

BROTHER ATTORNEYS, ELKS AND FRIENDS AT FULTON FUNERAL

Justice McBride Delivers Funeral Oration and Dr. Joshua Stansfield Offers Prayer.

Leading members of the Oregon State Bar association, Multnomah Bar association, Portland lodge of Elks and many private citizens attended the funeral of ex-United States Senator Charles W. Fulton at the family residence, 686 Webster street, at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Members of the bar met at the courthouse at 1 o'clock and proceeded in a body to the Fulton home.

As an escort of honor, Paul Chamberlain, exalted ruler, and the following past exalted rulers of Portland lodge of Elks will at 8 a. m. Wednesday attend Senator Fulton's body to the train which will bear the body to Astoria:

The funeral was conducted by the Bar association, and Justice T. A. McBride of the Oregon state court, who had been a personal friend of Mr. Fulton for many years, delivered the address at the ceremonies today.

Floral pieces donated proved the high respect in which Mr. Fulton was held by those who knew him in private and political life. Laurel wreaths predominated. Many of the pieces were expensive affairs.

Among the notable persons who were in attendance were all the members of the Oregon supreme bench. Many of the old-time friends of the late senator, including those of opposite political faith to Mr. Fulton, were at the funeral.

The services at Astoria will be held Wednesday and will be conducted by the Elks. The burial will be in the cemetery which is near that city.

Five Men Arrested On Sedition Charge

Deputy United States Marshal F. B. Tichenor returned Monday night from Grants Pass and Salem, bringing with him five men charged with having uttered seditious remarks against the government. Included among the prisoners is Fred Wickman, prominent Grants Pass merchant. The others from Grants Pass are Charles Gibbons, Conrad Schaefer and John Bocher, all of whom, including Wickman, have been bound over to the federal court following hearings before the United States commissioner. Henry Hooker was brought from Salem. All are lodged in the federal jail.

Russian Bolsheviks Are Not Pro-German

San Francisco, Jan. 29.—Professor Edward Ross, head of the sociology department in the University of Wisconsin, who went to Russia several months ago to study the Bolsheviks for the American Institute of Social Service of New York, said here Monday that the Bolshevik movement is not being promoted by German interests, as has been commonly reported.

Liberty, world peace and industrial socialism are the inspiring motives back of the Bolsheviks, Professor Ross said. Their platform apparently is sound and the chief deterrent to its success has been the refusal of many educated Rus-

MAY-HIMPLE FIGHT CASE COMES BEFORE SCHOOL COMMISSION

"Prosecution" Is Given Week in Which to Seek Intervention of Courts.

The "third round" in the Professor Samuel C. May-Student William Himple affair sequel to the fist encounter between the two and the pupil in the Jefferson high school a few weeks ago, was terminated Monday night in a formal hearing of the charges against May before the school commission created under the teachers' tenure law.

The meeting was featured by sharp clashes between Dan J. Malarky, attorney for the accused, and Superintendent L. R. Alderman and Clerk R. L. Thomas of the board of education.

Theron Bean, a pupil of the Jefferson high school, gave his version of the affair. He said that Himple, who weighs nearly 200 pounds, made an advance toward the teacher with his fists clenched. May then struck in self defense. Bean said that "prosecution" did not put any witnesses on the stand because the question of the jurisdiction of the commission had been raised by the school authorities, represented by Deputy District Attorney Franklin Pierce.

To enable the objectors to ask the intervention of the courts, the hearing was postponed a week.

In a verbal tilt with Alderman and the school clerk, Malarky challenged them to deny the truth of the statements contained in two affidavits read.

The members of the commission are Judge Collins, Alice Benson Beach and J. C. Olds.

Miss Marian Smith Engaged, Announced

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LIQUOR ON 'ESSPEE' DINER SEIZED UPON ARRIVAL FROM SOUTH

District Attorney Evans Declares Company Must Show Due Respect to Oregon Laws.

As an answer to the ultimatum of the Southern Pacific company to the state of Oregon that its officers should not examine its shipments of liquor into the state, State Agents Scott and Jeffries, assisted by Deputy Sheriffs McDonald, Taylor and Patrolman Stanton, acting under instructions from city and county authorities, raided the Southern Pacific dining-car attached to the train arriving from San Francisco late Monday afternoon.

The officers boarded the train at the east side depot and took possession of the diner. At the terminal yards they proceeded to give it the once over. They found and seized 158 bottles of intoxicants of various sizes and with various contents from beer and champagne to benedictine.

The contraband liquor was found in the refrigerator. "The doors were sealed," said District Attorney Evans, "in accordance with a tentative working plan agreed to some time ago whereby the railroad company, which serves its dining-car patrons with liquors in California, would not be obliged to unload its stock at the Oregon line."

