Stage Setting
In "On Trial"
Is Novel

Miss Gates Gives Excellent Portrayal of Part of the Wife;
Horton Wins New Laurels.

TENSE moments are not lacking in "On Trial," given this week at the Baker theatre.

Besides being of dramatic interest, the play is interesting from the novel way in which the scenes are changed to throw the bits of the story together until the whole fabric has been weaved.

The courtroom scene is handled as moving picture plays are presented. As the defendant testifies the court room gradually grows dark, voices dwindle lower, then the lights reveal another scene showing the action being described by the defendant on the stand.

All parts of the play are well staged and reflect the credit of both directors and actors. Edward Horton, George Taylor, Ruth Gates, James Guy Usher and others handle the big parts and with taste.

Miss Gates played exceptionally well the wife of the defendant on trial. Her characterization was colorful but not overdone. She gave a womanly impersonation.

Edward Horton presents a forceful role and James Guy Usher does some heavy acting as the villain. George Taylor makes a good counsel for the defense and Smith Davies plays the prosecuting attorney.

The company was augmented by several persons in order to fill out the large cast. They all played their parts well.

Bill Is Capital One

"Slim" Grindell, appearing with Esther Caryl at Pantages this week, bears a strong resemblance to George Ade in the days of his callow youth. The resemblance is not altogether physical, for each has capitalized his eccentricities and enriched the world with laughter. Grindell & Esther earn the generous approbation of the Pantages audience in a bill replete with class A acts. Harry Reichman wins applause with his songs and naive banter. Marjorie Lake, the prenominal lady baritone, affords genuine pleasure with her rare vocal gift and in "College Days" puts life and vigor into a light musical skit. The "Erna Antonio Three," in a display of strength and feminine grace, easily earn their title, "the trio par excellence." The songs of old Erin never grow old and the world would be a dreary place indeed without them. Burke, Touhey & Co. in "Going to the Wedding," win all hearts and hands with their Irish songs and repartee. Wilson's seven lions do their act well and roar most villainously at their trainer. Those who have been following "The Fatal Ring," a thrilling serial photoplay, will rejoice in the felicitous final episode.

"The Price of a Good Time," adapted by Lois Weber from "The Whim," by Marion Orth, and directed by Miss Weber and Phillips Smalley, opens at the Star theatre Saturday, with Mildred Harris as the featured player supported by Kenneth Harlan and a carefully chosen cast. E. P. Martin, deputy head consul of the Woodmen of the World of the Northwest jurisdiction, has received officially the summary of the action of the special session of the head camp at Denver, January 15 and 16. The constitution was amended to provide for a special patriotic war benefit fund of 10 cents for each \$1000 of protection carried, which will be used to pay the benefits of members in the United States or allied service. A per capita tax of 2 cents a month is added with which to maintain members in good standing who are in the military service. This applies only to those who were members and in the military or naval service prior to January 15. Those drafted hereafter must pay their own dues and assessments. The date of the next head camp session was postponed until July, 1920, from July 1919. It is estimated that the order has 10,000 members in the service of the flag from the nine Pacific coast states.
