

SHAKEUP IN WAR MANAGEMENT IS SENATE DEMAND

Chamberlain Starts Ball Rolling by His Bill to Rip Away Red Tape That Is Clogging Wheels

ADMINISTRATION IS SILENT

Early Passage of Measure Is Predicted Unless Wilson Voices Opposition to New Cabinet Man

Washington, Jan. 5.—(I. N. S.)—The general demand for a shake-up and general reconstruction of the war management assumed formidable proportions today. In both houses of congress the insistence on action was becoming increasingly formidable.

Red tape, senators and representatives declare, has taken an unwarranted toll in human lives. And the demand for immediate and complete reform in the war department was general. It centered in the administration party where senators, entirely absolving President Wilson from all responsibility, declared the entire war department structure must be reorganized at once.

Chamberlain Wants Action

The movement centered its strength upon the bill introduced Friday by Senator Chamberlain of Oregon. Designated member of the senate military affairs committee, ripping away the red tape entanglements now clogging governmental efficiency and establishing a department of munitions to take over the whole task of supplying America's fighting forces with adequate supplies and materials.

The Chamberlain bill will have the support of substantially the 11 members of the committee and the solid Republican vote in the senate. There is a strong sentiment for the measure in the house. Only a direct protest from the White House will block its passage, is the opinion of its supporters today. Announcement of the president's attitude toward the measure is being waited with eagerness by both sides. Senator Chamberlain with the backing of his committee, planned to push the bill to an early vote, without awaiting an expression from the president, but it was admitted that opposition to the chief executive to the addition of a secretary of munitions to his cabinet would materially alter circumstances.

Coordination Is Demanded

Supporters of the Chamberlain bill made it plain today that they are not satisfied with the recent shake-up of the ordnance bureau and the quarter-master's corps of the war department. These are only halfway measures, they declared. Complete coordination of all the work of obtaining supplies for every branch of the war service under one head is the only solution of the present unsatisfactory condition, they insisted, and this will be their position until they get results.

Traffic Officers to Be Courteous, Order

Complaints from automobile owners arrested for cutting corners and other traffic violations have reached Mayor Baker's ears and this morning he told the 12 traffic officers gathered in his office that they were to go out of their way to be courteous to all whom they might stop.

"Don't lose your temper just because you have the authority," the mayor told them. Meeting with the officers were Municipal Judge Rossmann, Chief of Police Johnson, Captain Jenkins, Deputy City Attorney Delch and Harry Coffin, of the public safety commission.

It was decided to carry on a campaign of education concerning the traffic ordinance regulations and to give all persons guilty of minor violations adequate warning before arrests are made.

Arrests Made Under 'Tin Plate' Law

A campaign to enforce the "tin plate ordinance" caused seven arrests Friday. The following were arrested for alleged failure to display the name plate on their buildings or for having one that could not be read: P. Louvergart, Fourth and Pine streets; K. J. Charleston Gets Big Powder Plant

WAR-SAVINGS STAMPS AND CERTIFICATES

Q. I want to begin to save on the War-Savings Plan. What is the first thing to do?

A. Take \$4.12 to the postoffice or a bank or any other agent, buy a War-Savings Stamp, and ask for a War-Savings Certificate.

Q. What is a War-Savings Certificate?

A. It is a pocket-sized folder containing 20 spaces upon which to affix War-Savings Stamps.

Q. Is the War-Savings Certificate a government obligation?

A. It becomes an obligation as soon as one or more War-Savings Stamps are affixed to it.

Q. Can I get a War-Savings Certificate without buying a Stamp?

A. No.

Q. Does the War-Savings Certificate cost anything?

A. No. The agent from whom you purchase the stamps will write your name and address on the certificate and will furnish you an envelope in which to keep it.

Q. What do I do after that?

A. Affix the War-Savings Stamp on your certificate in space No. 1 and take good care of it.

Q. What do I do next?

A. You have now become a war saver. Continue to buy War-Savings Stamps every week or month and put them on your certificate until you have filled all of the 20 spaces. When this is done you can buy another War-Savings Stamp, and you will receive free of cost another certificate to which you can attach new stamps as you buy them.

