

WOMAN MODIFIES HER TESTIMONY IN FALING WILL CASE

Mrs. Miller Says Mrs. Faling Not So Incompetent as She Had Been Led to Believe.

'MISSING' JEWELRY IN COURT

Hillsboro Doctor Says Mrs. Faling Was Insane at Time Will Was Signed.

That Mrs. Xarifa J. Faling was not so mentally incompetent as she had been led to believe was, in effect, the substance of the testimony drawn from Mrs. Jennie D. Miller, under cross-examination today by John F. Logan, attorney for the proponents in the contest over the \$600,000 estate, the bulk of which was left by will to Thomas N. Strong and C. Lewis Mead, two old-time friends.

Mrs. Miller was called to the stand by Attorney Coy Burney, acting for Dr. Tyler Smith of Sheridan, Or., who is seeking to break the will on the ground that the decedent was mentally incompetent and was subjected to improper pressure and duress.

Irrington Cottage Rented In her direct examination Mrs. Miller testified that within three days after she had been sent as a friendly attendant to Mrs. Faling's rooms at the Sargeant hotel in 1911 she became convinced that Mrs. Faling was beginning to be obsessed with hallucinations which later developed into hopeless insanity.

She imagined, said Mrs. Miller, that she heard strange voices and saw the faces of long-departed friends in and about her apartment.

Mrs. Miller reported this state of affairs, so she testified, to Thomas N. Strong, who was looking after Mrs. Faling's business and personal affairs, and suggested that she and Mrs. Faling take a cottage in Irrington.

She rented a furnished cottage, she said, until Mrs. Faling refused to stay longer.

No Restraint, Says Witness According to testimony of previous witnesses and statements of counsel for the contestants, Mrs. Faling was taken from the Sargeant hotel against her wishes to the Irrington cottage against her will, did not know where she was being taken and, while there, was under constant watch and restraint. One witness said that she once attempted to get away from there, scantily clad.

Mrs. Carrie Jensen testified to receiving three excited telephone calls from Mrs. Faling, who asked her to "come to me at once."

While under cross-examination by counsel for the proponents yesterday afternoon, Mrs. Miller said that Mrs. Faling was under no restraint, that she could leave the house to go for a walk whenever the whim seized her and that no one watched her, followed her or interfered with her movements in any way. Being shown a number of letters

written by Mrs. Faling to William Metzger in 1912 and 1913, after the stay in Irrington, Mrs. Miller modified the opinion expressed in her direct examination and said that Mrs. Faling must have improved.

A controversy over Mrs. Faling's jewelry, which counsel for the contestants had said had disappeared, was cleared up by Mrs. Miller. The jewelry was produced in court from the safe deposit box where it has reposed since Mrs. Faling died.

This morning Dr. E. A. Smith of Hillsboro testified that in June, July and August, 1915, when he made three visits, Mrs. Faling was hopelessly insane. He said she exhibited no signs of intelligence, had no mind at all. In his opinion, Mrs. Faling at that time was absolutely incompetent to make a will or execute any sort of legal document. The will was executed in July, 1915.

WOMAN ASKS \$300 ALIMONY

Lulu Johnson Says Mate Ows \$12,000 Logging Company Stock.

Lulu Johnson began suit for divorce Wednesday in the circuit court against Earl Johnson, alleging cruelty and non-support. They were married in New York in 1898. She alleged further that her husband possesses \$12,000 in stock in the Bear Creek Logging company. She demands \$300 as temporary alimony and one-half of the stock.

Cruelty and non-support were charged in the divorce suit of Clara Eglin against George Eglin filed Wednesday. They were married at Jacksonville, Or., in 1903. She asks for the restoration of her maiden name, Clara Holbrook.

Desertion is the charge against Eva Cooper by Clyde Cooper in his divorce suit. They have one child.

THREE MEN ASKING FOR DIVORCE

Two Say Wives Deserted Them; Another Says Wife Calls Him Fool.

Three cases constituted the grist in today's divorce mill.

W. S. Cooper alleges that Minnie Cooper, whom he married August 3, 1890, deserted him without provocation 23 years later. They have seven children.

Albert von der Werth asks for a divorce from Henrietta D. von der Werth, alleging that she deserted him in June, 1916. They have two sons of 11 and 9 years. They were married in Portland December 31, 1898.

C. Weinstein, who married Anna Weinstein in Russia 11 years ago, says now that she calls him a fool, a tramp and a liar. For this alleged reason he asks a divorce.

DAMAGE CASE TRIAL IS BEGUN

Louis Hamerlynek Asks \$25,000 for Injuries Received in Accident.

A jury was being selected in Circuit Judge Gatens' court this morning to try the \$25,000 damage suit of Louis Hamerlynek against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company.

Hamerlynek alleges he was driving an auto truck across the intersection of Johnson and Sixteenth streets when it was struck by a streetcar and that his spine was injured.

DR. VISETTI NOT GUILTY

Italian Publisher Convinces Jury That Articles Were Not Libelous.

