

STANFIELD TELLS WHERE HE STANDS ON BIG PROBLEMS

Candidate for Nomination and Election to United States Senate Announces Platform.

FOR PROHIBITION, SUFFRAGE

Favors Naval Base at Mouth of Columbia, Pacific Coast Military Road, Federal Road Aid.

Robert N. Stanfield announced the platform upon which he will seek nomination and election to the United States senate before the annual community meeting of the agricultural and dairying interests of Umatilla county held at Stanfield Thursday.

The platform, as forwarded to The Journal from Stanfield, is long, covering in seven typewritten pages, a large number of points of public interest concerning which Mr. Stanfield makes his position clear. In summary, the candidate pledges himself:

To support the national administration and the heads of the government in the speedy and vigorous prosecution of the war to a peace satisfactory to the democracy of the world.

For Selective Draft

To a selective draft in practice as well as in theory, insuring organization of the national army and at the same time conservation of labor and supplies for industrial pursuits and commerce.

To an equitable control and regulation of food supplies and the establishment of a primary market at Portland on equal basis with Chicago and eastern points.

To nationwide prohibition.

To equal suffrage in nation and state.

To a naval base at the mouth of the Columbia.

To effective rural credit legislation with a particular view to its adaptability to the needs of Oregon.

To construction of a Pacific coast military highway and to federal aid for permanent highway.

To see that Oregon participates in national trade and that the state is given recognition in federal war expenditures.

To legislation settling the public lands question and the reclamation of arid, swamp and logged off lands.

To the organization and mobilization of all industrial forces, with a just and proper consideration of the rights of labor.

To legislation that will permit resources of the West and Alaska to be used.

To the removal of misunderstanding and opposition on the part of federal authorities that have restricted Oregon's commercial expansion.

To the development of Oregon's shipping ports, improvement of waterways

and harbors; maintenance of a merchant marine in the Pacific and a just recognition of Oregon's location from a commercial and shipping standpoint.

To a policy of conservation and reconstruction which shall insure national integrity, honor and commerce and the moral and civic purity of the people.

To have that high regard and consideration for the interests and progress of humanity and the nation at large which should actuate the motives of every public man.

Mr. Stanfield pledges himself, if elected, to respond to every appropriate call upon him for service to the country, and if defeated, to perform every task allotted him as a citizen.

Defeat of German Armies Can Only Be Accomplished by Cooperation of Workers, Soldiers

PARLIAMENT MEMBER TALKS

Testing Time for Fighters for Freedom at Hand, Barnes Says In Message to American People

London, Jan. 11.—(U. P.)—"The interests of the workmen of America as well as of England are bound up in beating the German army; it cannot be done except by willing cooperation of men in the workshops with the men in the field."

Expressing his most emphatic approval of President Wilson's outline of war aims, the Right Honorable G. N. Barnes, M. P., member of the British war cabinet, sent this word to the American workmen today through the United Press.

"This year will be the testing time for the fighters for freedom," Barnes declared. "Germany's U-boats will make their last great effort before America gets in. Germany's armies may attack the French, the British or the Italians in great force within the next three or four months."

Appeal to American Workers

"Effective American help must then be in the field. I hope everyone in the working ranks in the United States will see that so far as lies in their power they will contribute to that help being there in time."

"I speak as one who has been in the labor Socialist movement on this side of the water for 30 years. My sympathies are all with the working folk."

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BRITISHERS DIVIDED ON WILSON'S MEANING 'FREEDOM OF THE SEAS'

London, Jan. 11.—(U. P.)—Britain would like more details concerning President Wilson's aim for "freedom of the seas."

In the general chorus of editorial approval voiced in the morning press over the direct, clear-cut outlines of peace terms by the American executive, there was nevertheless a note of anxiety as to exactly what was meant by freedom of the seas.

The dominant British feeling is still opposed to complete disarmament on the grounds that it would leave the United States—unlike with widest police powers. Some of the more conservative Britishers recognized the possibility of a situation being created by putting England at Germany's mercy. In this connection, it was recalled, the "declaration of London in 1910" was defeated in the house of commons. It sought to deal with this question.

Sea Question After War Problem

"On the other hand, there was general recognition of the fact that the whole question was being raised by the war, and, in the meantime, all factions realized President Wilson's statement on this as a shrewd move to strengthen the German Liberals."

