WEATHER CONDITIONS

The eastern low pressure area is now central off the New England coast, but still covers most of the country north of the Ohio river. A trough-like depression extends from Alberta southeastward to Texas. Elsewhere the pressure is high, the highest readings being on the Pacific coast and in Manitoba. Precipitation has occurred over an irregular area reaching from the north Pacific coast to northern Alberta, and thence southward to Kansas; it is reported also from a large part of the country east of the Mississippi river. Milder weather prevails in the Northern Rocky Mountain, Plains and West Gulf states, while on the Pacific slope, in the eastern half of the United States and in Canada, the weather is generally colder. The temperature is above normal throughout the west, and below normal in most of the central and eastern states. Under the influence of the prevailing high pressure fair and colder weather may be expected in Portland and its vicinity tonight and Wednesday.

Adolf Wolf Was Pioneer of State

Came West in 1866 and Engaged in Mercantile Business at Independence; Later Became Successful Trader in Hops. Silverton, Or., Jan. 8.—Adolf Wolf, one of the best known hop dealers in the Willamette Valley, died at his home in this city Sunday, January 6, at the age of 71 years. Mr. Wolf came to America from Austria-Hungary in 1863. In 1866 he came west, and after casting about for a time, settled at Independence and engaged in the mercantile business. It was chiefly through his influence that the Oregon & California Railroad company, now the Southern Pacific, was induced to run its line through Independence.

In 1884 Mr. Wolf disposed of his property in Independence and came to Silverton and again entered the mercantile business. In 1890 he took his son, Julius C., into partnership, and in 1891 erected the Wolf block, now owned by S. Ames. Since that time Mr. Wolf devoted his time to hop raising and dealing in hops. Mr. Wolf was married in Portland, in 1868, to Fannie Kraemer, and to this union were born three children. Mr. Wolf is survived by a widow and one son, Julius C., of Silverton, and Dr. Louis, of Portland.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the Portland crematorium, under the auspices of the Silverton lodge of A. F. & A. M.

U. S. Troops Warned Against Hun Traps

Ground Recently Gained by French and British Dotted With Death Devices Prohibited by Rules of Warfare With the American Army in France, Jan. 8.—(I. N. S.)—American soldiers have been warned against German "booby" traps and snares which the enemy is inventing as fast as the old ones are discovered. Ground recently gained by the French and British turned out to be dotted with devilish devices that are against the rules of all civilized warfare, such as flat boards made to imitate lookout seats at the entrances of dugouts, one of which connects with a hidden mine which explodes when the boards are touched.

On the floors of the German trenches and dugouts have been found sea-saw boards which, when stepped on, cause hidden bomb cases to explode. The Germans even used their encoffined dead as snares for the advancing foe, placing coffins on top of others. The removal of the top would set off a charge of high explosives and blow up parties attempting to give the enemy dead a Christian burial.

Out-of-Date Guard Materials on Sale

Old national guard accoutrement assembled in the armory by the adjutant general will be placed on sale to the highest bidder, it was announced Monday.

Captain James of Adjutant General Williams' staff has been working on the inventory of antique and nearly modern weapons of the national guard. Anyone wishing to become the possessor of a sabre for den decoration, army underwear for practical use, or an old military coat or cap to show his grandchildren will find these articles and many others on display in the armory. Sealed tenders must be presented to Captain James before January 12.

LAD ARRIVES FROM HOLLAND TO MAKE HIS HOME IN AMERICA

Herbert Langerack Comes From Rotterdam; Is Grand Nephew of Captain George Pope.

Ever since he could remember, Herbert Langerack of Rotterdam, Holland, nursed an ambition to come to the United States, and he didn't allow the war to interfere with it. He arrived in Portland Monday after a voyage dating back to early in December, when he bid goodbye to his mother and sister. He arrived in New York Christmas day. Herbert Langerack is a brother of Oswald Langerack of Portland, an employee in the auditing department of the C. & W. R. & N. Co. Herbert is 18 years old. The boys are grand nephews of Captain George Pope, a retired merchant of Portland. On the voyage through the danger zone of the North sea from Rotterdam to Christiania, Norway, where passage was taken for New York, many British war vessels were sighted, grim yet friendly looking," said the young Hollander. "No German vessels or submarines were encountered. The sea was running heavy and the weather was bitterly cold."

"The great Statue of Liberty, the huge towering buildings and the tremendous bustle and traffic of New York were inspirations to me which never will die."

"Holland, as are all other European countries, is suffering. The great majority of Holland people are pro-ally, but we also have pro-Germans."

"The vast influx of refugees from Belgium, deserters from prison camps, Russian, French and English, all find harbor in Holland."

"Prices have gone up, but wages have not. Commerce is at a standstill and the shipbuilding industry is crippled for want of material."

"Coal is hardly to be had, while coffee is now rarely seen. Tea is an expensive luxury. Still little Holland is not lacking in charity. Rotterdam and Amsterdam have spent millions and millions of dollars in relief of Belgian refugees."

"I am happy if my new land," added the young immigrant. I have prepared myself for a mercantile vocation, my education being directed through correspondence with my uncle, Mr. Pope. I intend to adapt myself to my new surroundings as speedily as possible."

"When I have become of age and have taken my place as a citizen of the United States, I will be prepared to enter the army or the navy should my country need my services."

Canadian Officers Display War Relics

Hundreds of Portland people inspected the war relics displayed in the show window of the Meier & Frank store by officers of the Canadian army who visited Portland on a speaking tour under the auspices of the Oregon State Council of Defense.

The relics, some of which were taken from the Germans on the battlefield, are grim reminders of the war. The collection includes a small section of a German airship, gas masks, hand grenades of both the Germans and the allies, small hand mines, Teton daggers, swords, headquarters flag of the German army, and blueprints used as weapons of death in "No Man's Land." The blueprints, which is a short, heavy stick is studded with nails at the heavy end.

The souvenirs were loaned by the Canadian authorities, and are being exhibited by Major F. B. Edwards, Lieutenant Colonel Macmillan and Captain Cook, who are making a tour of the state, describing inside details of trench fighting.

W. S. S. EXCHANGING THRIFT CARDS FOR WAR-SAVINGS STAMPS

Q. When I have filled the Thrift Card, what do I do?
 A. Take it to a postoffice, bank or other authorized agency, surrender the card and pay in cash the few cents' difference between the \$4 worth of Thrift Stamps and the price of a War-Savings Stamp for the month in which the exchange is made.
 Q. What do I do next?
 A. You take the War-Savings Stamp given you in exchange for your Thrift Card, ask for a War-Savings Certificate, if you haven't one already, and attach the stamp to the certificate.
 Q. Should I continue to buy Thrift Stamps?
 A. Yes. Ask for a new Thrift Card and begin again.
 Q. Do Thrift Stamps bear interest?
 A. No.
 Q. Then why are they issued?
 A. To make it convenient for you to save in small amounts so that you can purchase a War-Savings Stamp which does bear interest.
 Q. May I exchange Thrift-Stamps for War-Savings Stamps at any time?
 A. No; only on or before December 31, 1918.
 War-Savings Stamps may be purchased from all postoffices, mail carriers, banks and many stores and industries.
