WEATHER CONDITIONS

A shallow depression exists over the south-west, but the remainder of the country is covered by a great high pressure area, the center of which is in South Dakota. Precipitation has occurred at a few places on the Pacific coast and in the Plains states and over a large part of the country east of the Mississippi river. The weather is much colder in the north Pacific slope and in parts of Nevada and Montana, and over a belt extending from Minnesota to Oklahoma. In Eastern Oregon the fall in temperature was over 30 degrees. The temperature is noticeably higher in the extreme northern Plains region, in the north Atlantic states and in the extreme southwest. It is below normal except on the California coast and in Louisiana and Tennessee. In northern Montana the deficiency amounts to about 50 degrees. Zero weather extends southward to Oklahoma. At Portland the temperature fell below freezing for the first time this winter.

Paving Is Ordered
On Pacific Highway

Highway Department Will Pave Twenty Miles on Pacific Road Between Salem and Astoria.

Salem, Or., Jan. 31.—The state highway department is preparing to pave the section of the Pacific highway, beginning about 21 miles north of Salem and extending to Astoria, a distance of about 20 miles, according to information given out by Highway Engineer Herbert Nunn.

It is planned to have the road improved as a post road and Mr. Nunn has been advised that L. I. Hewes, district road engineer for the government, has approved the project and final plans are being submitted to the department of agriculture for approval. The paving is to be laid with state-owned plants, according to Mr. Nunn. The highway department already has let the contract for 50,000 yards of stone to be used on the project.

Want State Road

Molalla, Or., Jan. 31.—There is a movement on foot in this section to make the Oregon City-Silverton road a state road, and to secure government aid for the improvement. It is pointed out that this road is in a bad condition, and is entitled to some of the post road money, because of the fact that it is being used as a mail route. The improvement will make a direct route from Oregon City to Silverton, and will mean a great deal to the farmers in the section through which it passes.

Poor Farm Inmates
Quarrel; One Dead

Frank Hamblin, 63, inmate of the tuberculosis ward at the county farm died last night as result of a hemorrhage brought on by a fight with Rudolph Walters, 24, a patient in the same ward. The two men became involved in an

argument over some trivial matter about 9 o'clock which brought on a fight lasting several minutes. The exertion to Hamblin brought on the hemorrhage. Hamblin was taken to the hospital, but died half an hour later from which death came shortly after.

Class Completes
Radio School Work

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 31.—Twelve members of the radio school have already completed their course and have enlisted in the navy, and seven more will have mastered the work, and have enlisted within the next few days.

George Bonner of Corvallis led the class with a record of sending and receiving 20 words a minute after only 156 hours of work.

T. L. Hines of Wasco, Or., is credited with a speed of 12 words a minute after 143 hours practice; G. L. Albin of Philo-

math, Or., with 18 words after 105 hours of work; F. L. Woolridge of Al-pine, made 15 words after practicing 127 hours; E. R. Anderson, Corvallis, 15 words with 233 hours; A. R. Borquist of Portland is credited with 99 hours; W. B. Hastie, Mt. Angel, 12 words, with 105 hours; L. W. Trenholm, Corvallis, 12 words with 154 hours; Christian Olsen, 10 words with 75 hours; while both Ernest Probst and James Jewell have reached the federal requirements and have received their certificates.

Card Rooms Must Have License

All public card rooms in Portland must secure a license if operation is to be continued. At a meeting of the council Wednesday an ordinance was introduced requiring a license for all such establishments. The fee has been placed at \$5 for the first table and \$1 for each additional table.
