

ANDERSON WANTS WATERWAYS USED

Interstate Commerce Commissioner Would Give More Authority to McAdoo.

Washington, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—Much more extensive use of canals and waterways was urged by George W. Anderson, interstate commerce commissioner, in discussing before the house interstate commerce committee Wednesday the railroad bill authorizing the government to buy railroad bonds as it sees fit, and he recommended that a provision be added to the bill giving Director General McAdoo control of this phase of transportation.

No undue rise in the price of railroad securities will come as the result of a provision in the railroad bill authorizing the government to buy these bonds as it sees fit, Commissioner Anderson declared.

"The whole result of the provision will be stabilization of the market," Anderson said. "Some stocks that have been selling below par undoubtedly will be brought up to their face value, but in general we expect no radical movements in the railroad stock markets."

Acting Chairman Doremus asked Anderson what provision was made for the cost of terminals and extra tracks to cantonments and military camps.

"This will be charged up to the railroads at present," Anderson said, "and, if, after the war is over, it is found these are of little value, an agreement on their value then will be reached through a court of claims."

Auto Parcel Post to Help Out Railroads

Washington, Jan. 10.—(U. S. S.)—Beginning Thursday morning, Postmaster General Burleson will put into operation a national scheme of automobile post deliveries to relieve the freight congestion to a large extent. Hundreds of motor trucks, operating over the main routes extending from Portland, Maine, to Jacksonville, Fla.; from Baltimore to Chicago; from New York to New Orleans; and from New Orleans to Savannah will move through farming districts and make direct connection with the nearest markets and with private consumers.

Higher Wages for Americans Urged

Olympia, Wash., Jan. 10.—(I. N. S.)—American workmen must have higher wages in order to maintain the standard of living in this country and at the same time have funds with which to contribute to the government's war activities, according to a resolution adopted by the Washington state welfare commission. Industrial content, says the resolution on file here today, will come when workers are paid enough to live up to the American standard of citizenship.

Cities in Interior Ask for More Fish

Closer Cooperation in Conservation of Supply Urged at Conference of Game Commissioners and Dealers.

Closer cooperation between Oregon and Washington in the conservation of fish caught in the Columbia river was urged at a conference in Portland Tuesday between Food Administrator W. B. Ayer, Oregon Fish Commissioners L. N. Fleischer and F. M. Warren, State Fish and Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker and representative dealers. Secrecy of fish in the interior of Oregon is interfering with the observance there of meatless days, according to Mr. Ayer.

Changes in laws regulating the sale of sturgeon were discussed. It is now unlawful to sell the "baby sturgeon." In practice, however, it appears that the undeveloped sturgeon, when caught in a net, thrash around so that it is necessary to hit them with a club to prevent them tearing the gear. The blow generally kills the fish before they can be thrown back into the water. These fish are said to be excellent for the food values.

ORDERS ARE TO LET REGISTRANTS ATTEND SCHOOL OF ORDNANCE

Applicants for Class Which Is to Open Next Monday to Be Inducted Into Service.

Registrants who have made application to enter the ordnance class opening January 14 at the University of Oregon will be permitted to do so by their local boards, according to instructions received from Provost Marshal General Crowder by Captain Cullison of Adjutant General Williams' office.

The instructions also provide that those students who have completed their course will be inducted into service upon application to their local boards.

Both prospective students and those who have completed the studies have been waiting eagerly to learn whether they would be able to enter the ordnance department of the army.

Several days ago an order was issued to local boards not to accept any more men for the ordnance department as a result of the order, however, students who have completed the course will be inducted into service immediately and the applicants for the next class will be inducted and permitted to attend the class. The induction of applicants before entering the class places them in immediate service and does away with their induction after they graduate.

Receivers to Place Big Mill on Market

Plant of North Pacific Lumber Co., With Capacity of 200,000 Feet Daily, Now Operated Under Lease.