The conservative press today doubts as to whether President Wilson has "considered the hard realities of the situation." Stress was laid on the latest German atrocity in the sinking of the hospital ship *Rewa* as indicative of the sort of foes with which the British have to deal.

The Liberals expressed emphatic determination to go the whole distance with President Wilson.

George and Wilson Give War Aims

All morning newspapers agreed that Lloyd George and Wilson's speeches were all embracing as to war aims and speculate diversely on the effect of the outlines in Germany.

What Russia will have to say on the Wilson message was also discussed in detail.

The Times expressed doubt that the president entirely appreciated the situation in Russia and internal conditions in Germany.

"Some proposals," the editorial continued, referring to the Wilson address, "almost appear to assume a reign of righteousness on the earth is already within reach of realization. It is dependent upon victory of the allies."

The News approved the address throughout—even "freedom of the seas."

The Chronicle said:

"It would be difficult to frame a more moving, a more sympathetic appeal to the best instincts—whether to the Russians or to the non-militarist elements in the central powers."

Step Taken, It Is Said, in Anticipation of Increase in Rates; Company Says Books Have Been Sold Out for 10 Days

The Portland Railway, Light & Power company is not issuing any more books of streetcar tickets even at the 5 cent rate. It is declared that this step has been taken because of the expectation that the public service commission's ruling, permitting an increase in fares, will become effective January 15. Officials of the streetcar company say, however, that it has no more books to sell, that it has been out of books for the last 10 days.

Since October 15, the book rate has been the same as the cash rate, 5 cents per ride, and should the public service commission's ruling become effective, tickets will be sold for 5 1/2 cents each. Franklin T. Griffith, president of the company, said this morning that tickets sold at the old rate will be good on the streetcars after the ruling becomes effective.

Chain Store Man Looking for Help

Representative of J. C. Penney Company Will Take Those Qualified With View to Possible Partnerships in Future.

F. J. Bolger, a representative of the J. C. Penney company, is in Portland employing men who are qualified for positions which later lead to partnerships, according to the company's plan. He is making his headquarters at the Imperial hotel.

The J. C. Penney company will have when its 20 new stores are opened in the spring, a string of 195 stores throughout the United States.

In 1909, J. C. Penney, the originator of the chain of stores and of the company's profit-sharing methods, opened his first store in Kemmerer, Wyo. Two years later he opened another store in Cumberland, Wyo.

More stores were opened until nearly 200 are now under the company's name. The company has 18 stores in Oregon.

Teacher at Eugene Is Found Dead

Eugene, Or., Jan. 11.—Miss Luella Norris, for 16 years a teacher in the Eugene schools, was found dead today in her bed in this city.

Miss Norris has been feeling unwell and last night made arrangements for a substitute for a few weeks. She was living alone, and when her sister and brother-in-law entered her home they found her dead. Burial will be in this city, with interment in Odd Fellows cemetery beside her parents.

Miss Norris leaves two brothers and two sisters, one of whom is Mrs. Olive Jackson of Portland.

Train Service Is Being Reestablished

Service has been resumed on the N. & W. line, branch of the O. & W. R. & N. One passenger train each way will be run over this branch until the condition of the track permits better service.

The bridge over the Yakima river at Parker has been repaired and service will be normal over the Yakima branch line after Saturday. Passengers have been transferred around the bridge during the past two weeks.

The first train east over the Great Northern since high water tied up traffic will leave Seattle tonight at 7:30 when the Oriental resumes service. Officials of the line report the freight congestion cleared and passenger service will be regular after tomorrow.

FIRST PRESIDENT OF LAVENDER CLUB IS SUMMONED BY DEATH

Mrs. Cordelia Caroline Hanes Was Well Known and Beloved Throughout Community.

Mrs. Cordelia Caroline Hanes died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. K. S. Ervin, 385 Hawthorne avenue, Thursday night. She was born on a plantation near Florence, Ala., in 1852, and came to Portland in 1907.

Mrs. Hanes was the first president of the Penitentiary Park Lavender club, the first of the clubs of that name of which there are now a number in Portland. She took much interest in building up the organization.

Mrs. Hanes was the widow of Judge D. J. Hanes, a prominent member of the G. A. R. and a Mason, who died about five years ago. Mrs. Hanes was a member of the Ladies of the G. A. R. She was known and loved as a friend and coworker by many women throughout the city.

