WEATHER CONDITIONS
 Low pressure prevails in the Lake region and upper Mississippi and Ohio valleys, and eastward to the Atlantic coast, and a trough-like depression extends from British Columbia and Alberta southward to Utah and Colorado. High pressure over the southern and middle western states, and an important high pressure area is central off the middle Pacific coast. Precipitation has occurred in the northern Pacific and Rocky Mountain states, and is reported from a few scattering stations in the northern plateau region and the north Atlantic states. The following heavy rainfall is reported: Tacoma, Wash., 1.85 inches; Vancouver, B. C., 1.40 inches. This weather is colder on the north Pacific coast and over most of the eastern half of the United States. Chinook winds are blowing in Montana, attended by rapidly rising temperature. The temperature is generally below normal on the Pacific slope. Forecast weather extends southward to the Gulf of Mexico.

TOWN TOPICS

Several lectures announced—Subjects for University of Oregon lectures at the Central library this evening are: "The Contribution of the Barbarian Peoples," Dr. George Heber; "Continuation of the subject of Fugue and Some Elementary Consideration of the Double and Triple Fugue," Dr. John Landis; "The course on musical analysis in the harmony class," Dr. Landis will discuss the distinguished seventh chord and its various resolutions and uses; Dr. H. W. DeWitt will talk on "The Fundamental Principle of a Child's Mental Development." Greek sculpture will be discussed by Dr. DeWitt and Dr. John Howard will talk on "Protective Coloration of Birds."

New Map of State Issued—The general passenger department of the Southern Pacific company in Portland has just issued a new map of Oregon which is unique in that it is the first map of its kind to be produced in the state. The map was drawn by F. A. Wells, Jr., of the Oregon Engraving company and is printed by Sweeney, Arney & Straub. The map folds to pocket size, shows all county and township divisions, railroad lines, etc., and on the reverse side contains a wealth of information relative to the resources of the state.

Robbery Laid to Trio—Inspectors Goltz, Howell, Snow and Leonard believe the three young men who stole an automobile from Park and Alder streets Tuesday, and who abandoned it after smashing into another auto at Williams avenue and Ivy street, are the trio that robbed I. T. Woodruff, 1291 Mallory avenue, the same night. The stolen machine belonged to A. S. McIntosh. It collided with a machine belonging to J. P. Hanley, 337 Cook avenue. As soon as the accident occurred the three jumped from the stolen car and ran away.

Hour's Stay Disastrous—J. J. Champion, en route to Seattle from California with two suitcases of whiskey and alcohol, was forced to stay an hour in Portland Thursday owing to poor train connections and was arrested by Patrolman Meyers on a charge of violating the prohibition law. He was taken before Assistant United States Attorney Beckman, who filed a complaint against him. He will be given a hearing before United States Commissioner Drake.

Canadians to Be Guests—University club directors have arranged a dinner for Lieutenant Colonel J. M. McMillan, Major F. B. Edwards and Captain E. J. Gook, Canadian army officers, who are touring the country under the auspices of the Council of National Defense. Short talks of their experiences at the front will be a feature. The officers were members of the first expeditionary force.

Lecture on Prison Life—At the Vancouver Avenue Norwegian-Danish M. E. church, Vancouver avenue and Skidmore street, Saturday night, Rev. Elias Gjerding will lecture on "Prison Life at San Quentin," the California state prison. The pastor has made a special study of this subject while he was a pastor at Oakland, Cal. The lecture is given under the auspices of the Young People's society "Lyng."

Birds to Be Topic—Hawks and Owls will be the subject of an illustrated talk on birds by W. A. Elliot, before the Audubon Bird club tomorrow night at 8 o'clock in the story hour room, Central library. The birds described will include most of the hawks, owls, eagles and vultures of Oregon. The public is invited.

Eleven Caught in Raid—Officers Teeter and Schum raided a room at 127 Russell street Thursday night and arrested 11 men on charges of gambling or violating game law. E. Olsen is charged with conducting the game and is out on \$100 bail. Eight men charged with gambling are held under \$25 bail each, and two visitors are held under \$10 bail each.

Automobile Breaks Man's Leg—Charles Boone, 998 East Eleventh street, was struck by an automobile at East Twelfth and Burnside streets Thursday night. His right leg was broken. The driver of the machine was not identified, nor was the number of the automobile secured. Boone was taken to the Emanuel hospital.

Thought He Was Exempt—Oyo Scholtz, age 25, was arrested this morning by Deputy United States Marshal Carter on charges of failing to register. He said he did not think the government would take him for military service because he worked on a farm and had a weak back. Information was filed against him three days ago. He will be arraigned in the federal court Saturday.

Had Old Tag Fined \$2.45—Mrs. Earl R. Keller was the first person to be fined in 1918 for driving an automobile with 1917 tags on. Mr. Keller appeared in court and paid the fine of \$2.50. Municipal Judge Rossman said that he was going to be very strict in enforcing this ordinance and that violators could expect heavier fines in the future.

Bus and Car Collide—A Broadway car and the Multnomah hotel bus collided at the intersection of Broadway and Alder streets Thursday night, when the driver of the bus attempted to pass in front of the car. The front windows in the car were shattered. The bus escaped without noticeable damage. No one was injured.

Lebanon, Or., Jan. 18.—Late Wednesday afternoon a fire broke out in the Joseph Carpenter home near the S. P. depot here. The auto truck belonging to the Lebanon Creamery was the first vehicle to appear, and one of the hose carts was attached to it and was being taken to the fire when, in making the turn at the corner at the First National bank, the cart skidded to the opposite side of the street where it demolished the porcelain drinking fountain at the corner.

The cart turned over onto the sidewalk and was dragged for some distance before the truck could be brought to a stop. The vehicles were soon started up again and reached the fire in time to prevent extensive damage to the house. The fountain was erected and donated by the Lebanon public by Dennis Cormier about two years ago.

Baker County Is For Bulk Handling

Professor Henry E. Tweed, County Farm Agent, prepares to launch campaign outlined at conference at Corvallis.

Baker, Or., Jan. 18.—Professor Henry E. Tweed, Baker county farm agent, has returned from Corvallis, where he has been in attendance at the conference of county farm agents of the state, and is preparing to launch among the farmers of the county a plan for the bulk handling of grain, which the conference determined was the most vital factor in accomplishing maximum production and most efficient marketing.

Professor Tweed is assured by the federal department of agriculture that four federal agents will be sent here to aid in the work and he proposes a vigorous campaign among the farmers through the aid of the Baker county farmers.