Dr. Carlos Visetti, publisher of the Italian Journal, was found not guilty under an indictment charging him with criminal libel against Paul Brenna, Italian consul at Seattle, when a jury in Judge Tucker's court this morning re-

turned a verdict for acquittal after deliberating 20 minutes.

Dr. Visetti has attacked Consul Brenna in his newspaper for some months and the indictment was based on an alleged libelous statement concerning the consul's moral character. The evidence convinced the jurors that these published articles were not libelous.

\$1000 Damages Awarded

A verdict for \$1000 was given Edward Sowinsky against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company in a sealed verdict returned in Judge Gatens' court. The youth, aged 13, brought suit for \$20,000 because of injuries received last fall when, he alleges, he was knocked from a St. Johns car by a conductor. It was shown that he was riding on the "blind" side of the car at the time of the accident. He suffered a skull fracture.

Bootlegging Is Charged

Another skirmishing expedition by Special Agents Scott and Jeffries and Deputy Sheriff Stanley MacDonald resulted in the arrest of Ed Branna, proprietor of the Australian hotel and the Taylor apartments, First and Taylor streets, on a charge of bootlegging. Six quarts of whiskey were found in the basement of the hotel and the officers purchased six pints from Branna.

Polonsky Now Palmer

His name was easy to spell but hard to pronounce so Jacob Polonsky filed a petition with Judge Tazewell of the county court this morning asking that it be changed to Jacob Palmer. The petitioner was born in Russia, Christmas day, 1878, and was admitted to American citizenship in San Francisco, May 29, 1905.

Several nights Mrs. Bonner and McChandler had noticed Clark lurking in nearby doorways, when they went out to dinner together, and had made the remark to Mrs. Noonan that they feared the man was insane.

According to Mrs. J. H. Meier of apartment 24, Williams Avenue apartment, Mrs. Bonner on last Saturday told her that Clark had threatened to kill her. Mrs. Bonner lived in apartment 25 and McChandler had been living in apartment 39.

Mrs. Bonner had lived at the Noonan house for several months and had made her living by doing laundry and other work that she could find by the day. She was 47 years old and had a son on the Vancouver, Wash., police force.

Slayer Father of Three

One daughter, Mrs. Crosby, lives at Wallace, Idaho. There are seven other children. Mrs. Bonner was married twice, the first time to a man by the name of Thibideau.

Clark had been rooming at the home of T. W. Cole, 463 Rodney avenue. He also had been married twice and was the father of three children. They are: Riley H., age 11, an employee of the Western hotel, Bremerton, Wash.; Elsie, age 18, an operator for the Pacific Telephone company at Seattle; and Ervina, age 7, who is living with Mrs. McIntosh, at 429 Union avenue north.

Clark, according to the police, had evidently been planning the tragedy since Christmas, when Mrs. Bonner "threw him over" for McChandler. The police have learned that he made his last Sunday, carefully disposing of his property to his three children. They have also learned that he took a bath Wednesday morning, instead of waiting until Saturday, as was his custom, and had

changed from his work clothes to his best suit. They say he was particular about his appearance.

Clark had been operating a wood-saw in Portland for some time, and, as far as the police can learn, had a "good reputation."

McChandler was single and recently

had disposed of a large ranch in Idaho, moving to Portland about three weeks ago. Little is known in Portland concerning his relatives, as it is said by Mrs. Noonan that he had few friends in Portland.

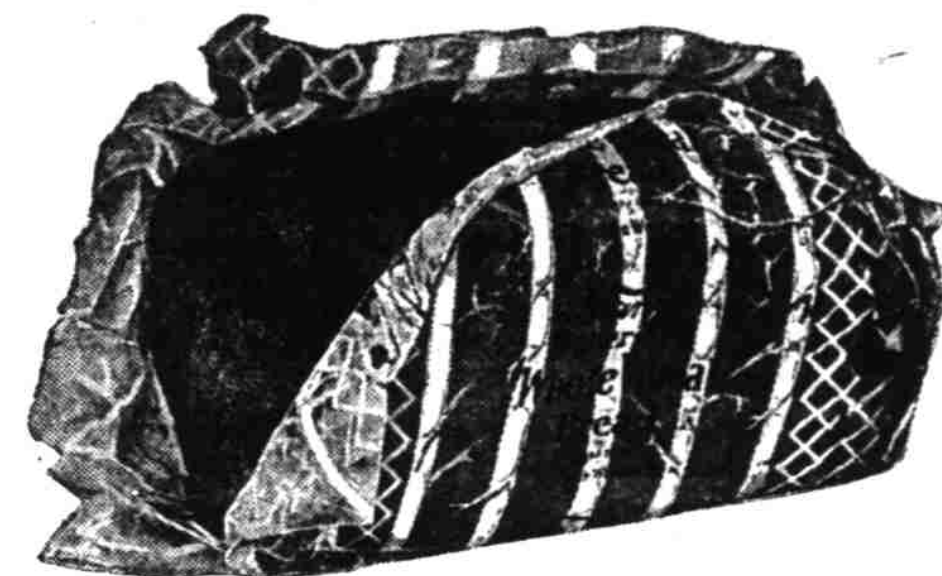
