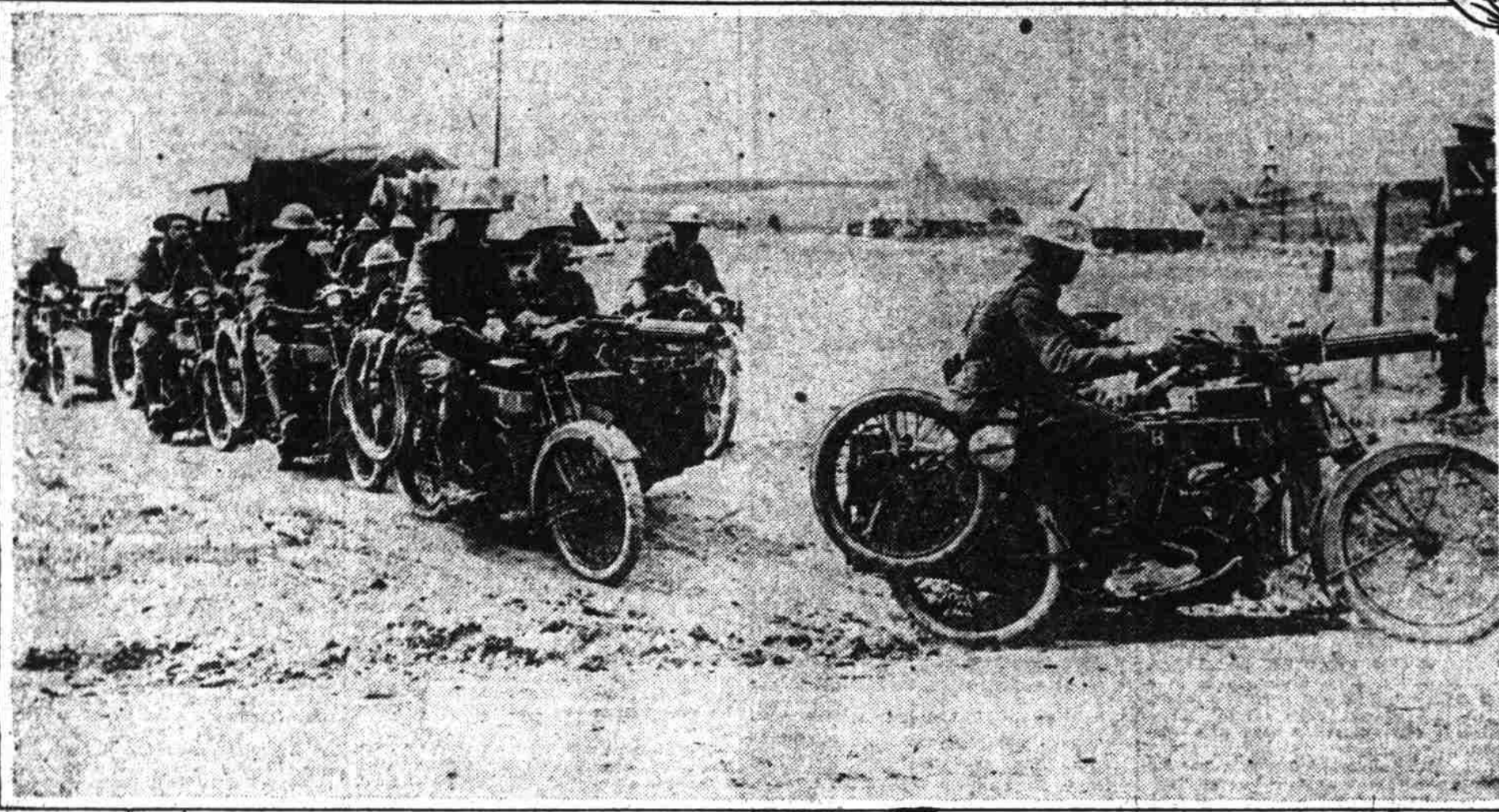


# THE WAR IN PICTORIAL REVIEW



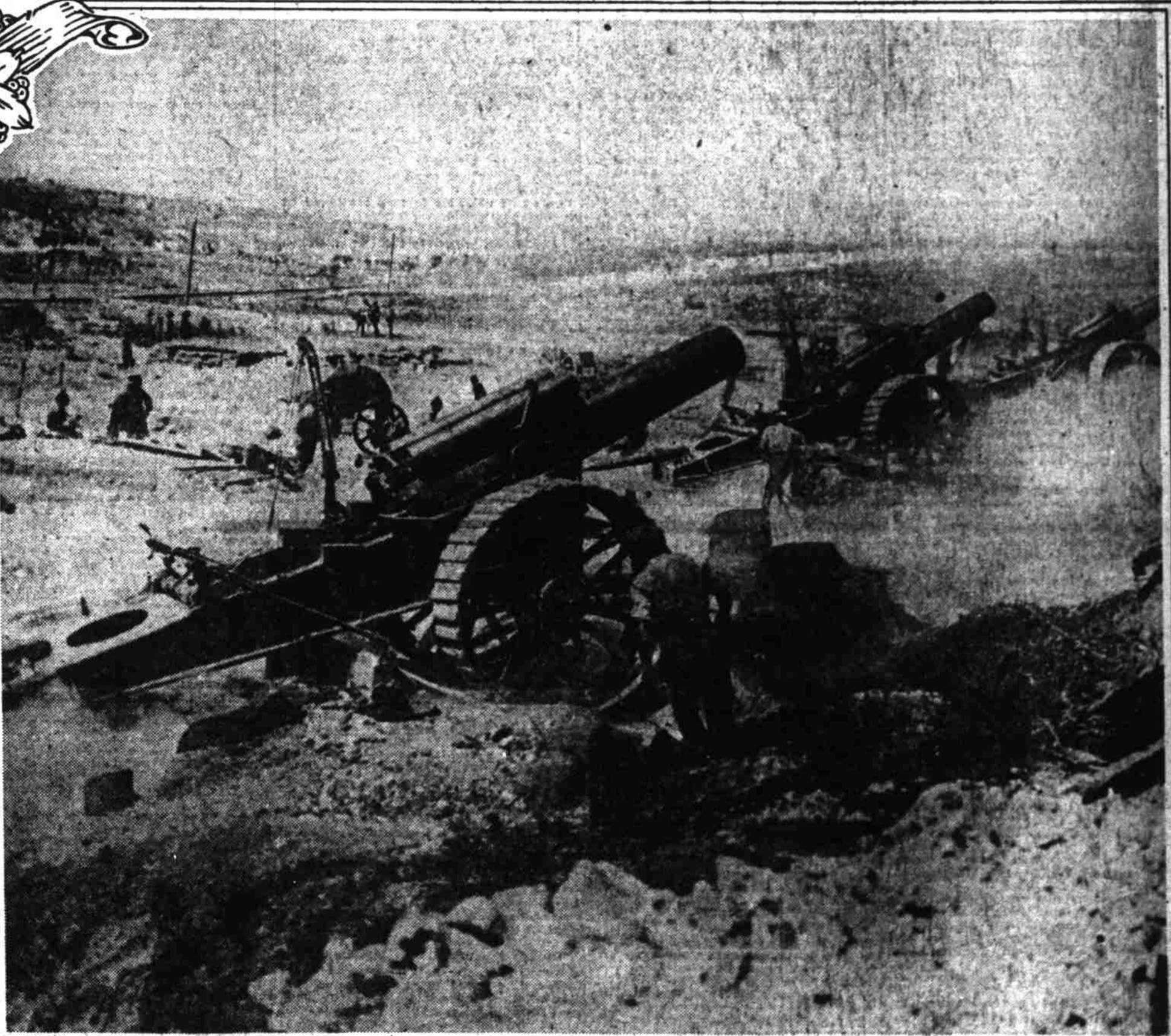

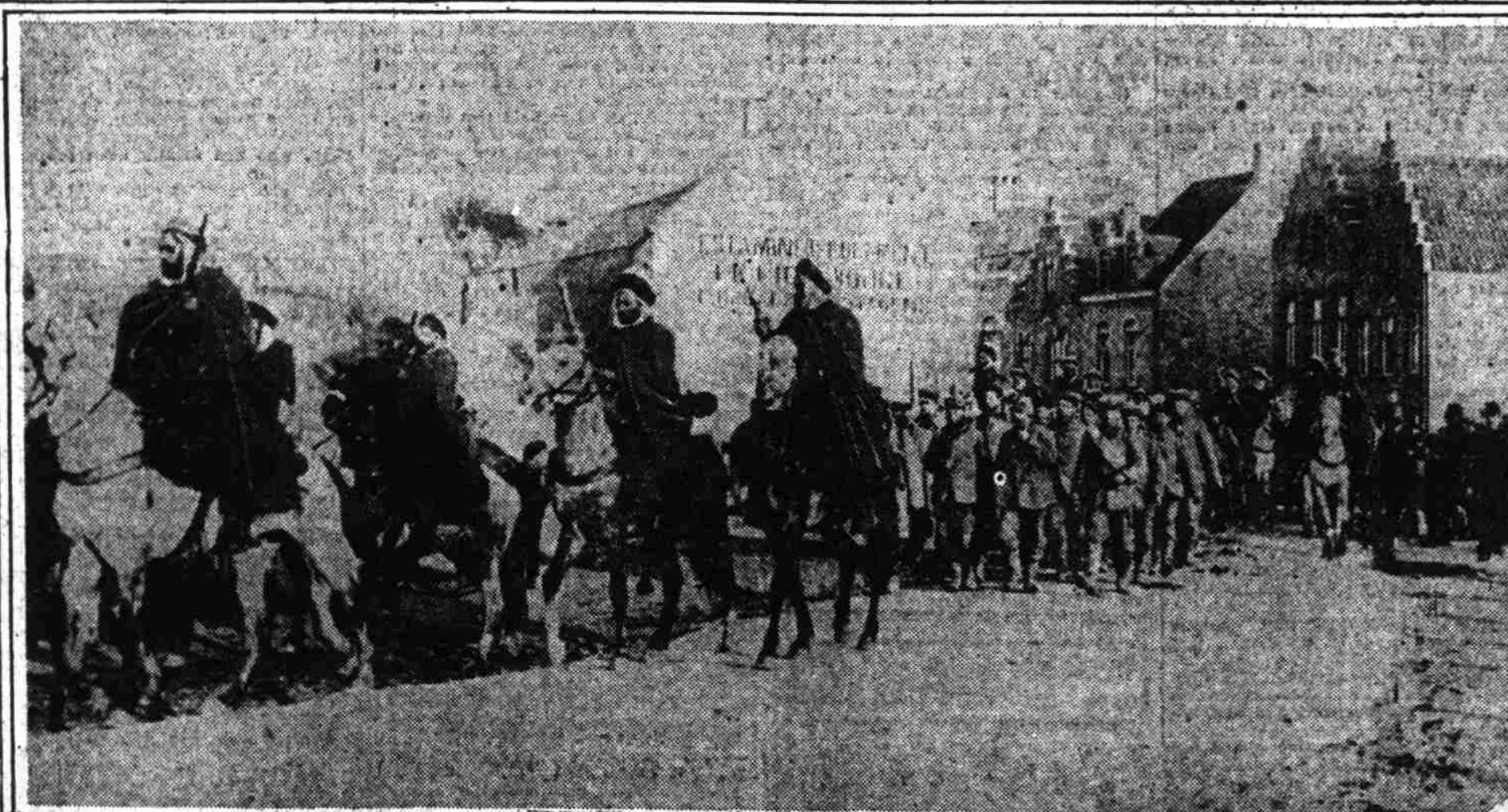
The eyes of an army. With a glass to his eye and a telephone to his ear, this officer, concealed in a dugout on a sidehill in the Balkans, is directing artillery fire. The wireless telegraph is commonly used in this work, field equipments being readily transported and set up for use where needed. Such is the contribution of science to modern warfare.

A British battery in action on the west front. During the early days of the war the allies' artillery was inferior to that of the German, and it was not until the battle of the Somme in the summer of 1916 that allied superiority was established in this line. These huge pieces shoot with a force and an accuracy that carries death and destruction the distance of several miles.



Algerian cavalymen in France. A detachment of horsemen from Africa escorting captured Germans through a town just across the French border. The participation of colonials in the warfare in Europe has given a picturesque touch to the strife, and these men from far places have acquitted themselves with credit. The Algerians shown above volunteered for service.



Wasp nest that sends death sting to German airmen on the west front. Anti-aircraft battery cleverly concealed in the Marne section waiting for the first adventuresome Boche flier to come over.
