80,000 Homeless in City of Guatemala

Washington, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—Eighty thousand persons are homeless as the result of the Guatemala City earthquake which was still in progress Saturday night, according to a wireless dispatch from the American charge to the state department late this afternoon. The destruction of the city is complete and epidemics are feared, as the water system has been destroyed. There is food enough for 30 days, the charge said.

Stock Dividends Exempt From Tax

Washington, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—Stock dividends were held to be exempt from the income tax in a decision of the supreme court of the United States today. The decision reverses the decision of the New York supreme court in the case of Towne versus Elmer, collector.

Yakima Stockmen To Lease Lands

Yakima, Wash., Jan. 7.—Forty stockmen will lease 20,000 acres of grazing lands from the reclamation service as a result of contracts now being drawn by the government on bids made by the stockmen. The leases range for periods extending from 18 to 21 years and at prices from 7 cents an acre per year for the poorer grades to 75 cents per acre for the better grades of dry farm land. The government receives approximately \$3000 annual revenue for lands hitherto idle.

Man Found Dead in Auto

New Orleans, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—Edwin Rodriguez, 28, was found murdered on an abandoned automobile in the fashionable residence district here today. He had been shot in the head.

Coal Exports Curtailed

Washington, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—Foreign countries are to receive no more coal from the United States than they actually need, according to the plans of Fuel Administrator Garfield, announced this afternoon.

Owens Historical Flag

Savannah, Jan. 7.—Captain Thomas H. Laird, Savannah harbor master, is flying from the balcony of his residence a beautiful American flag which was rescued by his son, Gilbert, from the City of Memphis, on which the latter was first officer, when the ship was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine last March.

M'ADOO SETS ONE WEEK TO UNLOAD CARS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—Director General of Railroads McAdoo this afternoon designated next week as National Freight Clearance Week in an effort to clean up the congestion on the railroads. He will ask the cooperation of all government city officials, boards of trade and shippers organizations to the end that the cars are unloaded with the least possible delay.

TOKIO GETS READY FOR EMERGENCY

Japan Prepares Measures to
Meet Any Danger at Vladivostok, Statement.

Tokio, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—In view of the growing danger at Vladivostok, Russia, Japan is now prepared for appropriate measures to meet any emergency, it was stated semi-officially today.

At the same time assurances were given that the Japanese army will not be mobilized "rashly."

However, Japan is ready to give full protection to allied subjects at Vladivostok and to escort them from Russia, if necessary. Japan could thus fulfill her obligations to the allies without making any hostile move toward Russia, it was pointed out.

Ever since the German armies entered into negotiations with Russia for separate peace there has been an undercurrent of anxiety at Tokyo over the possibility of Germany securing a foothold at Vladivostok where she could menace Japan.

Dry Squad Chief Demands Damages

Seattle, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—Sheriff John Stringer of this county is made the defendant in a suit filed today by Sergeant George H. Comstock, former head of the police dry squad who was arrested in connection with alleged bootlegging operations. Comstock declares he was arrested by the sheriff without a warrant and asks \$10,000 damages.

Comstock is now free on bail of \$5000 charged by the federal authorities with a conspiracy to ship liquor into a dry state.

Jewelry Store and Brewery Robbed

Chicago, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—"Padded brick" thieves hurled a stone wrapped in a newspaper through the window of the Robertson & Co.'s jewelry store on West Madison street today and stole diamond rings and other jewelry valued at \$1500.

Burglars broke open the safe of the Paist Brewing company during the night and escaped with between \$500 and \$700.

Steamer Torpedoed And 8 Lives Lost

New York, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—The American steamship Harry Luckenbach has been torpedoed and sunk with a loss of eight lives, it was announced at the offices of the Luckenbach Steamship company here late this afternoon.

The Luckenbach carried a crew of 30 men. The captain was among those saved. It was stated. Further details are not available.

Father Held by Huns; Son Enlists

A new recruit at the British and Canadian recruiting station is Anton de Mayer of Portland. His father was a Russian baron and was taken prisoner by the Germans during the first six months of the war. Mayer is just 21 years old. He left today for Canada.

Chicago Man Shoots Modiste

Chicago, Jan. 7.—J. J. Levy, late to-day went to the downtown office of Mrs. Frances A. Reetz, modiste, accused her of breaking up his home and shot her. Levy then turned the gun on himself. Both are in a serious condition.

HENEY'S PROPAGANDA AGAINST BIG PACKERS RESENTED BY ARMOUR

Hints by Federal Investigator of
Prosecution and Prison Terms
"Get Under Hide."

