

SMALLER DAIRY OWNERS OBJECT TO PROPOSED ORDER

Farcical Turn Is Given to Public Hearing on Proposed Ordinance—Little Known of Law.

MANN EXPLAINS MEASURE

Motion Made That One and Two Cow Dairies Be Exempted From Rules of Regulation.

The public hearing on the proposed new municipal milk ordinance was given a farcical turn, Tuesday evening at the city hall by the dense ignorance of its provisions confessed by city commissioners.

Commissioner Barbur declared he had received a copy only long enough before the hearing to glance through its text, but not long enough to compare its requirements with the ordinance now in effect.

Commissioner Kellaher referred to its numerous sheets of galley proofs as a "wall paper edition."

Commissioner Bigelow, who presided in the absence of Mayor Baker, said he lacked familiarity with the terms of the measure which would enable him to discourse fluently on it.

Public Expression Sought

Commissioner Mann, who sponsored the proposed ordinance, said no exception could be taken to it from the health and inspection standpoint, but he explained, too, that failure to put the text of the ordinance in the hands of the commissioners in time for them to familiarize themselves with its contents was not due to a desire to "put it over on the city," and that the hearing was called merely to start an expression of popular sentiment.

Popular sentiment as represented at the meeting was most expressive. It quickly became apparent that the one and two-cow dairies, of which there are hundreds in and near Portland, viewed the measure as an issue of "to be or not to be." They attacked the definition of a standard dairy contained in the ordinance with none of the kindness and the applause that greeted each telling point of one speaker after another showed that the little dairymen were largely in the majority at the hearing.

Small Dairies Object

The definition recognized as a dairy any place where milk is produced for sale and in equipment required for all dairies a three room milk house containing a milk room, a wash room and a boiler room. The little dairies contended that they could not carry the cost of equipment as elaborate and expensive as that of large dairies where a considerable volume of milk is handled.

Commissioners Barbur, Kellaher and Mann shared this view. Commissioner Barbur made and Commissioner Kellaher seconded the motion which, as stated by Commissioner Bigelow was

Looks Like Seals Are Up Against a Regular Skin Game

Seattle, Jan. 16.—(U. P.)—The United States fisheries bureau steamer Roosevelt is in port today with the first cargo of seal products, including 425 sealskins, 299 tons of seal bones as valuable fertilizer and corned seal meats, liver and brains for experimental use.

Every ounce of the seal carcasses hereafter is to be used for commercial purposes, according to Captain H. Bied.

A 3-year-old seal yields 50 or 60 pounds of choice shoulder meat. About 35,000 seals will be killed this year at the Pribilof Island seal rookeries, according to Captain Bied, making about 900 tons of meat.

"That the one and two cow dairies be exempted from the provisions of this ordinance." The action, though taken unanimously, followed a declaration from F. M. Kiger, representing the Portland Milk Producers' association, that not to impose uniform requirements for inspection upon all dairies is to discriminate unfairly.

Food administrator W. B. Ayer declared that a change in the milk inspection ordinance such as might affect the price or production of milk would be most unfortunate at the present time. He called attention to the fact that Portland, under the present ordinance, succeeded in reaching the top of the list of American cities in purity of milk production.

It is probable that further consideration of the ordinance will be deferred until some future time.

Hawley Proposed as Senator From Idaho

James H. Hawley, former governor of Idaho, ought to be appointed United States senator to succeed the late Senator James H. Brady, according to L. L. Burtenshaw, an attorney of Council, Idaho, who is staying at the Portland for a short visit.

"Governor Hawley is the big man of Idaho today," Mr. Burtenshaw said this morning. "For the good of the state and of the nation he ought to be appointed by Governor Alexander to fill the vacancy caused by Senator Brady's death."

Mr. Burtenshaw says he believes Governor Hawley's chances of appointment are good, although Governor Alexander has not given any definite indication as to whom he would appoint.

U. S. Vice-Consul at Edinburgh Passes

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ARMY SUPPLIES IN BROOKLYN BURNED

Investigation Begun, as Incendiarism Is Suspected—Ice Floes Hamper Fireboats.

New York, Jan. 16.—(U. P.)—More than half a million dollars' worth of army supplies have been destroyed by a fire which is sweeping the Robinson warehouse at the foot of Congress street, Brooklyn. The building was filled with food supplies awaiting shipment to France by the government.

Suspecting that the fire might be of incendiary origin, Fire Marshal Brophy ordered his entire staff to start an investigation immediately.

