Pictures Given To the Ladd School

Photographs of Famous Paintings and Art Objects to Hang in Corridors.

 DETAILS of the splendid gift of pictures to the Ladd school by members of the Ladd family residing in Portland were given in an interesting report by Miss Ione Dunlap, decent at the Art Museum at the meeting of the school beautifying committee Monday afternoon.

Some time ago this committee sent letters to members of Portland families for whom public schools are named, asking them to assist in beautifying the schools by gifts of pictures. In response to this members of the Ladd family have given to the school named for them 150 photographs of European cities, historical points and art objects and these have been hung under the direction of the art committee in the upper corridors just above the wainscoting, where they are easily seen by the pupils. They include photographs of favorite pictures, two fine casts of the Parthenon frieze, St. Gauden's Shaw Memorial, Baugh-ton's pilgrim pictures and portraits of Benjamin Franklin and Alexander Hamilton. One member of the family made a cash gift which has not yet been spent. The classes in art appreciation formed for teachers are extremely popular, more than 60 teachers being enrolled. The circulating exhibition of pictures has been in four schools this year and is now at Albina Homestead, where it is being viewed with the usual interest. The committee voted unanimously to join the City Federation of Women's organizations and Mrs. J. C. Elliott King, the chairman of the committee, who by virtue of her office becomes a vice president in the federation, appointed Mrs. L. R. Alderman and Miss Ione Dunlap as additional representatives.
