WEATHER CONDITIONS

A trough-shaped area of low pressure extends from the Alaska coast southward to Colorado. Elsewhere the pressure is generally high, the highest readings being in the Canadian interior. The trough extends from the north and middle coast eastward to South Dakota, and is reported from a number of places in the south. The weather is cold, except on the Atlantic coast, and over the Pacific slope. The Southern Plateau and Southern Plains region. The fall in temperature amounted to more than 20 degrees in parts of Louisiana, Tennessee, Minnesota, North Dakota, Manitoba and British Columbia. The temperature is below normal, except over parts of the Pacific slope and on the South Atlantic coast. Temperatures from 20 to 40 degrees below zero are reported from the Northern Plains region.

TOWN TOPICS

Light Tests Draw Many—Thirty-seven automobile drivers appeared at the police station Monday night to have their lights tested, the largest number since the test was inaugurated. Next week the traffic officers expect to make arrests of those who fail to pass the headlights. The test is given free of charge between 6:15 and 8 o'clock each evening at police headquarters. It requires only a few minutes to test a car. Sergeant Ervin is in charge and has an officer out on the sidewalk, so that the drivers need not even get out of their cars.

Oregon Ships to Be Topped—Ships of the Sea and Air from Oregon will be the general subject of addresses at the luncheon of the Portland Ad club in the Benson hotel Wednesday noon. Lloyd J. Wentworth, district officer of the United States shipping board will tell of Oregon's part in supplying material for ships. Captain Lewis Levy and Lieutenant Frank N. Corder of the aviation examining board will give a practical demonstration of how Oregon men can qualify to take flying instruction in the United States army.

Farmers Are Interested—Inquiries as to the disposition of stable refuse at Camp Lewis, American Lake, have been made by A. C. Jackson, advertising manager of the O-W. R. & N. company. Reports have been circulated by visitors to the camp that stable refuse is trampled in the mud. There are several thousand horses and mules at Camp Lewis and agriculturists point out that the stable sweepings are a valuable asset as fertilizer and should be used for that purpose.

SETTLEMENT OF LAND IN STATE DISCUSSED AT LUNCHEON TODAY

Land Settlement Commission and Oregon Development Bureau Lay Plans for Work.

The land settlement commission appointed by Governor Withycombe, met at luncheon at 12:15 today with the Oregon development bureau, in the dining room of the Chamber of Commerce. Discussion of ways and means of placing settlers on the vacant lands of Oregon, and perfection of plans to that end was the purpose of the meeting.

The appointment of the land settlement commission was intended to relieve the Oregon development bureau of a portion of its labors and the two organizations will cooperate in assisting settlers of small means to get desirable agricultural and grazing lands at a reasonable price on an easy payment plan.

Emery Olmstead, chairman of the Oregon development bureau, and a member of the land settlement commission, says that hundreds of inquiries are received from people of small means from the east and middle west. "These people are for the most part poor farmers and would be a valuable asset to the state," said Mr. Olmstead, "and the commission proposes to secure lands for them at a reasonable price and assist them in getting a start. There are many thousands of acres of excellent agricultural lands in the logged off sections of the state. The commission will purchase or otherwise secure control of this land wherever possible and sell it to settlers on easy terms." Mr. Olmstead has had successful experience in settlement work in North Dakota, Wisconsin and Iowa, and the results of similar efforts in Oregon. Members of the land settlement commission are J. D. Farrell, Emery Olmstead, William Fulman, William Hanley, W. L. Boise and Thomas Kay. The Oregon development bureau, which will act in cooperation with the land settlement commission, consists of Emery Olmstead, chairman; J. W. Robinson, W. D. Skinner, John M. Scott, W. L. Boise, John Cronan and W. H. Crawford, secretary.

Donald Skene Back From Battlefields

Portland Boy Who Has Been Driving Ambulance Visits Parents Before Joining French Foreign Legion.

Donald Skene, son of Dr. and Mrs. William H. Skene, 61 Sixteenth street, who has been driving an ambulance with section No. 29, Yale unit, attached to the French division, returned to his home in Portland Monday for a brief visit with his parents.

Some of the bloodiest work of the war was witnessed by Skene in the Verdun sector from July 22 to August 2. At one period he worked for 80 hours, catching just enough sleep at odd times to keep him up.

He will leave soon to enter the foreign legion of the French army in the artillery division. As soon as he becomes proficient, he says, he will obtain a transfer to the American troops and try for a commission.

Donald Skene is a graduate of the Portland academy. He was a freshman at Yale when he enlisted in the ambulance corps of his school last June. He is 20 years old.

Portland, Frank Sullivan, president of the Superior lodge of Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, has sent three telegrams to the Portland chief of police in an effort to locate Mrs. Carson.

To Reduce Sleeper Service—The Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway will reduce sleeper service between Portland and Bend, beginning February 1. Tourist sleepers will be run daily as heretofore, but the standard sleeper will be run only three days each week, leaving Portland Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday, and leaving Bend on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Northern Pacific officials announce that sleeper service on night trains between Spokane and Walla Walla has been discontinued until further notice.

FUEL SHORTAGE AND COLD NEARLY STOPPED BUSINESS IN THE EAST

Maurice Goodman Says One Who Was Not on Atlantic Seaboard Unable to Realize Situation.

Maurice Goodman, president of the wholesale shoe firm of Goodman Brothers, has just returned from a five weeks' trip through the East and draws a vivid picture of business conditions in that section during the recent cold spell.

"Only those who have actually visited the cities of the Atlantic seaboard and the manufacturing towns of the North-eastern states during the past month believe that conditions are as bad as they are. The shortage of coal and congestion of freight at railway terminals have practically tied up many lines of business. Mills and factories are flooded with orders which they are unable to fill because the federal fuel administration has limited their working hours, in some instances to five hours a day and in others to three working days a week. Besides it is almost impossible to secure shipment of the product after it has been turned out of the factories."

"No one living in the balmy climate of Oregon can realize the utter desolation of Eastern cities during the week of January 21, when all business was suspended for the conservation of coal. The suffering of the poor who were unable to get fuel at all passes description. Besides the utter silence and the absence of people on the streets and in office buildings and stores and the smokeless chimneys of the factories, there was the cold and wind and swirling drifts of snow."

"Throughout the East there is a feeling that the war will not last more than six months longer. The last week in December bets were being made freely in Wall street, New York, that there would be peace in Europe within six months."

Considering weather conditions, railroad passenger traffic west of Chicago is surprisingly near normal, Mr. Goodman reports.

MULTNOMAH COUNTY FARMERS MAY BUY NITRATE FROM U. S.

Government Bureau Has 100,000 Tons for Distribution Throughout the Country.

Multnomah county farmers may buy nitrate of soda from the department of agriculture, according to notice given to S. B. Hall, Multnomah county agriculturalist.

"The nitrate was purchased through the war industries board under the authority of the food-control act as a part of the program for stimulating agricultural production," reads the notice received by Mr. Hall. "It will be unloaded at Atlantic ports and the price will be \$75.50 a ton, free on board cars at port of arrival. Farmers are to pay, in addition, freight from port of arrival and the state fertilizer tax fee."

"Applications for part of the 100,000 tons of nitrate bought by the government will be received only from actual

farmers or owners or holders of farms for use on their land, and may be made through County Agent S. B. Hall, Gresham, or through any member of a local committee, consisting of L. L. Kidder, Gresham; Sundial Mill, Fairview, and G. L. Davenport, 144 Front street,
