Nothing But
Comedy

"It Pays to Advertise" Is Offering of Popular Company This Week; Production Is Good.

"IT PAYS TO ADVERTISE," farce presented by the Baker theatre players this week, is a joyful 160-minute dip into the light existence of a happy, contented people who have nothing to do but make money.

Making money is usually a pretty serious thing for most people, but the way the trick is turned on the Baker stage ought to be an inspiration to those who vilipend the value of advertising.

The story runs along with the same old foundation as that of many modern fairy tales of the business world. Rich father tells son to go to work. Son starts factory to buck father and has father begging for mercy by the end of the third act.

"It Pays to Advertise," however, is nothing but comedy with comedy of a love story running through it to sweeten it up. Edgar Everett Horton, hero of many a drama on the Baker stage, plays the son who shows his father the value of advertising. He makes love and "comedy." George Taylor is the advertising genius. Smith Davies, Eugene Shakespeare and Betty Barnard, and others get away with their parts in select style.

Each Act Meritorious
"All the world loves a lover," and the brides are particularly admired. So is the "Bride Shop," a combination of fun and frolic, song and dance, as given by Eddie Vogt and his company at the Pantages theatre. The beauty chorus is composed of a bevy of attractive girls whose purpose is to appeal to the eyes of the beholders. There are half a dozen other offerings of the vaudeville kind and each possesses a distinctive merit. Tom Kelly, the Irish humorist, and Bobby Tremaine, a clever girl dancer, get away with a goodly portion of the applause.

The appearance of Kelly on the Portland stage is always an occasion of delight among his many admirers. Helen Ward plays the part of a discontented wife who starts out as a vaudeville star but falls. The act is one of the Willard Mack origin and it is full of pep. "Don't Do It," is the name of the sketch. Rodgerus proves himself to be a past master on the slack wire, his imitation of an inebriated person being ludicrous. Flo and Ollie Walters make a hit with their songs and their nifty gait.

Stone to Become Comedy Star
Fred Stone, the Douglas Fairbanks of the legitimate stage, far as acrobatic stunts are concerned, and considered by many to be the cleverest fun-maker on the boards, is to become a comedy star of the movies as well, and will be screened by the Paramount Pictures corporation and Jesse L. Lasky.

Beauty Chat
Dangers Ahead
WE MUST all understand that the very first principles of all health and its attending beauty of body and soul is cleanliness. Simply bathing the body a few times a week and changing the underwear the same number of times is only the smallest part of the meaning of the word. There are a hundred other important rules to follow to insure real cleanliness.

There is an old fashioned saying, "It's a thing worth doing it is worth doing well." The ordinary busy woman goes about her regular duties of arising in the morning, bathing, dressing and going about her business or whatever it may be, with her mind on anything but what she is doing. She therefore does many things while going through that regime of apparent cleanliness that are not only unclean but defiling. Starting with the bath, which should be taken every morning under any and all circumstances, the tub should be washed out with hot water and soap before letting the water in for the bath. Then the sponge should be washed and the tub rinsed off before using them on the body. Sponges absorb all sorts of microbes and should be scalded every day without fail.

While in the warm bath, the body should be thoroughly scrubbed with soap and a rubber sponge or a soft, large brush. Just lying in a tub of warm water does not clean the body. Scrubbing is necessary. If a shower is not attached to the bath, all the water should be let out of the tub and fresh water run in to rinse off the soap, every bit of which should be removed before letting the bath become cold. A cold sponge is necessary to close the pores of the skin and keep it firm. The body should be dried quickly and thoroughly and powdered with talcum powder if the skin is inclined to be tender. Clean underwear is imperative and should never be permitted to touch the floor. Floors are the dirtiest places in the world. We walk on everything and carry it over under our feet, then walk on fine carpets and distribute the filth and then carelessly let things fall on the floor as though it was the cleanest place in the world.

of dust and germs and naturally those particles would mingle with your pure cream, making it almost poisonous with the invisible dirt.

Your powder puff should be made of swan down, with a silk cover which should be folded over it when not in use—and the lid of the powder box should have the same covering as well as the cream jar lid. After using the cream and powder on the face a little clean brush should be used to brush the powder from the eyebrows and lashes and a few drops of distilled water and boracic acid should be used as an eye wash. The eyebrow brushes should be washed after every use.

Not for one of the most important items of the toilet and the one most abused, the hair brush. Nine tenths of the bald heads, gray hairs and scalp diseases come from unclean combs and brushes. If you stop to consider how hairs accumulate dust and germs and how seldom they are washed, you can realize how necessary it is to use perfectly clean combs and brushes always. They should never be thrown into a drawer after using for use at another time without being cleaned. Two or three brushes should be on hand and two perfectly clean ones always ready for use. A piece of cheesecloth used over a stiff brush will show you how much dirt can accumulate on your hair in but a few hours out of doors. All hair should be washed at least once a week.

The toothbrush should be scalded after each using and rinsed again before using.

The hands, the most used implements, and the most abused, should be washed whenever soiled, and that is many times a day. The orange wood stick with the little bottle of antiseptic soap should be on the wash stand, and the stick should be dipped in the soap and run under the fingernails before every washing.

The necks of bottles should always be wiped off before and after using their contents. A little quince seed or flaxseed cream should be rubbed on the hands after washing to prevent the skin from becoming too dry from frequent washings.

Wash rags are an abomination unless washed out and boiled every day. Without adhering to these simple rules no one can be clean and cleanliness is next to godliness.