The seal was not broken in this instance," said Mr. Evans, "but the contents of the ice box were easily accessible through the top by lifting the ice out and removing the thin galvanneal bottom to the ice compartment. That this has been done, we know. Liquor has been sold on Southern Pacific diners in Oregon, and we can produce evidence to prove it."

"In the past the company has been allowed to store its stock of liquors at the Union station previous to the departure of the train for Seattle. The officials of the company seemed much worried about the prohibition law of Washington," Mr. Evans continued, "but did not disclose and are not now disclosing any regard for the laws of Oregon. We will show them, before we have to obey Oregon's liquor laws strictly."

Non-suit Is Granted
A non-suit was granted the defendant in the case of Stanley Maleski against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company by Circuit Judge Tucker Monday afternoon. Maleski, a 7 year old boy, was suing for \$15,000 damages for alleged personal injuries, claiming he was knocked down and run over by a street car at First and Sheridan streets, July 25, 1916.

James Williams Convicted
A jury in District Judge Dayton's court returned a verdict of guilty against James Williams, proprietor of the Twelve Mile house on the Base Line road. Williams was tried on a charge of violating the prohibition law. He was arrested in connection with a raid on his place December 4.

Charge Illegal Possession of Intoxicating Liquors.
Mrs. Anna Glezek of 58 Cook avenue, on trial for having intoxicating liquor in her possession, was found guilty by a jury in District Judge Bell's court Monday and was fined \$250.

She was arrested November 10 by Deputy Sheriffs Christofferson, Ward, Flaherty and George Huriburt, who, searching her premises, found a 10 gallon keg of whiskey buried in the basement.

Her defense was that the liquor did not belong to her but to a Richard Walter, who had access to the basement. Walter, it was shown, by the testimony, lived in a small shack in Mrs. Glezek's yard and had a key to the basement.

Mrs. Glezek was tried before Circuit Judge McGinn in July, 1916, on a charge of maintaining a nuisance under the prohibition law, found guilty and sentenced to six months in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$500. This sentence was suspended.

IRREGULARITIES ARE CHARGED
Order Issued in Anna Josephine Meyers Estate Case.

Certain alleged irregularities in connection with the handling of the funds of the late Anna Josephine Meyers will be investigated by federal authorities, according to an order issued by County Judge Taxwell Monday.

Before her death Mrs. Meyers left with her brother, Frank Ambros of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, a sum of money, directing by her will that it be divided equally between Ludwig Ambros of Prague, Austria, and John Ambros of Potomac, Austria. So far the county court here has been unable to ascertain if the terms of the will have been complied with, or even if the man in Cedar

SOCIALIST RAMP IS EXAMINING JURORS TO SIT AT HIS HEARING

Corvallis Man Dismissed When He Expresses His Prejudice in Case at Issue.

Floyd Ramp, Socialist of Roseburg, charged with utterances tending to cause insubordination among drafted troops, who is trying his own case in the federal court, spent two hours this morning examining jurors.

"Would you be prejudiced against a man who refuses to join the Red Cross? Have you any sons in the army or the navy? Do you believe labor should fight for shorter hours and better conditions during war, the same as in peace? Would the fact that the defendant was against the entrance of the United States into the war bias you in judging him in this case?"

These are some of the questions propounded to jurors by Ramp.

When J. M. Reynolds of Corvallis voiced his objection to one of the questions asked him by Ramp, Judge Wolverton remanded him. Later Reynolds said he couldn't sit on the jury in the Ramp case without being prejudiced and he was promptly dismissed.

Up to noon recess Ramp had exercised seven of his peremptory challenges and Assistant United States Attorney Rankin, representing the government, none.

Most of the jurors passed by Ramp are farmers.

J. P. Newell Offered Canadian Position
J. P. Newell of the firm of Newell, Gossett & Walsh, engineers, today received proposals from the Canadian government asking his services in valuation work on the lines of the Canadian Northern railroad. Mr. Newell has the proposal under advisement. It is understood that the work would require Mr. Newell's residence in Canada for several months.

Peter Ernst asks for a divorce from Ella Ernst on the ground of cruelty. They were married in Hungary and have six children.

Cruelty is also charged by Jennie Love in her divorce complaint against Edward Love. They were married in 1917. She asks for \$20 a month alimony.

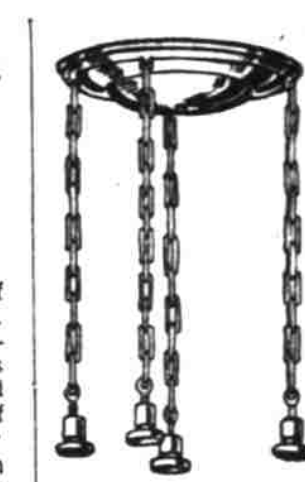

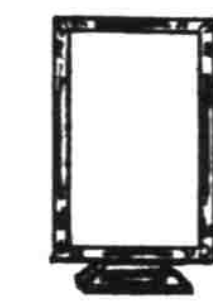