Receivers of the North Pacific Lumber company have advertised for bids for the sale or lease of the plant in North Portland.

The receivers are: H. A. Sargent, Russell Hawkins and Harry Bradley. The plant, known as the "Big Mill," has a capacity of more than 200,000 feet of lumber a day, is said to be capable of cutting ship timbers of the largest dimensions. The plant is also well equipped for handling airplane stock.

N. E. Ayer, the present lessee of the property, is operating the plant under the name of N. E. Ayer Lumber company. His lease expires on February 10 next.

Harry Will Return When Rossman Wills

The boys, who paid for their own drinks, are still wondering when Harry is coming back to finish the treat, but he can't get back until two days have passed, because Municipal Judge Rossman said that two days free drinking and eating in the jail and a deposit of \$5 with the city ought to square the matter.

Keyring Identifies Skeleton in Mine

Joplin, Mo., Jan. 10.—(I. N. S.)—While cleaning out an old mine shaft at Galena, Kan., just across the line, workers discovered a skeleton. It was identified by means of a keyring with his name engraved on it as Ivan E. Farlington, who disappeared on the night of December 1, 1899. A watch, several pencils, fountain pen and a pocketbook were also found.

Farlington's mother resides in Falls City, Neb. She recovered insurance from a fraternal order by a suit in 1907. Only one arrest was made following the disappearance and the man, who was later released, died three years ago.

Dr. McNaughton Will Speak for Armenians

Dr. J. P. McNaughton of the American committee of the Armenian and Serbian relief committee will speak at 11 o'clock Sunday morning in the White Temple. Sunday evening he will address a mass meeting which will be presided over in Salem by Governor Withycombe.

Dr. McNaughton was sent by the American committee to take the place of Ambassador Elkus.

At the same time the campaign for Armenian and Serbian relief is opened in Salem speakers will lay out the program in the Woodburn Armory, in Stayton and in Silverton. W. D. Wright will speak at Woodburn, Rev. Ward W. McHenry of the Mount Tabor Presbyterian church in Silverton and Rev. R. S. Gil in Stayton.

THRIFT CAMPAIGN LEADERS GATHER IN THIS CITY

"No appeal for patriotic service can swamp the patriotism of the people in the First congressional district," declared L. J. Simpson of North Bend, chairman of the national thrift campaign in the first district, when he came to Portland Tuesday evening to report progress in preliminary organization.

Mr. Simpson was told the quota for the first district is a third of \$17,000,000 in sales of war savings stamps assigned to Oregon. "We'll do it," he averred.

"I expect to cover the entire district personally and to go back again as often as is necessary."

"The most enthusiastic offers of cooperation have come from every community."

"The spirit of Coos and Curry counties is inspiring."

"Our people will buy not less than \$500,000 worth of war savings stamps."

"Our industries are laying aside everything not essential to winning the war."

"Within 60 days we will be producing 2,000,000 feet of airplane stock spruce a month. That is one fifth of the entire amount asked by the spruce production division of the aviation corps."

"The mills have laid aside all com-

petition. They are organizing their work as if they were units of one great plant, each doing the work for which they are best adapted. One mill has been given practically all the white cedar sawing because it is better fitted for it."

"One of our wooden shipyards in Coos county offered to make a contract with the government to turn out a wooden hull every 30 days."

"The men in the lumber industry are 100 per cent members of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, organized under the auspices of the government. Employers, office staffs, skilled mechanics, laborers—all have joined. It is impossible for a

man unwilling to join this organization to hold a job in the district. His fellows will not work with him."

Oregon thrift campaign leaders held a second general meeting Tuesday evening. With provision for the enlistment of thousands of stations for the sale of war savings and thrift stamps, with the public school organization of the state enlisted, with stores and offices being rapidly enrolled as sales stations, with many individuals accepting appointment as special agents and with reports of daily increasing sales coming from the post-offices and other stations, the thrift campaigners are confident that Oregon's \$17,000,000 quota will be reached.
