

GERMANY'S DREAM OF WORLD POWER GREAT MENACE TO WORLD

Teutons Have Been Carefully
Laying Plans for Years for Em-
pire Reaching to Bagdad.

Germany's dream of world power includes an empire reaching from Hamburg to Bagdad, from the North Sea to the Persian gulf. For years she has been carefully laying the foundation of this vast dominion which, if achieved, would be a positive menace to every other free nation on the earth.

Prior to the outbreak of the war little heed was paid the alarms sounded against the pan-German scheme. Developments since 1914, however, have proved conclusively the determination of the German junkers in carrying through their plan by force.

The assassination of the Austrian archduke and his wife at Sarajevo in June, 1914, was the spark that reached the European powder magazine which, once touched off, brought the greater part of the entire world into war.

The pan-German scheme had no concern for small nations. If they stood in the way of the Prussian plan, treaty obligations would not save them from being trod underfoot. Thus it was with Serbia and Montenegro, and later with Roumania, which blocked the German path into Asia. Thus it was with Belgium, whose land offered a convenient highway to France.

The day of reckoning will come and one fact that will be established will be the rights of all free nations, regardless of size and armed strength, to enjoy the blessings of liberty.

The allies are united on this point. In his story of Belgium, which will be published serially in The Sunday Journal beginning February 17, Brand Whitlock, United States minister to Belgium, develops this phase of the war.

Reds," published "Mother Earth" and other anarchist publications. They have frequently been charged with participation in bomb plots and Berkman a number of years ago was convicted of an attempt on the life of Henry Ford.

DANGEROUS SITUATION ARISES FROM DEMANDS OF RUSS ANARCHISTS

Washington, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—A dangerous international situation has developed in the threat of Russian anarchists to hold United States Ambassador Francis in Petrograd responsible for the life and freedom of Alexander Berkman, under jail sentence here for violation of the draft law.

While threats against Francis in event of Berkman's imprisonment were officially confirmed in dispatches to the state department nearly two weeks ago, the information was kept secret while the government wrestled with the problem.

The question of placing expediency temporarily above the law was considered and rejected. Today mandates from the United States supreme court are en route to Berkman and Emma Goldman, calling for their immediate arrest.

The government cannot stay the progress of the law, it is officially stated. Meantime, however, every effort is being made to appease the anarchist element of sailors and workmen in Russia who are demanding Berkman's release by threats against Francis. News of the president's action, in the interest of Thomas J. Mooney, convicted labor leader in San Francisco, over whose sentence the Russian anarchists first vented their wrath against the United States, has been cabled to Russia and all energy is centered on giving it wide circulation, it was stated officially today.

Thus far, the negotiations have been going on for the most part, it is understood, by direct appeal to the Russian people through publication of this country's sympathies with the revolution. Further steps are now contemplated but the serious embarrassment arises in that thus far there is no recognized government in Russia with which this country has dealt officially.

Inquiries of the Bolshevik government in Petrograd (it is pointed out it was not the Bolshevik who registered the threat against Francis) to determine whether such action is countenanced by the Lenin-Trotsky regime, are held probable.

Meantime, word from Francis explaining the exact situation in Petrograd is awaited with interest and concern. Berkman is very well known in Russia, some of his kin being leaders in the varied revolutionary movements there during recent years.

The supreme court, however, held Monday that Berkman should be sent to jail immediately and the mandates were mailed out from the court last night.

As soon as the court's writs are served on Berkman and Emma Goldman, each will begin serving two years sentence in the federal penitentiary. Court officials today stated that the only possible stay in the case would come by securing a habeas corpus for the defendants on some new grounds.

Vulcan yards quit their places. Munitions makers in Kiel and navy yard employes there have been out since Sunday. In the Rhenish Westphalia miners are quitting in great numbers, the Vorwaerts said.

WORKERS' COUNCIL FORMED IN BERLIN, IS COPENHAGEN REPORT

Copenhagen, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—Rumors were circulated here today that German soldiers on the east front had shot some of their officers. It was also reported that there were disturbances among sailors of the German fleet at Kiel. No direct confirmation was obtainable.

Berlin's strike is growing hourly. The movement is spreading to provincial towns.

Danzig and Hamburg are now affected. In Berlin a workmen's council of 500 has been formed.

This information came today in dispatches filed late last night from Berlin. The workers' council the dispatches reported, is to be represented by an

"action commission" composed of 19 men and women.

Dr. Haase, Ledebour, Dittman, Philip Scheidemann, Dr. Ebert and Dr. Braun—all Socialists of varying degrees—have joined the council.

German Under Secretary for the Interior von Wallroff formally prohibited all labor meetings and announced he would not negotiate with strikers. He declared, however, that he would receive a delegation of Reichstag members of the Socialist parties.

Conference Demands Made

Philip Scheidemann, German majority Socialist party leader, with Dr. Haase, leader of the Independent Socialist party and two workmen, formally told Wallroff of the formation of the workmen's council and demanded that all negotiations relative to the strike be held in the presence of the workmen.

Berlin reported that "it was not known whether Wallroff would agree to this." One dispatch, passed by the German censors, established the number of Berlin's strikers at 40,000. Another, apparently filed early this morning, put the total number then out at 75,000. The first named message declared "hundreds were joining every hour."

Authoritative American sources confirm the news of spread of the German strike movement, as reported in the press dispatches.

It is of tremendous significance that Philip Scheidemann, the German majority Socialist leader, had joined with the German minority leaders—Haase, Ledebour and Dittman. For the first time it appears that the German Socialist parties are united. Heretofore Scheidemann's subservience to the German government's policy has been so marked as to raise the suspicion that he was merely a tool of the government.

