ONE YEAR AGO

The Portland Chamber of Commerce decided to submit to the legislature a constitutional amendment giving the people of the Port of Portland district authority to vote a tax not exceeding 1 per cent of the assessed valuation of the port district, proceeds to be used as a subsidy in aid of water transportation lines out of Portland. Multnomah County Roadmaster John B. Tison compiled a report showing the total road expenditures of the county for the past three years and the estimated cost of the Columbia River highway, \$3,319,659; Columbia highway, exclusive of engineering, \$1,390,000; other districts, \$1,887,394.

S. P. Lockwood resigned as a member of the Portland school board. In a letter to the board he expressed his disapproval of the management of the affairs of the district.

Myrtle Shriners arrived in Portland to take part in the Northwest Shrine day and ceremonial session as guests of the Al Kader Temple, oasis of Portland.

Sugar Shortage Hits Grape Fruit Eaters

Physicians Say It Is More Healthful to Consume the Fruit Without Sweetening It; Besides It Helps Hoover.

When you see a person pucker up his face while eating unsweetened grape fruit, you know one of two things with a reasonable degree of certainty, namely: He is either Hoovering or is following the directions of his physician. It may be that he is doing both.

The reason for the unsweetened grape fruit on the breakfast table is sugar conservation program. The sugar short-

age is said to have affected the grape fruit grower of Florida, who finds many people who have always eaten powdered sugar with the fruit cannot get powdered sugar during the temporary "famine."

As a result some sections of the country are having a surplus of the fruit. According to Portland wholesalers, the situation is not acute in this section, where not more than a dozen carloads of the delicacy are used a year. Freight rates to the coast and the uncertainties of transportation are factors which keep down the consumption.

Physicians say that grape fruit is better sweetened than sweetened, as it tonic for the liver. It is estimated that more than half of the grape fruit consumed is eaten on the advice of physicians.

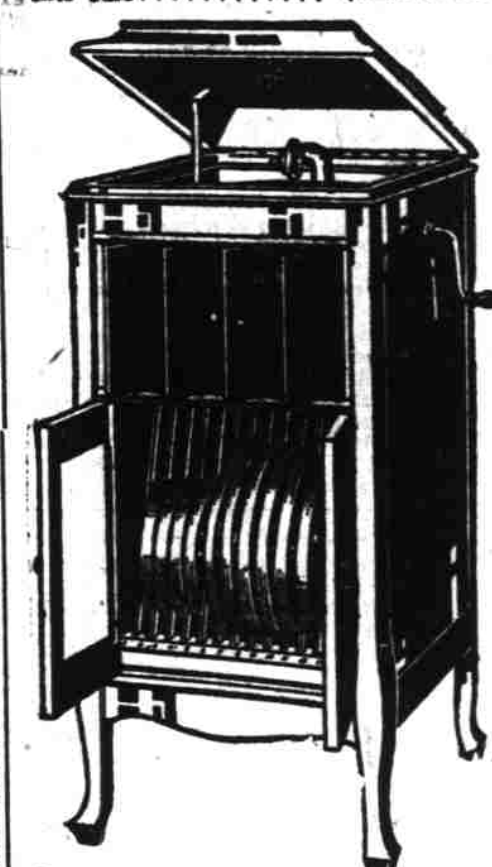

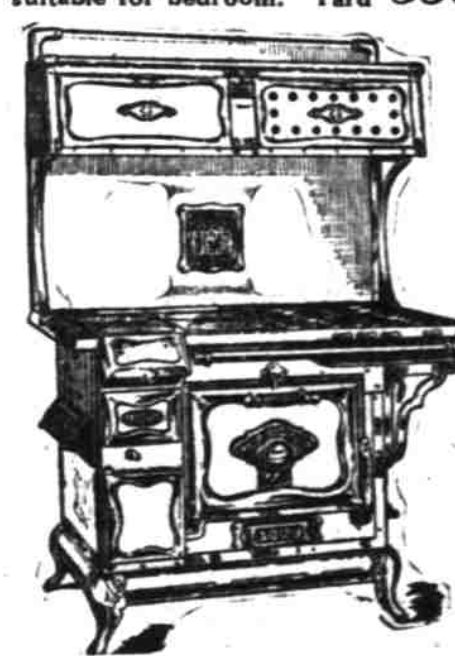
