

MRS. EMRICH TO TELL OF TURK OUTRAGES AT AUDITORIUM TONIGHT

Terrible Tragedies of Deportations Described; Funds for Sufferers to Be Sought.

"Deportation—how little that word meant to Americans when read in the dispatches two years ago in connection with the Armenians and Syrians," said Mrs. R. S. M. Emrich in a fervent appeal on behalf of the starving Armenians, Syrians, Greeks and Jews, delivered Tuesday night before a small company of prominent Portland people at Hotel Multnomah.

You were thankful that it was not a massacre, but we who know the Turk uttered the prayer, "would to God it were only massacre." Death has no horrors compared with the fiendish tortures and atrocities of which the Turk is capable, and behind him in the outrages against the Christians of Turkey is Germany.

Baltimore Woman Is Victim
"An Armenian student at one of our big Eastern colleges met and married a beautiful Baltimore girl and they went to Turkey for three years until he could settle up their affairs and return to the country to live. At the beginning of the deportations he urged her to go to the east directly, but she refused to leave him, and so they waited.

"They were taken prisoners and the man was told that he would be tortured to death. The lady from Baltimore, as she was known to all of us, was expecting soon to become a mother. She had one son, two years old. She was told that she would be given to the Turk, the lowest and most fiendish of all the Turks. The husband had a little money and bribed the guard to bring her to his cell and kill her before his eyes and then kill him.

Women Driven Insane
"We lost trace of the little boy for some weeks, and then he was discovered miles away in a Turkish camp, emaciated, dirty and vermin-ridden that we hardly knew him.

Physicians, supposedly hardened by scenes of suffering and death, lost their reason in the hospitals where they treated the women and children who escaped from the Turks after being inhumanly outraged. There is not a Christian woman in all Turkey today who is not demoralized from starvation and exposure, brutal treatment and the sight of her children literally starving at her feet.

"If you could but see that line of deportation strewn with decaying bodies, skeletons, rags and children with their big brown eyes sunken and burning and surrounded with blue blue rings and women who have lost their sight and reason, for blindness is one of the evidences of starvation!

Speaks at Auditorium
"You can and you must hear the anguished cry of this Turkish nation. One 30 per cent of you American women are heeding the instructions of the food commission. You are continuing to feed yourselves and your children, although there were no war, as though there were no tens of thousands starving for a crust."

Mrs. Emrich will speak this evening at the Auditorium. Under the escort of the police band the executive committee for the \$75,000 drive for funds for the Armenians, and Mrs. Emrich will leave Hotel Portland at 7:30 o'clock for the Auditorium. At 8 o'clock there will be an organ recital by P. B. Scholl and at 8:30 Mrs. Emrich will speak. The meeting is open to the public.

University Sorority Adopts French Child

University of Oregon, Eugene, Jan. 30.—A little French war orphan has been adopted by the local chapter of Kappa Kappa Gamma women's fraternity. The child is a nine year old boy named Hubert Patraut, whose plight was brought to the attention of the local organization by the American society for the relief of French war orphans.

The boy's mother is a shopkeeper in time of peace. His father was presumably killed at the front although a letter received by the chapter from Miss Eleanor C. Jenkins, business secretary of the society, does not take up this point. The organization takes care of only those children who are left destitute by the loss of their fathers.

Thirty-two Thousand War Policies Issued

Washington, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—A new record was established in the application for 32,004 insurance policies for soldiers. Secretary McAdoo announced Tuesday. The application totaled \$393,500 and bring the grand total to \$4,923,814,000. Approximately 600,000 persons are covered in this grand total.

Wife Inspired Letter, Husband The Postscript

"The above is all bunk," was the postscript as the bottom of the letter written to the district exemption board by J. P. Morgan of Fuyallup, Wash. The body of his letter contained a bitter protest against being placed in class 2 B when in his questionnaire he asked to be assigned to class 4 A. He had asked for a deferred classification because of a dependent wife but no children.

The postscript continues: "While the particular classification you give me is ridiculous, and as a matter of fact my wife will have some time of it getting along after I go. I am firmly of the opinion that a married man with nothing to show for it should by no means be given the same consideration as one with kids. I believe that class 2 B is about the proper place for all men of my circumstances regardless of what happens to their wives."

In answer to the question in the questionnaire, "Are you a member of any religious organization or sect whose creed forbids you to participate in war in any form?" Morgan answers, "Hell, no!"

Did he or his wife live with her parents? Morgan says "No (with great emphasis)."

He denies that he speaks English, French or German, but in answer to the question, "What other language does he speak, he says American."

Mutiny Breaks Out; Steamer Wants Help

An Atlantic Port, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—Wireless messages were received here today from a British liner (name withheld) somewhere in the Atlantic asking for assistance. The message said she was "in immediate danger of serious mishap on account of the mutiny of a number of Arab firemen."

It is believed here that allied or American naval patrol vessels will go to her assistance.

German Attitude Denounced

(Chicago, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—Germany's attitude toward its women was denounced by Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois in an address Tuesday evening at a patriotic banquet given by the Kansas society of Chicago. T. P. O'Connor, M. P. of Ireland said unflinchingly that the only lasting assurance of an enduring peace was "in immediate danger of serious mishap on account of the mutiny of a number of Arab firemen."

