WEATHER CONDITIONS
 Three well defined areas of low pressure are present this morning, one being centered over the New England coast, one in eastern South Dakota and one off the Alaska coast. High pressure prevails over the state west of the Rocky mountains, and an area reaching from the Great Lakes to the Gulf of Mexico. The weather is generally milder west of the Mississippi river, except in the extreme south-west. Lower temperature prevails east of the Mississippi river, freezing weather extending well into Florida. The temperature is above normal over most of the western half of the country, and is below normal in the central, eastern and southern states. High winds prevail in the northern Plains states.
 The low pressure area noted off the Alaska coast is expected to cause rain in Portland and its vicinity tonight and Thursday.

HARDWARE DEALERS OF STATE GATHER IN ANNUAL CONVENTION

R. T. Jacobs of Internal Revenue Department Explains Federal Tax.

An address by Ben R. Vardaman on "The Philosophy of Modern Business" marked the session of the Oregon Retail Hardware and Implement Dealers' association in the Imperial hotel this morning.

"We should have more cooperation among the merchants," said Mr. Vardaman. "I notice in some of the smaller towns the merchants do not get together, and the result is that they do not have the business spirit that is displayed by more progressive communities."

R. T. Jacobs of the United States internal revenue department gave a wealth of information to the visiting delegates on the federal income and gift tax laws. A question box, an interesting feature of this convention, is popular with the visiting delegates.

Collector of Internal Revenue Milton A. Miller gave a patriotic address this morning on "Our Country at War." This afternoon C. A. Bigelow, city commissioner, addressed the assembly on "What Fire Prevention Has Done for Portland." Frank B. White spoke on "Holding the Trade in the Local Trade Center."
