

SECRET SERVICE IN CLASH WITH COURTS IN CALIFORNIA CITY

Grand Jury Will Investigate Arrests, Judge Insisting Rights Violated.

Los Angeles, Jan. 11.—(U. P.)—The United States grand jury proceeded with its investigation of the arrest of Norbert A. Myles, Nicholas Senn Zogg and Charles Collins Draper, since held on a charge of violating neutrality, on instructions of Federal Judge Bledsoe that there exists a "conspiracy to intimidate and oppress American citizens in the enjoyment of their constitutional rights."

The injunction is leveled against the activities of the United States intelligence department here with Captain A. S. Gibson at its head.

The court's injunction recites details of what it terms the abuse of the authority of the department. Myles was searched by day and night without due process of law, the court alleges. Myles and Zogg were seized and imprisoned in a federal prison without any warrant, a bail and chain placed on their legs and informed that the arrest or charge was denied to their families, while the men were held incommunicado for several days.

parliaments of Europe in making democratic history." Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the National American Woman Suffrage association, said today, "It is with supreme confidence, therefore, that we now turn to the senate and expect passage of the amendment by that body within a very short time."

The house resolution was reported to the senate today and a senate suffrage resolution is now on the calendar. A conference was planned today at which decision will be reached on when to push the amendment to a vote.

Republican Votes Target

The power of the women's vote in states already suffrage and the "inevitableness" of their eventually getting what they want, is the note behind their confidence in the senate outcome. Mrs. Maud Wood Park, leader of the congressional forces, today said it was "gripping" how the men of both parties suddenly and with "facile grace" rose to the suffrage appeal and secured to each party some of the advantages bound to accrue to those through whose votes the amendment was passed.

One hundred and sixty-five Republicans voted for the amendment and 104 Democrats. Miscellaneous votes added five more, making the total 274.

Already the women are planning their fight to have the amendment ratified by the states. They are certain of 36 states, Mrs. Catt said today—and included New York.

"We expect that most of the 1918 legislatures—there are only a few in ses-

sion this year—will dispose of the amendment favorably at an early date.

All Claiming Credit

"The legislatures of 41 states convene next year. A few of these states will need additional time for suffrage legislation, but we are confident a majority will ratify before the close of 1919."

Today everyone is claiming credit for the house victory. The Woman's Party militants allege they did it by "picketing to show what sacrifices we could make for the cause"; the National association leaders say they did it by refraining from picketing and working "state by state until the psychological moment came to press for an amendment; Republicans claim credit and point to their superior vote favoring the amendment and the vote of 102 Democrats and only 33 Republicans against it; the Democrats claim the credit, saying that if it had not been for President Wilson the amendment couldn't have passed.

SUFFRAGISTS WIN IN HOUSE, GETTING BARE ESSENTIAL TWO THIRDS

Washington, Jan. 11.—(I. N. S.)—The woman suffrage constitutional amendment passed the house by a vote of 274 to 136. Only the bare two thirds majority was obtained. Speaker Clark not voting.

The result was so close that the victors had actually not a single vote to spare. Two thirds of 410 votes (the total of 274 ayes and 136 nays) makes 274-136. But the house parliamentarian ruled that you can "not split a man" into a third or any fraction.

Had not Representatives Mann and Sims both risen from their sick beds in order to vote aye, the result would have been in dire jeopardy. The only thing that could have saved the suffrage day would have been that with only one of these men present there was still Speaker Clark to be counted upon. The suffragists had him as an "ace in the hole" for he was scheduled to vote "aye."

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bring assistance to the survivors on the rafts.

Lieutenant Richards was given orders to take charge of the survivors and keep the rafts together. The commanding officer and the navigating officer, Lieutenant Scott, knew accurately the position of the ship when she sank and also knew the course to the nearest port. They therefore made the trip in the motor dory with four men to assist.

All the provisions and medical kit from the motorboat were left with the men on the rafts except a few boxes of agency rations and half a bucket of water. The boat had to be pulled by oars, as the engine would not run.

Boat Later Picked Up

After a very trying trip, during which it was necessary to steer by the stars and by the direction of the wind, the boat was picked up at 1 o'clock the next afternoon by a small patrol vessel. The senior officer of the station to which this patrol vessel belonged informed Lieutenant Commander Bagley that the other survivors had all been rescued.