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RESIDENCE IN P. I. IS NOT CONSIDERED IN PETITION FOR PAPERS

Joseph Francis Roy Enters Canadian Army Upon Failure to Join U. S. Forces.

Denied admission to the United States army or navy because he is not a citizen, Joseph Francis Roy, a Portland plumber, residing with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. X. Roy, has joined the Canadian army.

Roy's case is an unusual one in that, although he filed his first papers for naturalization a number of years ago, his subsequent residence in the Philippines, where he was employed in the construction department of a government, did not count when it came to getting his final papers in the United States. Roy took the matter up with various heads of the government and his failure to be admitted to the military service. It appears that his father, who was a Canadian, was not naturalized until after the son was 21 years of age.

Referring to the case, the commissioner of naturalization of Washington, D. C., said in part, in a letter to the clerk of the district court of Livingston, Mont.:

"You are advised that the naturalization law requires proof of residence within the United States for five years last past by two competent witnesses. The bureau does not believe that residence in the Philippines, even in the employ of the United States government, is residence within the United States, as contemplated by law. The further difficulty would arise as to the proof of the applicant's residence for five years, because, unless he could produce witnesses in person to testify to such residence, he could not take depositions to cover his Philippine residence, because there is no United States attorney for those islands who could accept service upon the deposition notice as required."

The foregoing explanation is given by Mr. Roy in order that his friends will understand why he has now joined the Canadian army. He lives at 188 East Seventy-sixth street. He will leave for British Columbia tonight.

350 More Sticks of Dynamite Unearthed

Explosives in Cache, in Addition to 50 Sticks Discovered at First—Hundreds of Cans Also Were Hidden.

Further investigation of the dynamite cache reported from the Lents district resulted in the discovery of another 50 sticks, in the discovery of another hidden store, the latter containing 350 sticks and 100 cans, a few blocks from the government wireless station.

Four or five men were seen prowling in the vicinity, according to a report of Probation Officer Spencer, who was investigating because the previous find was thought to be the work of young boys of the neighborhood. The boys, Mr. Spencer said, had broken open the storehouse of Schultz Bros. at Lents and had taken the dynamite, with the seeming intention of having some fun with it. This they did by dropping it off a bridge over Johnson creek, burning it in a stove and throwing sticks of it against rocks.

An explosion which wrecked an empty shack was reported Tuesday afternoon. The 350 sticks found were in a shed near where the explosion took place. The 350 sticks are unaccounted for, said Mr. Spencer. Schultz Bros. denied having had any such quantity on hand. Nothing further has been ascertained regarding the men seen in the vicinity.

social diseases is recommended. This can best be accomplished, he states, if the public can be educated to consider these diseases in the same light as other communicable diseases, that the subject may be discussed frankly without offense to modesty.

The women's detention home gives opportunity for women's clubs to do constructive good, Dr. Parrish reports. Many girls about to leave resolve to begin life anew and in many cases, it is believed, they would do so, if given assistance. Nothing has been done for them so far, he says.

As a relief to the congestion in the meat inspection department, Dr. Parrish suggests the Oakland plan, where the slaughter houses pay flat rates monthly, gauged according to killing capacity. If this is done an additional meat inspector may be added without increasing costs, he says.

License fee of \$1 a year is urged for all establishments handling food of any character as a means of preventing sale of spoiled food. Some dealers are said to sell inferior grades and, when arrested, plead guilty and pay small fines, only to continue the practice.

Milk Comparisons Favorably
Milk sold in Portland compares favorably with that sold in any other city, according to the report. National disturbances combined with scarcity and restlessness of labor have made it difficult to uphold the former standard of purity, but only occasionally have tests fallen below standard.

Dr. Parrish declares against any legislation which would result in the ruin of one and two co-educational schools. Without increase in money or force, but with the cooperation of the school board, school inspection has been increased in efficiency, while at the same time the work itself has been greatly simplified, he says.

The only increase of salary in the health bureau suggested in the report is for James Walsh, quarantine officer, for whom \$150 a month is urged.

House Authorizes Marine War Zones

Washington, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—The house committee on merchant marine and fisheries Tuesday ordered the senate resolution authorizing the president to establish war zones around ship-building plants favorably reported. The resolution already has been passed by the senate.

L. D. Monroe Missing; Information Sought

Brother-in-Law of Deputy Sheriff Beckman Has Been Ill and Despondent and Relatives Fear Possible Suicide.

Information is wanted by Deputy Sheriff Beckman as to the whereabouts of his brother-in-law, L. D. Monroe, who has been missing from his home since Saturday.

"He has been in poor health and was despondent," said Beckman, "and we are afraid he has done away with himself."

The young man is described as 29 years old, five and a half feet tall, dark hair, blue eyes, a prominent nose and red cheeks. When last seen he was wearing a dark suit, a gray sweater coat and a dark gray cap. Camp Logan, Houston, Texas, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—Sergeant Granville W. Shaw and Privates Robert McCurry and Clarence A. Brozgar each were sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary for the slaying of J. C. Sneed, a civilian of Houston.