Chicago, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—J. Ogden Armour, packer, Sunday issued the following statement regarding hints thrown out by Francis J. Heney, in charge of the meat investigation for the United States, to the effect that prosecutions probably would follow the evidence produced at the recent meeting of \$47.60, "Almost daily during the last two weeks there have appeared in the press interviews with Mr. Heney, in which he has undertaken to tell the people what he and the government intended to do with the packers. The last of these interviews came Saturday from Philadelphia."

Government May Take Control
"The public was then told that the government would assume control of the business of the packers through receiverships. On another recent occasion, Mr. Heney permitted himself to be interviewed and informed the public that the packers would be prosecuted, civilly and criminally, and on one occasion intimated that certain of them would be sent to jail."

"I had assumed until I read Mr. Heney's interview that the putting of men in jail or taking charge of their business, was a matter that was lodged by law in the department of justice, and Attorney General Gregory has given out no interviews corroborating Heney."

Armour Makes Vellied Threat
"The insidious methods of Mr. Heney of prejudicing the public now have reached a point where I could not be true to myself as a loyal American citizen if I did not tell the people frankly that unless he refrains from continuing to irritate and excite the public, I fear that a condition may be reached which seriously disturb the unity of the American people in the gigantic task we have on hand."

No greater injury can be done to the packers than to affect their credit by fomenting public discontent. The very word receivership, if sufficiently repeated and emphasized, may destroy their ability to meet their obligations."

Packers May Appeal to People
"If there is no other way of curbing Mr. Heney and bringing him to a realization of the nature of his obligation, I have always found the American public quick to recognize an emergency."

Opens 11,648 Gates To Secure His Mail

Douglas Resident Backs Request for
New County Road With Novel Argument
Based on Years of Experience.

Roseburg, Or., Jan. 7.—J. P. McClannahan, who resides east of the city, Douglas county, appeared before the county court here, said that in order to get his mail once a week during the past winter season he had opened 11,648 gates. Fourteen gates must be passed through each way on the 11 miles he travels for his mail. He was urging the establishment of a county road, and his request was granted.

England Unchanged, Says German Paper

Amsterdam, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—First German newspaper comment received here today on Premier Lloyd George's speech held that the address showed "England maintaining her old imperialistic claims."

"Lloyd George's declaration shows a changed attitude toward the United States," said the Reichswehr Zeitung, "but the old imperialistic aims are wholly maintained."

"The premier believes his opening declaration that he does not want the destruction of Germany by seeing that he would take away Alsace-Lorraine from us and give Poland portions of East Prussia. Despite his contrary assurance, he wants to rob Austria-Hungary and Turkey."

Bomb Explodes in School; One Hurt

Rochester, Pa., Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—The Rochester Continuation school, a public institution attended by 40 pupils, was partially wrecked today by a bomb in the desk of Miss Cecilia Hebling, a teacher.

Carl Burkwall, 13, was seriously injured. He was the only one in the building when the bomb exploded. Burkwall was able to tell the police that he was firing the furnace in the cellar when the bomb exploded. He succeeded in getting outside and calling for help before he collapsed.

The police voiced the opinion that the bomb was a time contrivance set by pro-Germans and that it exploded prematurely.

Milwaukee May Get Through Tuesday

Ellensburg, Wash., Jan. 7.—A temporary pile bridge over the Yakima river between Thorp and Ellensburg will be completed Tuesday morning, according to Milwaukee bridge crews. The Northern Pacific will not open its bridge for several days, but may use the Milwaukee tracks after Tuesday. It is believed the Milwaukee Olympian train tomorrow will be the first over the Cascades in 10 days. The river has fallen rapidly the past few days.

Receiver Asked for St. Louis Car Lines

St. Louis, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—Charging financial infirmities and getting action by creditors, which would have disintegrated the system, was threatened, Attorney Ephraim Caplan today filed a suit in the United States district court, asking that a receiver be appointed for the United Railways Street Car company here. Caplan is acting for John W. Beam of New York, owner of 100 shares of preferred stock, which has a par value of \$10,000.

Project of Klamath
Makes Good Showing
Irrigated Land Under Federal Improvement Yields Harvest in 1917 to Value of \$947,000, According to Report.

Klamath Falls, Or., Jan. 7.—On 32,929 acres of land reported on the big Klamath irrigation project here, last year, crops to the value of \$947,000 were harvested, according to the figures made public at the reclamation office here.

This is by far the best showing made on this project and gives an average yield an acre of \$25.73. The total of 1917 was \$509,866, with an average of \$17.37. The average yield of the last season was 3578 acres larger than the previous year.