Q. When I have filled the 20 spaces on my certificate what do I do with it?

A. Keep the certificate until January 1, 1923, and the government will pay you \$100 for it.

Q. How many War-Savings Certificates can I fill?

A. Ten. The law allows each person to own \$1000 worth of War-Savings Certificates.

Q. What is the largest quantity that I can purchase at any one time?

A. \$100 worth, or 20 stamps.

War-Savings Stamps may be purchased from all postoffices, mail carriers, banks and many stores and industries.

ALEXANDER H. KERR

IS 'DOLLAR-A-YEAR'

MAN FOR UNCLE SAM

Former Portland Merchant Called to Washington Because of His Business Success.

Alexander H. Kerr, a former Portland man, organizer of Wadhams & Kerr Bros. of this city, and now vice president of the company, has been appointed special assistant to Secretary of Agriculture D. M. Houston at a salary of \$1 a year, and is now in Washington engaged in his duties. Word to this effect was received this morning by Frank Kerr, of Wadhams & Kerr Bros. Mr. Kerr left Portland five years ago and went to Chicago, where he organized the firm of Alexander H. Kerr company, of which he is vice-president and general manager. Later he went to Tulsa, Okla., and established a factory. The main office is located there and that is where Mr. Kerr has been making his headquarters. The company has a branch office in Portland. To Mr. Kerr in his new office will fall the task of reaching 20,000,000 families in the United States with pamphlets, which have for their object the furthering of food conservation. Two hundred million of these pamphlets are to be distributed within the next few months.

The Kerr Fruit Jar Manufacturing company at San Springs, Okla., is a subsidiary of the Alexander H. Kerr company, and is the only exclusive jar manufacturing company in the United States. Mr. Kerr's activities in connection with his business enterprises have attracted the attention of the department of agriculture. He accepted the appointment through patriotic reasons.

As a resident of Tulsa he took an active interest in the community, being a director of the chamber of commerce there, and a member of other civic bodies. During his absence his business will be looked after by other officials.

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DAIRMEN EMPHATIC

IN DENIAL OF CHARGE

OF VIOLATING LAW

Informal Complaint Made to Federal Attorney Against Dairy League.

Charges informally filed on Friday with United States Attorney Reames by a group of Portland milk distributors complaining that the Oregon Dairymen's league is violating the Sherman anti-trust law were denied in toto before the federal attorney this morning by F. M. Kiger, manager of the league.

Mr. Kiger branded as false the statement that the dairymen's league charges milk distributors a commission on milk sold to them. He said that the league is a voluntary association of dairymen with a central selling agency which charges its own members 5 cents a hundred pounds in order to meet operating expenses. He said that the members of the league have conformed in price for milk to the recommendation of the Portland emergency milk commission, with one slight modification. The milk commission recommended a price of \$2.50 a hundred pounds for milk at the farmer's gate. The dairymen adopted a price of \$3 a hundred pounds f. o. b. Portland. "As the handling charge to Portland varies between 10 and 15 cents, it makes our price lower than that recommended by the commission," said Mr. Kiger today. "The milk distributors making the complaint are parasites who are disgruntled because the milk producers have been helped by the league. They are not considering plans for taking over their own distribution in the city," was a comment made by Mr. Kiger after his interview with the district attorney.

"We have not violated any law and our organization is a result of an attempt to meet the emergency conditions forced upon us without raising milk to a price which would make it a luxury for many of the people who need it worst."

Reames withheld the names of the complaining milk distributors.

RANKS OF MILITARY

Information from Washington has been received that two Portland men have been nominated by President Wilson for advancement in the army, and will be commissioned.

Brigadier General William C. Langfitt, who is nominated as a major general in the national army, was formerly an officer in the engineering corps and was for years stationed in Portland in charge of the river and harbor improvement work.

Colonel William H. Harts, nominated for a commission as brigadier general, is a native Portlander, his mother and father having lived here for many years. He was at the time of his assignment in the city a lieutenant in the engineering corps stationed at Vancouver barracks.