The blaze started in the employees' washroom on the second floor. Workmen attacked the flames with extinguishers and buckets, but before the first fire apparatus arrived the fire had spread over the entire floor and was creeping into the upper stories. Four alarms were sounded in rapid succession, calling the greater part of the Brooklyn fire department's apparatus to the scene.

The blaze is only two blocks from the scene of the \$3,000,000 grain store fire of last November.

Three fire boats which sped toward the burning structure are blocked by huge ice floes. An hour after the blaze started the boats were still trying to batter their way to the piers surrounding the building.

Efforts are being made to remove three big steamships which are docked two blocks below the fire. One of the steamers is said to be loaded with shells.

Alien Enemy Declared 40-Pinocls He Also Declared Himself Into Jail

Breaking up a pinocle game Tuesday night in Erickson's pool room, Deputy United States Marshal Tichenor bagged two alien Germans who gave their names as John Rigley and Oscar A. K. Kroll.

Hearing the Teutonic sound of the conversation between two pinocle players, Deputy Tichenor asked permission to sit in their game.

The game proceeded as do all pinocle games until one of the Germans said: "Wait a minute, I have a 40 pinocle."

No casualties have been reported.

Two Ordered Interned

Federal authorities today received orders for the internment of Frank W. Kramer and Max Emil Prusa, German aliens arrested in the restricted waterfront area. They will be taken to Vancouver barracks and later sent to one of the internment camps.

Seattle Boys Held

Two boys who said they had run away from Seattle were arrested by Officer Powell Tuesday night at Sixth and Couch streets. They gave their names as Arthur Bailey, 15, and Jim Bailey, 14. They said they came to Portland to visit some friends but could not find them. They were turned over to juvenile court officer Timmons.

"Bet you my watch against your naturalization papers you haven't," said Tichenor.

"I have no naturalization papers, but if I had you bet you my life I would put dem up," was the answer at Sixth and Couch streets.

Both Germans were in the restricted waterfront area and neither had received his citizenship papers, so the game was closed and a trip to the Multnomah county jail followed.

Their cases have been turned over to Assistant United States Attorney Rankin.

WAR BOARD CREATED WILL STUDY DEMANDS AND SUPPLY OF LABOR

John Lind Heads New War Board Appointed by Secretary Wilson to Study Labor Situation.

Washington, Jan. 16.—(U. P.)—John Lind, former governor of Minnesota and the man whom President Wilson sent to Mexico to tell the late Huerta he must resign, will head a national war labor board, named Tuesday by Secretary of Labor Wilson. Five other men and one woman are on the board.

Representatives of the employers are Waddill Catchings of New York and A. A. Landon of Buffalo. For the employees are John B. Lennon of Illinois, treasurer of the American Federation of Labor and John J. Casey of Pennsylvania. Representing women will be Agnes Nestor of Chicago, president of the Chicago Woman's Trade Union league. Dr. L. C. Marshall, economy expert, will be the economist for the board.

Standardization of labor policies, maintenance of stable and adequate supply of workers, labor dilution and training, priority demands, adjustments of disputes, safeguards of employment and living and housing conditions will be studied.

Business Ahead of Delegates So Extensive That More Time Is Needed for Discussion.

Astoria, Or., Jan. 16.—Business before the State Federation of Labor will probably extend its session in Astoria over another day. From the multiplicity of resolutions, extended discussions and general good fellowship that permeates the convention hall, time has flown with the delegates until the three days have been consumed with about half the business of the convention still remaining on the table for final action.

The question of where the convention is to meet next year will be finally determined this afternoon. Bend and other cities throughout the state are clamoring for it, and the vote on the question promises to be close.

May Nominate Tonight

The nomination of officers will be among the last official business. This will probably take place at tonight's session. The election of officers is left to a referendum vote of the different local unions.

The Moose club tendered the delegates the full use of its club rooms and a dinner was accepted in the same spirit as it was tendered.

The resolution offered asking the federation to endorse a candidate for state labor commission was finally withdrawn.

A resolution was passed opposing the practice of employing contract physicians for medical service in the different industrial plants.

A resolution was passed favoring the employment of a boiler and engine inspector for the protection of labor.

Workers Tired to Vote

Another resolution was passed urging all laboring men to register during city and state elections and exercise their prerogative of voting at all elections.

The morning session was occupied for a considerable time on the debate of the resolution asking for a state inspector of shipyards. Every angle of the resolution was discussed and labor's part in a campaign to speed up shipbuilding was discussed.

The resolution was again referred to a committee with some changes to report back at the earliest date. The question will probably be put on the ballot at the next state election.