The yields were as follows: Alfalfa, 31,158 tons; barley, 109,250 bushels; hay, 2837 tons; oats, 82,708 bushels; potatoes, 24,323 bushels; rye, 4896 bushels; wheat, 39,753, and sugar beets, 549 tons.

CAMP LEWIS STAGES MOVIE FILM BATTLES FOR GOVERNMENT USE

Artillery, Machine Guns and Men
Fight, Work and Sleep Under
Actual War Conditions.

Camp Lewis, Wash., Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—Receiving their first idea of war under the conditions which they will experience in the field, two regiments of infantry, one of heavy field artillery and several machine gun companies, staged a sham battle last week for the "movies" which will be used by the government's publicity department, together with thousands of feet of film showing living and training conditions in the camp.

The sham battle was staged with the utmost secrecy and not until it was all over was the fact given out for publication that for two days and nights

10,000 men had worked, fought and slept under actual war conditions.

With the field artillery and infantry was a battalion of signal corps and a detachment of the hospital service. So quickly were the details of the action handled that within 30 minutes from the time that an order was flashed from the front to the rear a base hospital had been set up and the nurses were ready to care for the wounded, who arrived in great numbers "suffering" from various kinds of "wounds" indicated on the tags.

While the primary reason for the staging of the sham battle was the making of several thousand feet of film for publicity purposes, the men, many of whom had but a dim idea of the manner and methods of going into action, received considerable benefit.

The pictures were made by Lieutenant Wilbur H. Darborough, who spent two years at the European war front and who made more than 100,000 feet of film in addition to a thousand "stills."

Steel Corporation
Loses Point in Case

Dissolution Suit Hearing Is Continued
by Supreme Court to October Term—
Argument in Shoe Machinery Co. Case.

Washington, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—The attempt of the United States Steel corporation to have the first time decision by the supreme court on the government dissolution suit against the trust failed today when the court continued the case until the October term.

The court granted the motion in opposition to the government's step in the case of the United States Steel Machinery company, one of the anti-trust suits, and it will be argued this week. All the other cases have been postponed.

Communication Cut; Fire Loss Unknown

Aberdeen, S. D., Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—With all wire communication with Britton, S. D., cut off when the telephone exchange and telegraph office burned, it was impossible today to ascertain the extent of damage by a fire that was reported to have wiped out the business section of the town yesterday. Use of capable wireless plants here and at Britton is forbidden.

Detroit Is Held for Evasion of Draft Law

Salem, Or., Jan. 7.—Fred Noelker was arrested at Silverton Saturday on the charge of having failed to comply with the army draft law. He was registered in district No. 1, Detroit, Mich., and says he was given physical examination in Kansas City and rejected.

Report of his rejection was never sent to the local board, and his arrest is the result. He is being held in the county jail, while Sheriff Needham has wired to Detroit for authority to have him take physical examination here.

Rockefeller Adds \$5,500,000 to Fund

New York, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—John D. Rockefeller Sr. today contributed \$5,500,000 additional to the Rockefeller Foundation. This sum, it was explained, is needed to meet the additional demands made on the foundation on account of the war.

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SCANDINAVIA WILL NOT JOIN TEUTONS

Dr. Egan, Minister to Denmark,
Is Certain Northern Nations
Are Pro-Ally.

Washington, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—Maurice Francis Egan, minister to Denmark, in Washington on leave, says that despite the threat of the Hun axe over the head of the Scandinavian countries these nations are distinctly pro-Ally.

Dr. Egan returned here last week to recover from the effects of an operation and has had several conferences with state department officials over conditions in Denmark.

"Denmark," he says, "has contributed more to the relief of Belgium in proportion to her population than has the United States. That ought to guarantee her pro-Ally sentiment."

Sweden, he declared, is basically anti-Teuton. He based this conclusion on the result of the recent elections in Sweden which turned on the revelation of the Luxburg letters and put into power a Socialist and distinctly pro-Ally government. He says that Norway's sentiments are the same and that these nations only trade with Germany as much as their neutrality understanding requires.

Efforts to attribute pro-German leanings to the Scandinavian countries, Dr. Egan believes, are part of a well laid German plot. Another part of this plot is to export from Germany to these countries the commodities of which they are in the greatest need, through the United States embargo.

The Danes, however, Dr. Egan says, prefer to burn post in their stove rather than coal which Germany offers them. The middle classes suffer most from the food and coal shortage in Denmark because the well organized Socialist government there takes care of the very poor through a rigid system of rationing.

Windows Broken
By Nitro Explosion

Bowling Green, Ohio, Jan. 7.—(U. N. S.)—Explosion of two quarts of nitroglycerine in a storeroom of the American Glycoling company near here early today broke hundreds of windows in business houses. No fatalities have been reported.