Commander Bagley gives unstinted praise to the behavior of officers and men.

Lieutenant Norman Scott of St. Louis, executive officer, accomplished a great deal toward getting boats and rafts in the water, turning off steam from the fireroom to the engine room, getting lifebelts and splinter mats from the bridge into the water, in person firing signal guns, encouraging and assisting the men and in general doing everything possible in the short time available. He was of invaluable assistance during the trip.

Lieutenant (junior grade) S. F. Kalk of Washington, D. C., during the early part of the evening, though already in a weakened condition, went from one raft to another in order to equalize weight on the rafts. The men who were on the rafts with him state, in their own words, that "his game to the last."

Lieutenant (junior grade) N. N. Gates of Bay City, Mich., was reported calm and efficient in the performance of duty.

During the night, Charles Charlesworth of New York city, boatwain's mate first class, removed parts of his own clothing when all realized that their lives depended on keeping warm to try to keep alive men more thinly clad than himself. Commander Bagley recommended that he be commended for his action.

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REPUBLIC IS DEMANDED BY THE CZECHS

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 11.—(U. P.)—Czech leaders of Silesia and Moravia met at Prague yesterday and adopted resolutions demanding a Czech republic, according to information reaching here today.

The government, it was stated, was exhibiting alarm over growth of such a republican sentiment, and has doubled the garrison at Prague.

German and Austrian newspapers received here point to growth of the Czech movement and demand government action to curb it.

needs have been met. Every man in France has full equipment. There is

plenty of artillery there. Production is going forward at a rapid rate.

"I don't know how you can say that in view of the lack of rifles, artillery and machine guns at cantonments," said Senator Chamberlain.

"My mind was not on the situation in this country. It was thinking of our troops abroad," said Baker.

Senator McKellar said he was told today by an officer from Camp Upton, N. Y., that there is no artillery there.

"There is not enough, but there is some," Baker replied.

"If the ordnance department had rushed the work to capacity ever since April, it would not have been possible to supply enough artillery and ammunition by this time for all of our needs," Baker added.

"The reason I called attention to your statement is that it creates false belief that there is no shortage," said Wadsworth.

"That is true, there is none," insisted Baker.

"I must differ with you on that," said Wadsworth.

"I repeat that the men abroad are fully equipped with the latest needs," Baker said. "It would, of course, be pleasing if we had enough artillery, machine guns and ammunition to equip the training camps, but we never will have all we need. When we supply present needs we will have to continue, for we'll need more."

Senator Chamberlain inquired whether

Baker's feeling of security regarding the artillery situation was justified in view of the Italian debacle and Russia's defection.

"Will not France have to supply Italy with ordnance?" asked Chamberlain.

"And what will happen to us if she does?"

"I have not been advised that France will be in the least unable to do for us what she has agreed to do and is eager to do," said Baker.

"Wrong Impression Feared

"I think common sense would tell you there is danger there," said Chamberlain. "I agree with Senator Wadsworth that the wrong impression is being given the country."

"What I wanted the country to understand," replied Baker, "is that our troops in France are and will be fully supplied with artillery, ammunition and other needs."

"Probably," interjected Chamberlain. "Don't you think we ought to take the country into our confidence and tell them we haven't got enough artillery?" asked McKellar.

"I see no reason to afflict the country with a doubt, I don't feel," said Baker. "I am confident the supply will be adequate for all troops sent to the front."

McKellar insisted that the impression had not been left with him and declared Baker had been wrong about the initial rush needs so long as the "rushiest need,"

the training of men, is being delayed by lack of equipment."

Wadsworth declared the artillery program, in his judgment, is not nearly extensive enough and thought the country ought to know the exact facts.

Senator Weeks told of lack of equipment at Camp Bowie, Fort Worth, Texas.

"How do you reconcile the statement that there is no general lack with that?" he asked.

"I didn't say that," snapped Baker. "I said initial rush needs were cared for."

"You ought to have defined initial rush needs," said Weeks.

"Those are simple words," replied Baker.

"Yes, but they give the country the wrong idea of the situation," maintained Weeks.

Traffic men, who discussed the matter yesterday, decided that if an increase in the number of trains can be brought about, so that tickets may be good on any of the three roads, curtailment of the service should follow.