Change of Heart Seen

It was Scheidemann who conceived the idea of a Stockholm conference of Socialists of the world to discuss peace—a conference which was exposed at the outset as a scheme to twist Socialist sentiment into support of Germany by "planting of a majority of German Socialists in the convention."

Scheidemann as late as last summer was named by the Kaiser to head a Reichstag committee considering constitutional reforms, indicating the government relied upon him as "safe."

Last week, however, Scheidemann apparently expressed a violent change of heart. Dispatches quoted him as making a bitter assault on Chancellor Hertling for the conduct of the Brest-Litovsk peace negotiations. The German majority Socialists have consistently supported the German government, although professing radical beliefs. The minority Socialists have as consistently opposed every move of the junkers. It was their persistence who precipitated the cabinet crisis over Chancellor Bethmann Hollweg.

Berlin, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—One hundred thousand workmen were striking in Berlin Monday, according to copies of the Frankfurter Zeitung which arrived here today.

The newspaper declared there were no processions, no demonstrations and the city was orderly and quiet.

Pan-Germans Want Drastic Action

Amsterdam, Jan. 30.—(I. N. S.)—Leaders of the pan-German element are demanding the most drastic means of suppressing the labor agitation in Germany.

The pan-Germans want the government to give von Hindenburg and von Ludendorff a free hand in dealing with the socialists and strikers.

Dr. Philip Scheidemann, leader of the socialist party, has been refused permission to speak at a socialist rally at Leipzig on February 3, and it is likely that the police will not allow the meeting to assemble.

The German government is threatening to refuse permission for public meetings throughout the country until conditions become quieter.

Nearly all the workmen of the Daimler electric company and the General Electric company in Berlin are out.

The strikers attempted to hold a demonstration against the food shortage, but were dispersed by the police.

Many coal miners in Prussian Silesia struck and tried to persuade Russian prisoners of war (who were working in the mines) to quit also, but the Russians had too much fear of the German soldiers.

Workmen in naval factories at Kiel and Bremen quit work and sailors were called ashore from warships in the harbors to guard the plants. The strikers grew threatening and there were shouts of "Bolshevik onward!"

Pan-Germans Want Belgium

The Hague, Jan. 30.—(I. N. S.)—German occupation of the Belgian coast and military and economic domination of the whole of Belgium is the demand of the pan-Germans. It was revealed today.

The Nieuwe Rotterdamsche Courant publishes what purports to be an interview with Admiral von Tirpitz, founder of the Fatherland party, in Germany, in which these "terms" are contained.

America's Propaganda Working

Washington, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—Unrest in Germany—and particularly in Austria-Hungary—is attributed by high government officials today to "open air diplomacy."

Confidential reports show that a grave situation is facing the Austrian government in the demands of its people to throw off the militaristic yoke of the pan-Germans.

This movement has been encouraged for several weeks by the wide distribution of this country's war aims through out Austria-Hungary. For the first time America has a means of reaching the ears of the Austrian populace.

As stated by the United Press recently, the United States has been carrying on a propaganda in the opening with Austrians and Bulgarians, as well as the Russians, to show them that victory under the pan-Germans means ultimate disaster for these countries.

Confidential returns, showing the effect of this "moral offensive," have greatly encouraged President Wilson. Too much hope should not be placed in the German strikes, officials warn, because the strong arm of the Teuton military forces still controls; but in Austria there is ground for confidence in the outcome, it is stated.

In addition to the great strikes, widespread dissatisfaction is reported among the Czechs and Slovene soldiers. The Czechs and Socialists have openly demanded also that Count Czernin try to open up direct negotiations with President Wilson on peace.

SENATE SEEKING TRACE OF FUNDS

Extravagance in Shipbuilding,
With Uncle Sam Paying
Bills, Startles.

Washington, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—Alleged inefficiency and extravagance at the Hog Island shipyard of the American International corporation, with the government footing the bills, has stirred the senate shipping probers to resumption of their inquiry.

The trail of hundreds of thousands of dollars—expenditures at the yard in excess of estimates—will be followed when the committee resumes its work tomorrow.

Joseph P. Cotton, general counsel for the Emergency Fleet corporation when General Goethals was in charge, has been summoned to furnish the committee with all details of the corporation's contracts.

Senator Johnson, California, wants to know to what extent Frank A. Vanderlip, of the National City bank, New York, the W. A. Harriman interests and the steel interests were involved in the formation of the American International corporation which was organized, the committee has been told, to take contracts when the mammoth ship program was decided upon.

The contract with the International company was let on the agency plan under which the government was to build the yard at an estimated cost of \$21,000,000, furnish all material and pay all labor charges. The company was to get a commission estimated at about \$6,000,000 for building 70 ships in these yards, for furnishing the knowledge and the executive organization.

Reports from Manager Pies of the fleet corporation, submitted at the committee's request and made public today, showed that the cost of completing the work begun would be 100 per cent over the estimate.

Two more "government yard" contracts on the agency basis also will be investigated—one let to the Merchant Shipbuilding corporation at Bristol, Pa., for \$10,000,000, and the other to the Submarine Boat corporation at Newark, N. J., for \$11,000,000.

Missing Chicago Banker Accused

Chicago, Jan. 30.—(I. N. S.)—Police here are anxious to learn the whereabouts of Adolph Wolkofsky, a private banker, who has been missing since Saturday.

With the filing of a petition of bankruptcy it became known that Wolkofsky left behind a wife and seven children and a score of fellow countrymen, who accuse him of embezzlement and forgery.

Outspying German Spies
