused to talk. He would throw no light on the finding in Miller's cabin of a large quantity of dynamite and mysterious tools.

Questioned this morning, he said: "Yes, I met Schulerberg several times and used to pack for him over the trails to the cabin of Miller at Camp Bosta."

"I met him early in the summer while returning to the camp from Camp Baldy, J. E. Dalton, a forest ranger, had stopped the big machine Schulerberg used to drive up the canyon as far as the road went."

Met "H" in September "It was making for the trail with my burro. I stopped and spoke to Joe. I heard him ask Schulerberg something about a paper. Then my burro started on ahead and I went after it."

"After that I met Schulerberg many times. He got me to pack for him across the trail. He always stayed at Miller's cabin."

When asked if he ever had seen a woman with Schulerberg, Knox replied she was a familiar sight at the mountain mining camp.

"The first time I saw her, it seems to me, was in September," he said. "I was going along the trail with my burro when I met her. She was with Schulerberg. She was a pretty woman and I remember she spoke German to Schulerberg. That made me think she was a foreigner."

"As they passed me, Schulerberg stopped me. He wanted me to do some packing."

Extortion Plan Suspected "After that I saw her several times. She was a good talker and knew how to make all the miners like her. I remember seeing her and Schulerberg in that big car of his one time at the Oakes."

Knox was believed by Deputies Fox and Nolan to have learned of the German activities that centered in the little mountain cabin.

They were working on the theory that the miner, known throughout the camp as a "bad man," had attempted to extort money from the alleged agents of Wilhelmstrasse.

That Miller and Knox fought a furious revolver battle just outside the cabin was indicated by the condition of the prisoner and by the body of Miller.

Knox was shot through the left hand. Another bullet, apparently from the gun of Miller, had clipped off a portion of his left ear. Miller was shot three times, through the abdomen, through the neck and in the head.

Spy Leader Nearing Arrest San Francisco, Dec. 28.—(U. P.)—"H," the mysterious woman master spy, who has directed for a year the operations of the Kaiser's secret agents in this country, may be placed under arrest in a few days.

While federal agents and army intelligence officers were silent regarding the prospect of her apprehension, press dispatches from Los Angeles reported that federal officials there had received information indicating that the woman is still in hiding there. Los Angeles police are declared to be aiding the government agents in throwing a net around the city in an effort to apprehend the woman.

Meanwhile army intelligence officers

continued their examination of the papers of Franz Schulerberg, German agent, whose arrest and admission have laid bare the direction of the German spy ring by the mysterious woman agent.

It is understood that a woman who is suspected of being the mysterious "H" has been under surveillance for two weeks and that her arrest only awaits the obtaining of more positive evidence connecting her with the machinations of the Wilhelmstrasse spy ring.

The reports regarding her presence in Los Angeles have not been confirmed. It is believed that when she is taken

into custody, Uncle Sam will have dealt the German secret organization the hardest blow it has sustained since the opening of the war. They do not doubt that she has been the brains behind the whole German movement of German plotters and it is pointed out that the fact that she showed no traces of German origin in her speech enabled her to move about freely and to carry on her work without hindrance. Whether Schulerberg, in his admission to army intelligence officers, has given a clue to her identity is unknown.

Frigid Cold Braved In Order to Enlist

Seattle, Dec. 28.—(I. N. S.)—George L. and Ralph Keys, brothers, are here today after braving the dangers of the Fairbanks-Vaides trail in Alaska with the temperature 50 to 60 degrees below zero, to offer their services to the government. But they have discovered they should have obtained a release from their local exemption board before the

government will accept them. Telegrams have been sent to Alaska and Washington in an effort to obtain permission to accept the boys either in the army or navy.