The sentence was made public today, following the signing of the verdict, reached by a military court recently by higher military authorities.

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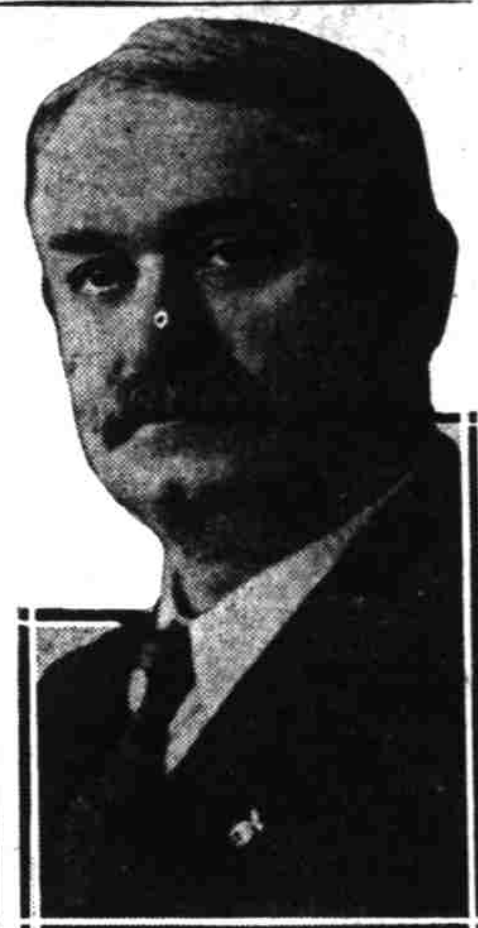
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BUSINESS MAN IS DALLAS CLUB HEAD

610 Perish When Transport Sinks

British Admiralty Gives Out Details of Loss of Ships in Mediterranean; Destroyer Goes to Assist, Is Also Lost.

London, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—The British transport Aragon was torpedoed and sunk in the Eastern Mediterranean on December 30, with a loss of 610 lives, the admiralty announced today. A destroyer rescuing survivors also was sunk. During the same period 11,000,000 soldiers have been transported.

The transport Aragon was a vessel of 9588 tons, property of the Royal Mail Steam Packet company and registered at Belfast.

The Osmanielh was a steamer of 4041 tons, the property of the Khedivial Mail Steamship company, and was registered at London.

The admiralty said the two transports were sunk a day apart. The Aragon carried 2000 and the Osmanielh, 800. In the telegram announcing this disaster the admiralty announced that since the start of the war nine British transports had been sunk and nine thousand lives lost. During the same period 11,000,000 soldiers have been transported.

These two steamers are believed to be the vessels which the British admiralty reported to parliament on January 23 as having been torpedoed by submarines in the Mediterranean December 31.

Potato Buyers Not Liked by Growers

Warren, Or., Jan. 30.—The Potato Buyers' league has gotten in "Dutch" with the majority of the growers here, and much dissatisfaction is heard. The result is that action is being taken to ship to outside points, Los Angeles and Texas, by the farmers themselves, thereby eliminating the commission man, the same as has been done in this section by the milk producers. Very little profit is hereafter be shipped to the middleman, as the residents here feel they have been "held up" every time they have dealt with them.

Government Plans Oil Well Control

Washington, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—Licensing of all oil wells is to be the next step in fuel control. Oil Director Reque has been working on a special plan for government control of the oil output for several weeks. British demand for oil and the inability to move tank cars to the seaboard have speeded up preparation for complete control of the oil output.

Coos County Banks Start War Savings

Marshfield, Or., Jan. 30.—The Coos county bankers, at a business session, voted \$250 toward War Savings Stamps and will thus start off the campaign which will be conducted here. Committees have been named and will start working at once to raise Coos county's quota in the investment of stamps. The postmaster here reports that many have been buying Thrift and War Savings to appeal strongly to the working men Stamps and the system of saving seems

Said He Was Lonesome
Ten-year-old Arlis Osborn ran away from the Boys' and Girls' Aid society for the sixth time in two weeks Tuesday. He was sent to the institution from Burns, Or., and after being captured each time exclaimed that he ran away because he was lonesome. He went to the Imperial hotel each time and asked for the man who brought him to Portland from Burns. The hotel men recognized Arlis and called the home.

Hun Food Plot Scented
Officer Bill Humphrey thinks he has trace of a pro-German organization in Portland that has supplied the Kaiser with about \$2000. The officer does not know anything about the identity of the members, but believes they hold regular secret meetings. His report has been turned over to the federal authorities.

Three Killed During Air Raid on London
London, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—Three persons are known to have been killed and ten injured during last night's air raid, it was announced today by Lord French, commander of the home defense forces. The official statement said it was feared six other bodies might be buried in the wreckage.

This was the third raid made by German airmen over British soil in 24 hours. The bombs were dropped in the southeast and northeast outskirts of the city. Lord French said about 15 enemy machines participated in the raid. Numerous British planes attacked the raiders.