The funeral will be held at 1 p. m. Saturday from the chapel of J. P. Finley & Son, Fifth and Montgomery streets, and interment will be in the G. A. R. cemetery.

Mrs. Anna Webb

Mrs. Anna Webb, a native of Germany, is dead at her home, 861 East Eighth street north. She was born in 1859 and lived in Oregon for 27 years. She is survived by her husband, J. E. Webb, and two children.

The funeral will be held at the Miller & Tracey chapel, Washington and Ella streets, Saturday at 1 p. m., and interment will be in Multnomah Park cemetery.

Herman Munster

Herman Munster died in this city Tuesday at the age of 78. He was a native of Germany, and until five years ago, when he came to Oregon, he had spent most of his life in Chicago. The body was forwarded to Seattle Thursday by Miller & Tracey, where a widow and several children reside.

Mrs. Olive Syme

The body of Mrs. Olive Syme, wife of William Syme, who died Thursday, will be forwarded by Miller & Tracey Saturday to Condon, and funeral services will be held in Fossil. Mrs. Syme was 27 years of age and was born in Fossil.

Alleged Deserter Is Arrested by Police

Arthur Smith, Arrested by Inspectors Coleman and Moloney on Suspicion of Being a Deserter From Army.

Police Inspectors Coleman and J. Moloney arrested Arthur Smith, aged 20, at Third and Burnside streets Thursday afternoon when they became suspicious of the man, who was dressed in the uniform of the Fourth United States engineers. Smith, the inspectors learned, had been making an effort to purchase civilian clothes, and is said by the officers to have told a man that he was going to desert.

When questioned at police headquarters, Smith told them that he was a member of the Fourth engineers and stationed at Vancouver barracks. The officers immediately communicated with the commanding officer at Vancouver and learned that the Fourth engineers had been in France some time in charge of Captain Lowery.

Seeing that the man was trapped, Smith told the police that "he would rot in jail before he would tell them the truth."

It is thought that the man is already a deserter, and he is being held for further investigation by the government authorities.

ATTORNEYS ARE TOLD BY JUDGE KAVANAUGH CHARGES ARE UNTRUE

Ditchburn and Dormitzer Alleged Juvenile Court Tried to Make Boy a Criminal.

"That isn't true and you know it isn't true," said Circuit Judge Kavanaugh heatedly to Attorneys John Ditchburn and Paul Dormitzer, who appeared before him on behalf of Mrs. Ada Hoffmiller, asking a review of the proceeding in the juvenile court in the matter of George Hoffmiller, against whom a charge of delinquency is pending.

"A statement like that is a scandal and a crime and should be stricken from the record."

The statement referred to was an allegation in the petition of Mrs. Hoffmiller, prepared by her attorneys, and is as follows: "They (the officers of the juvenile court) did designedly contrive to make said child a criminal."

"You can't get away with any of that sort of stuff in this court. It isn't true and I know it isn't true and you know it isn't true. If it were, you should not be here before me. You should have appeared before the grand jury and had the officers of the juvenile court indicted. Why don't you go and have them indicted?"

"It is true and we have evidence," one of the attorneys started to interpose.

"I don't believe it, and I won't listen to it," the judge interrupted. "The purpose of our juvenile courts is to protect the child and not make a criminal of him."

After the fireworks died down, Deputy District Attorney Hindman, continued with his argument on the delinquent which he had submitted, contending that the facts alleged in the petition were not sufficient to give the petitioner a standing in court.

The matter was undecided when the court adjourned.

Wife Unsympathetic, Charge

Fred C. Davis began suit for divorce in the circuit court Thursday against Minnie L. Davis, charging cruelty. He alleges that she gave him no sympathy, help, medical aid or attention of any kind, and that she was unkind, cruel, not, he alleges, sign his questionnaire, read it or take any interest in it whatever. She also repudiated him as a husband, he alleges.

Canadian Aid to Be Sought

A petition to be appointed guardian of Beatrice and Dorothy Hinde, aged 14 and 9, respectively, was filed Wednesday in the county court by E. J. Ellison, who states that the purpose of his application is to enable the children to obtain an allotment from the Canadian government, under whose flag their father has been fighting in Europe.
