CHASED CLAY PIGEONS OVER 13,000 MILES

Henry R. Everding Shot More Targets on Coast Than Any Other Amateur Shooter.

Record of registered shoots attended by H. R. Everding. Table with columns: Place and date, Shot at, Broke.

Pointing the muzzle of his gun at "tar hawks" in practically every registered trapshooting tournament in five western states, Henry R. Everding, former president and secretary of the Portland gun club...

Out of the 6715 registered targets, Hy shattered 5029, giving him an average of 852, the highest he has registered since he became a follower of the "king of sports."

Everding's biggest trophy of the season was the winning of the preliminary event of the Pacific Coast handicap at San Jose. In this event, he hung up a mark of 98 out of 100.

He was high amateur in the individual championship shoot of Arizona with a mark of 49 out of 50, and he tied O. N. Ford of San Jose for the California-Nevada championship in the individual championship shoot of the Washington State title.

Wound Up in Blaze
He wound up the year in a blaze of glory in the annual H. H. Hopkins of Phoenix and Ray, Ariz., he shot at 1800 registered targets and succeeded in shattering 5366 percentage of them in the present season two additional shoot at Vernon in which he hung up an average of better than 94 per cent.

Hy's one ambition of last year was to attend the Grand American handicap, which was staged in Chicago, but illness prevented him from attending the blue rock classic of the world.

For a true sportsman, in every sense of the word, there is none who ranks higher than Hy. During the past five years he has done more to put Portland on the trapshooting map than any other man and his efforts have been rewarded. Portland, mainly through his efforts, is now recognized as having one of the two or three most aggressive trap organizations in the country.

Decoy ducks—those faithful birds that have lured many a teal and a wigeon to his or her destruction—will become the victims of the H. C. of L. shortly after sundown tonight.

The fact that today is the last Sunday of the duck shooting season means that a majority of the shooters will come home tonight with a "full house"—the decoys being a part of their bags.

The H. C. of L. gets the decoys coming and going. In the first place the price of meat is high and in the second place it would cost too much to keep them over until next season.

Whether the shooters will waste shot and shell on the decoys or adopt the old familiar "choke" hold to put them in shape for the buckskin noose is up to individual fancy.

Down on Savies island there is a shingle bearing the name "Geraldine" and the date of demise. Said shingle, with its neat red trimmings of paint left from row boat decorating, marks the resting place of a faithful decoy duck.

"Geraldine" served his master, A. K. Downs, for several years. He was a pet and would come at Downs' beck and call. In the evening when it was time to pull in the decoys there was no expostulating with "Geraldine." All Downs had to do was to say "Geraldine" and he would walk right into his sack ready for the jaunt back to the cabin. A faithful servitor was the lamented "Geraldine."

Three or four yards in the lead was the Kaiser Wilhelm of the deck cavalcade, the rest bringing up the rear in a perfect angle.

Said Everding's friend: "Well, I'm going to take a long shot at that leader and knock off his head. In doing this, Mr. Everding, you will observe that I wear no false whiskers to deceive you. Not a shot will flick a feather on any other bird in that crowd. Now, Mr. Everding, watch me closely as I pull the trigger. I shall lead the fore bird by about three and one-half feet, as you will detect by noting the muzzle of my fowling piece in alignment, dead ahead the noodle of yon generalissimo of flight."

Boom! (Indicating that the trigger has been pulled and the lead is on its way.) Swish! Swish! Swish! Ker-chug! (Indicating that the bellwether has fallen into the lake.) "That was some shot, believe me, gentlemen," concluded Mr. Everding.

CLUB GRID SCHEDULE NOT MADE

Arranging Football Dates for Next Fall to Be Left to New Manager at Multnomah.

THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON and the Oregon Agricultural college are seeking gridiron games with the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club team for next fall, but nothing definite regarding the dates of these contests will be done until the new manager is appointed, according to an announcement made by George Bertz, manager of the club team.

When the contract to play the annual Oregon-O. A. C. game on Thanksgiving day was signed in the spring of 1917, it was verbally agreed that Multnomah was to have two games with each team, but on account of the late opening of the colleges last fall, only one game was played with the service and chances are that some of the players remaining will be caught in the next draft.

Portland sport fans have not given Multnomah the support that is coming to the club. The football games last fall did not attract as many fans as was expected and unless they rally to the sport they will have to contend with one college contest and high school games.

Walter Camp, the dean of American football criticism, named the former University of Oregon players on his all-service team of the Pacific Coast district.

Camp's selection was: Ends—Hunt, naval reserve; Mitchell, Mare Island; Tackles—Beckett, Mare Island; Moriarty, naval reserve; Guards—Snyder, 21st division; Holden, 21st division; Fullback—Brown, 21st division; Quarter—Brown, Mare Island; Halfbacks—McKay, 21st division; Norris, Naval reserve; Fullback—Huntington, 21st division.

Johnny Beckett, former captain of the University of Oregon team, was named on the first All-American service team, and "Brick" Mitchell was named on the second team. Bill Holden and Bill Holden were named on the third eleven. Beckett and Mitchell played with the Mare Island Marines and Snyder and Holden with 21st division eleven.

J. D. Paull, Princeton '17, who died recently in France as a result of an accident while training in the aviation service, is the first American intercollegiate athlete to give up his life at the front since the United States entered the war. Paull rowed in the Princeton crew in 1916, and was a member of the Charter club. His home was in Pittsburg.
